SAD FATALITY AT MILLERTON.

Miss Jane Betts Burned to Death at Her Home Last Wednesday.

WAS LIGHTING FIRE

A sad fatality took place at Millerton last Wednesday evening when Miss Jane Betts, a familiar figure of that place, and a generally respected lady met a tragic death. Miss Betts who lived alone in a small house, had been at John Betts for tea on Wednesday afternoon and went home about 6 o'clock. Soon after she entered the house volumes of smoke were seen pouring out of the place. A man named Failes ran to the house but found the front door locked. Later he secured an axe and broke down the front door, the place was full of smoke and it was so dense that as often as he tried to enter, he was forced back. It was some time before the fire could be put out and the smoke cleared away enough to allow anybody to enter but by this time Miss Betts was dead. Her body was found not far from the stove and it is supposed that while trying to light the fire her clothes caught and she was burned to death.

MANY TRAMPS ARE MOVING.

Newcastle has Been Troubled With Numerous Weary Willies.

HOUSE ENTERED.

People Warned to Lock Doors at Night—Arrest Made—Living Near Town.

Newcastle has been for the past week infested with tramps. Not the usual civil Weary Willy who comes around to the back door and asks with a mournful story of missing dinners, for something to eat, but the criminal kind, that do not stop at petty thieving, entering people's houses in a quiet way and frightening women folk, etc.

Numerous complaints have been heard of these and in one or more instances the police were informed and an arrest made, but the prisoner, after being locked up for a while was given twenty minutes to leave town, and he lit out lively.

On other instances we hear of men appearing suddenly in a woman's kitchen after and in another of entering a cellar and making a meal of things found therein.

It is said that there are a number of these gentlemen living in a deserted house about three miles up the I. C. R. track. If such is the case they should be driven out as they are a menace to the town.

TURKEY YIELDS TO JOHN BULL

Sultan Has Accepted the Demands of Great Britain and Troops Will Evacuate Tobah.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 12.—The Turkish government has accepted the demands of Great Britain conditionally. It is anticipated that this is only a preliminary to the complete acceptance of the British demands in regard to the Tobah boundary question.

LONDON, May 12.—The Foreign office has not yet received advices that the Porte has definitely acceded to the British demands, but the latest official despatches from Constantinople intimated that the Sultan was preparing to submit. It is said at the Foreign office that there can be nothing "conditional" in the acceptance as the demands of Great Britain are irreducible minimum.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 12.—The change in the Sultan's attitude must have taken place very late last night or early to day, for the Grand Vizier's visit to the British ambassador, Sir Nicholas R. O'Connor, at eleven o'clock last night had no immediate result except to emphasize the fact that the attempts of Turkey to arrange a compromise were useless. The Grand Vizier's proposals were as unacceptable as were those of Tewfik Pasha, the Foreign Minister on the previous day, and Sir Nicholas again pointed out the futility of suggesting modifications of the British demands, which constituted the absolute minimum.

Shediac Has New City Council.

MONCTON, May 12.—An entirely new city council was elected by acclamation at Shediac yesterday to replace the council which recently resigned. Although there were no politics in the matter the new council is entirely liberal in its personnel, being made up as follows: Dr. E. A. Smith, mayor. Aldermen—Ward 1, Emil Paturel, Michael Conner; ward 2, Philip F. McLan, Joseph H. Moore; ward 3, Docie J. Doherty, Jeremiah A. McArthur; ward 4, Auguste Patre and James A. McQueen. The old council was composed of seven conservatives, two liberals and would not take the oath of office on account of some friction between supporters.

HOMESTEAD ENTRIES SHOW AN INCREASE

OTTAWA, May 9.—The homestead entries for April throughout western Canada numbered 6,203, an increase of 2,416 over the corresponding month of last year. The returns show that the increased movement is chiefly into the Battleford, Regina, Red Deer, Lethbridge and Winnipeg districts.

GOOD CONDITIONS FOR THE DRIVES.

Water at a Good Pitch and Fine Progress Being Made.

GLOUCESTER DRIVES.

The Miramichi lumber drives are coming along at a lively rate. The water is the best the lumbermen have had for some years and everything is running and every stick will reach the boom.

On the Southwest the water has never in recent years been at such a good pitch for driving as it has this spring. The drives on Rocky Brook, the Sisters and Cams River are all in. One of the most widely known operators on the Miramichi, states that all the lumber on the South West Miramichi is in safe waters. There is about forty five or fifty million feet in this lot which makes good news for the mill owners.

The upper corporation drive is reported as leaving Hayes Bar, eight miles above Huestown, which means that very good progress is being made.

On the Northwest the same good reports are received and on all branches the drives are moving at a good pace, so that there is hardly a doubt but that all will reach the boom safely.

The Gloucester County drives are reported to be either in the booms or practically safe. On one or two drives record time was made, one large drive getting in in nine days.

Altogether with the large cut this season promises to be a very good one on the North Shore.

ANOTHER GOOD N. B. SPEAKER.

Mr. W. S. Loggie Thus Described by a Writer in the Montreal "Standard."

Another New Brunswick who can speak as Mr. Loggie, the Liberal member for Northumberland. Of course he is not in Mr. Stockton's class, nor would he claim to be. He is a business man, and has made a success of his calling. He is in general trade, and operates a large number of lobster canneries. Usually silent, he let himself loose last week, speaking in defence of the claims of the central route for the Transcontinental Railway through New Brunswick. Mr. Loggie in appearance might pass for a country parson, his face looks so serene, and there is something ministerial about his beard.

But, however he may look, he talked like a politician, and his vigorous gestures reminded one of the platoon rather than the floor of Parliament. Frequent such members, who speak seldom, refer to the Speaker as Mr. Chairman, evidently having a public meeting in their minds. But those slips are all out right in Hansard.—Montreal Standard.

Canadian Lumber will Rebuild San Francisco.

Sir Charles Tupper is on his way to England and one of his missions will be to attend the sessions of the Chambers of Commerce of the empire, in London, in July. He says that one of the results of the San Francisco disaster will be a boom in the lumbering industry in British Columbia. The American government will allow Canadian lumber to be shipped to San Francisco free of duty and as the British Columbia mills are the Canadian mills nearest to that city, they will do the bulk of the business. Indeed Sir Charles thinks that Canadian lumber will practically rebuild San Francisco. The mills in British Columbia are already working overtime to get out lumber for the wrecked city. Sir Charles says that the mining industry in the Pacific province is thriving and that conditions are very satisfactory. He is confident, though that mining in British Columbia is but in its infancy. Sir Charles looks hale and hearty and younger than he has looked in a decade.

The pictures are not worthy for the subjects, not worthy for the Canadian Parliament nor worthy the Royal Academy."

The Morning Post says: "Forbes is a conscientious and painstaking artist and may be credited with having secured likenesses of the Royal sitters. The accessories are detailed in laboriously mechanical fashion."

The Chronicle says: "Though less convincing as works of art, the pictures are more bright and cheerful than photographs would have been."

The Morning Leader says: "One don't know whether to laugh or cry. More grotesque libels were never uttered in paint upon the persons of our gracious King and Queen. As works of art, they are as barbarous as icons manufactured by the ignorant and corrupt priesthood of Russia."

Sovereign Lodge Meeting In Toronto

Programme of the Gathering Which is to be held in September Valuable Prizes Offered.

The Official Herald of the Independent Order of Oddfellows of April 26 contains full particulars of the meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of America, which is held at Toronto from September 17th to 21st. This is the 82nd annual convention.

Arrangements have been made with all the railway in the United States and Canada for the issuing of return tickets to Toronto at one first class fare, and the commissioner of customs for Canada has agreed that all regalia, books and papers, along with the traveller's baggage, will be admitted free of duty for this gathering.

The headquarters of the Sovereign Grand Lodge will be at the King Edward Hotel, Toronto. Other hotel accommodations sufficient for the number of visitors, has been arranged, and circulars giving full information will be distributed later through America.

In the Exhibition Park, in that section known as Camp Wright, the headquarters of the Patriarchs Militant will be established, and in these grounds, in front of the grand stand, the drills of the different competing cantons will take place. There will be a grand parade through the streets of Toronto on Wednesday, Sept. 19, in which all which all visitors are expected to take part.

The programme for the week includes an excursion to St. Catharines and Niagara, a meeting of the grand council and a second excursion to St. Catharines on Sept. 15, divine service at St. James's Cathedral on Sunday, Sept. 16; a public welcome to the Sovereign Grand Lodge by Lieut. Governor Clark, Premier Whitney and Mayor Coatsworth and Canadian officers of the order in the legislative chambers; formal opening of Camp Wright; prize degree competitions, encampment degree competitions, reception by Rebekahs of Ontario to Lady visitors, dress parade of Cantons at Exhibition Park, reception at King Edward Hotel, and exemplification of degrees by the Patriarchs Militant and Rebekahs on Monday, 17th. For the following day the programme includes the first business session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, competitions in drill by the subordinate lodges and cantons, dress parade at Exhibition Park, conferring of degrees, and in the evening a reception and past Grand officers' reunion in Massey Hall. For this latter function a most interesting programme has been prepared.

Wednesday, Sept. 19, will be taken up by business, meetings and competitive drills of the different cantons. On Thursday, 20th, in addition to the business meetings, Lieut. Governor Clark will hold a formal reception. There will be an illuminated electric car ride around the city for the Rebekahs and their guests. The annual meeting of the Fraternal Press Association will be held in the King Edward Hotel. Later in the evening there will be a press banquet.

Friday, Sept. 21, will be marked by a dress parade at Exhibition Park and presentation of prizes, an electric railroad trip to the Ontario Oddfellows Home at Oakville by the Rebekahs and their guests, and in the evening a reception to the officers and members of members of Sovereign Grand Lodge and their ladies by the mayor and council of the city of Toronto at the city hall.

Advice for Men With Little Money

After numerous and experiences the people ought to be filled with suspicion when new and untried men go out to take charge of their money. Suspicion should be intensified when extra inducements are held out to them. A high interest rate is attractive, but it is dangerous. If a man whose savings are in a solid, substantial bank which pay three per cent. is invited to transfer his account to some new bank which offers four or five per cent. he should investigate before making a change. If he finds that three per cent. is the prevailing rate of trustworthy banks he should say to himself that the four per cent. is a bait which hides a hook.

Savings bank depositors are often invited to draw out there money and buy with it "gilt edged securities" which will pay them twice the interest rate they are getting. If they leave their money in the bank they can get it when they want it. The interest is small but certain. If they buy the securities which have tempting interest rate they will not be able to get their money when they want it, and may not get it at all.

The man who has only a little money and no financial experience cannot be too distrustful of the generous banker who sends "his advertisements flying" to tell the people that if they will go to him he will do more for them than bankers who have characters to lose and real money—not stage money—to lend.

NOT ENOUGH GIRLS
CAME TO CANADA.

Complaints of Young Men in the West Are Well Founded—One Woman For Ten Men.

(Toronto Globe.)

"Out of nearly 14,000 immigrants who have come under our attention since the first of this year, not ten per cent. of them have been women and girls," said an officer on Saturday. "I think I would be safe in saying that they did not number more than eight per cent. he continued, and nearly all of the gentler sex were married women at that, he added. This is one of the facts which an hour in the busy immigration office at the Union Station revealed. It goes to show, however, that there is good ground for the statements from the west that men there are unable to find wives. Granting the number of women and girls who have come in were ten per cent. of the total arrivals, that would mean only 1,400 in an army of 14,000 men or one woman for every ten men. This seems rather an amusing situation, concluded the officer, but it is none the less true.

Speaking of the nationality of newcomers, he remarked that nearly all who had come into Toronto and were sent out through western Ontario were from the British Isles. A large number were from the north of Ireland, many from Scotland, and most from the more crowded centres of England. Most of the women and girls were from London and have come out with their husbands and fathers. Quite a number of the Scotsmen were married men, but they with few exceptions, left their wives and daughters home, promising to bring them out later.

As a class of people this year's arrivals are said to be a sturdy lot of men, few of whom are past 45 years, and most of whom are between 20 and 35 years of age, and they are fairly well-to-do. Some it was learned, had considerable money.

THE CANADIAN MAIL SERVICE.

There is no reason why Canadians in writing to Europe should send their letters "Via New York." On both the eastbound and westbound trips the Canadian mail service has been shown to be the more satisfactory. Setting aside all individual speed tests, it is shown that Canadian mails are landed in this country by the Allan line steamers quicker than by any of those sailing to New York. On April 25th the White Star liner Baltic left England and took on the mails at Ruenston. On April 26th the Allan liner Virginia left Liverpool on April 26th, and received the mails at Monville on April 27th. The Virginian reached Rimouski at 6 a. m. on Friday, May 4th, and at ten o'clock the same night the mails were delivered in Montreal. The Baltic's mails which had left Queenstown a day ahead of those on the Virginian did not reach Montreal until Saturday May 5th.

DATE OF COLONIAL
CONFERENCE FIXED.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy Declares They are Negligent in not Visiting Canada.

LONDON.—The Earl of Elgin, in responding to the toast of "Canada and the Governor General," at the Canada Club dinner, announced that the colonial conference would meet in the middle of April next. It had been difficult to arrange a date to suit all parts of the empire. He hoped to take part, because, in consulting together, the conference should result in a system—he would not say commercial or use any adjective—but a system that would unite the Empire in a union, which alone would give strength. Regarding the mail route to the East through Canada, he said the chancellor agreed that the arrangement should continue another two years and that this might be the subject of negotiations at the conference. Lord Strathcona, who presided, in proposing the toast, depicted the prosperity of Canada and expressed the good will of Earl Elgin, who, he hoped, would live to see still closer relations between Canada and the empire.

Mr. Parkin, proposed the "Imperial Forces." Admiral Montagu, replying said the naval officers remembered the kindness of Canadians. He hoped to go over next month fishing.

General Buller, praised Canada for assuming her own defence, which the soldiers of England appreciated. He said it had been his good fortune to command the Strathcona Horse. He knew the excellent service rendered by Colonel Steele, and his men.

"Our Guests," proposed by Sir Lawrence Young, was responded to by the Archbishop of Rupert's Land and Justice McMahon, of Toronto.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, proposed the health of Lord Strathcona, eulogizing his public spirit and personality. He was greeted with much enthusiasm.

BRITISH MINISTERS

CRITICIZED.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, in his speech, created some stir by the outspoken way in which, in the presence of the Colonial Secretary, he commented on the neglect of British ministers and permanent officials to visit and become acquainted with the actual conditions of the Empire they were charged to govern. Referring especially to the Sermanent head of the Canadian department of the Colonial Office, who was present, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy expressed astonishment that he had never been in Canada, and should be in the incumbent. A man holding such a position should spend at least three months in Canada every year. (General cheers.)

It was recently stated in the Canadian Senate that no British Minister while in office had ever visited Canada. These were conditions requiring attention. Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, proceeded as follows: "A few years ago, when trade questions were discussed between Canada and the United States, we were treated with some thing in the nature of contempt. Are we going to permit the Rockfellers, Carnegies, Hills and other men who influence the United States to force upon Canada trade relations that may lead to most complicated results in the future? Are we to sit supinely by and let them determine what shall be Canada's future career? I do not know by what means we can prevent them from carrying their objects into practice, but whether by free trade or fair trade, we must attempt to do it."

Lord Strathcona in his speech was equally frank. As regards the new Canadian Atlantic services he said he was not satisfied, and would not be satisfied until the passage from land to land was made by Canadian steamers inside of four days.

About two hundred were present and reference to the Canadian victory at Athens was received with cheers.

Father Gapon's Body Found Hanging in Deserted Villa?

St. Petersburg, May 13.—The mystery of the fate of Father Gapon apparently was cleared up to day by the discovery of a corpse, which has almost positively been identified as that of the former priest, hanging in the upper chamber of a lonely villa in the summer suburb of Ozorki, Finland. The villa was rented April 8 for the summer and a deposit paid by an unknown man from St. Petersburg, who, after visiting the house several times in company with a young workman, disappeared April 11, taking the key with him. The proprietress of the villa, alarmed at the disappearance of the tenant, notified the police, who entered the house. Breaking down a door they were confronted by a body in a long coat, hanging from a nail, the feet touching the floor. Decomposition of the face made positive identification difficult, but the clothing corresponded with that worn by the missing labor leader. As the usual symptoms of strangulation were absent, it is conjectured that the man was killed elsewhere and his body brought to the villa on the night of April 10. This would agree with the date of the execution of Gapon given in information of the secret police and with the death sentence of the former priest as announced in recent despatches from Berlin.

Without a moment's hesitation young Robinson picked up a short club and tackled his bearship. He struck him a heavy blow on the nose which caused the brute and with a terrific roar he charged the trapped paw and made for the young men. They were in a pretty tight place but faced the danger promptly and being young and active managed to keep clear of his embrace. Armed with sticks they attacked the animal viciously and soon had him in dazed condition. After that it was an easy task to dispose of Bruin and he was pounded to death. The prize was a large one and the young men felt pardocable proud of their capture, affected as it was under circumstances which few would care to face. The skin and head are in the possession of the young men. 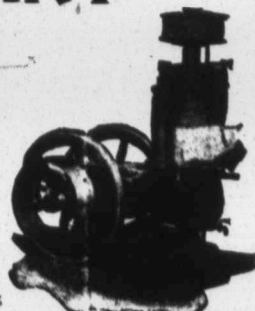
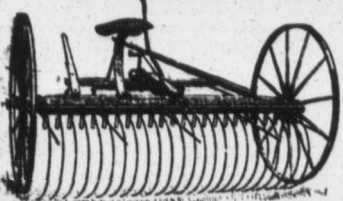

FACE CREAMS.

The Dangers That Sometimes Lurk in These Substances.

"If women knew the danger that lurks in stale face creams they would exercise more caution in the use of these complexion aids," said a druggist. "People who would not think of employing kerosene oil or stale fat of any kind singly as an application seem to lose all fear of the same elements when they have been melted together in the form of a toilet preparation."

"A cream, salve or ointment containing various oils and greases is allowed to remain on the dressing table for a space varying all the way from two months to a year to be applied at irregular intervals. Of course the temperature of the average house is not low enough to keep the preparation long fresh in winter, while in summer it will become unfit for use in a few hours."

"You know what a disagreeable flavor table oil takes on when kept long in a warm room or closet."

"Actual cases of face cream poisoning are by no means rare. The skin absorbs the rancid stuff, with all its germs, and the latter pass slowly but surely into the blood. If there happens to be an abrasion of the skin where the stale cream is applied bad results are much more rapidly developed. The proper place for all such preparations is the refrigerator or other cool spot where perishable provisions are kept."

SERVE MORE CURRANTS.

They Are Said to Contain More Nutrients Than Lean Beef.

Only a few years ago nobody knew that there was any food value to the little dried so called Greek currants. Since then food chemists have demonstrated that there is far more nutrition in them than in lean beef. Sir Francis Laking, physician to King Edward, says that nutrition in white bread is greatly increased by them and that thirty parts of currants should be added to seventy parts of dough. To add them to bread, wash, dry well and mix with the flour after sifting it with salt. They also make a good winter substitute in all bread and batter recipes that call for fresh blueberries. The best variety to get are the Zanti currants, which come from the island of Zanti. They are really not currants, but are a small variety of seedless grape.

To use them with your cream salt a cup of sour cream. Put in a little less than you believe to be just enough soda to neutralize the acid. Beat it until foamy. Sift a pint of flour with one cup of sugar and one teaspoonful of baking powder. Add one cup of dried currants or fresh blueberries and bake as muffins.—Exchange.

DRESS HINTS.

To take care of silk dresses properly they should never be brushed, but rubbed with a soft piece of merino. White gloves cleaned promptly after each wearing will last indefinitely. If the stains are allowed to dry on they become permanent.

Blue linings for the bureau drawers or shirt waist boxes in which you keep your prettiest blouses keep them more daintily white.

Common seashore sand will greatly improve the appearance of old velvet and remove all the dust. Sprinkle the velvet well with the fine sand and then brush until none remains, always brushing in the pile the wrong way.

A bit of stiff buckram will repair the worst ravages of a hatpin. Slip it under the torn place and take a few strong stitches to keep it firmly set and then adjust the trimming to cover it.

Corsets and Comfort.

When a woman has to remove her corset to rest, something is the matter with it. There is a pinching that makes forgetfulness impossible, and when I find a woman addicted to the habit of removing her stays when safely entrenched within her chamber I know her for a victim of fashion. She is much more common than you may know. I never understood how anybody could find life endurable when every day held a measure of torture, fully known and appreciated at its real value beforehand. I am not an exponent of ugliness, but I dare believe that it is possible to combine comfort and grace with the happiest results. I have seen it done, I am sure.—Milwaukee Wisconsin.

The Scalp. The cleaning of the scalp should be very carefully and tenderly performed. It is best to use warm water with a mild soap, rubbing in gently and with the ends of the fingers, then rinsing with tepid water. Drying should be done by gently pressing the hair and scalp with a very dry towel, continuing until thoroughly dry. Fanning is another safe process. If any application is necessary to bring hair thus dried into shape, dampen with a solution of bichloride of mercury. Stiff brushes are especially injurious to the tender scalp, causing the hair to break and irritating the delicate skin covering of the head.

Little Red Spots.

If you see a tiny spot, bright red, that persists during many months and gets slightly larger, make up your mind to have it destroyed. If let alone it will enlarge and become a great blemish. Any surgeon can, by the use of caustics or electrolysis, remove the spot in a few minutes. These things are called "naevi" and they are made up of dilated capillaries, neither arteries nor veins, but the tiny vessels that unite the two.

HAVE A SYSTEM.

It Will Lighten Your Labors and Save Time and Money.

Care must be taken that the time set apart for the various items of household work is long enough to allow them to be thoroughly done and also that the arrangement is such that both mistress and servant will have some degree of leisure every day.

In many well regulated houses a time table is hung on the kitchen wall, with the work of each day carefully noted as well as the time to be devoted to each item. The work of each household can easily be arranged so that there is little to be done on the last day of the week, which most people regard as a half holiday.

An early start must be made every day. In all households, whether great or small, each apartment should be thoroughly cleaned once a week. It is a good plan to have a day set apart for each room, and one day every two weeks at least ought to be devoted to the cleaning and arrangement of cupboards and what are known as "odd corners."

If windows are cleaned regularly the work can be both easily and quickly performed. Bright windows and fresh curtains generally indicate the character of the interior of a dwelling. Ironing ought to be done as soon as possible after the washing is finished, as one never gets the work performed so quickly and efficiently as when the clothes are newly taken from the line.—Boston Traveler.

AN AID IN CLEANING.

Many Ways in Which Kerosene Oil

"If more women knew how quickly and thoroughly kerosene oil acts as a cleaning agent there would be fewer tired backs and aching bones on cleaning day," said a little woman, whose apartment is always as spotless as the streets of a certain town celebrated for its immaculate condition. "Ever since the hint was given to me by a practical friend, a fifty years housekeeper," she continued, "I've been learning to use the oil for more and more purposes each week—in fact, I am a coal oil crank. I wipe up my stained wood floors with a rag moistened with the oil and find that in addition it darkens the boards a little every time, which is a disconcerting in my case, as the floor is of soft wood and wears easily."

"All the woodwork I wipe with another rag on which I sprinkle a few drops of oil. Anything of porcelain, like a bathtub, it cleans most beautifully; also the bathroom washstand and closet, only taking the precautions to change your cloths. The wall back of my range is painted a deep red. When it becomes greasy and dusty I find that the oiled cloth makes a splendid cleanser, although I confess I tried it in the first instance with fear and trembling.—Philadelphia Press.

LAUNDRY LINES.

Calico dresses should be soaked in strong salt water for an hour before washing, so as to set the colors.

If a cup of thin boiled starch is put in half a tub of rinsing water for table linen and handkerchiefs they will be greatly improved in appearance.

Tie a lump of arrowroot in a thick cotton cloth and boil it with the fine white pieces to give them a dainty odor more delightful than from satchet powder.

To prevent goods from fading drop into a pail of water a teaspoonful of lead acetate and let it dissolve. Soak the goods in this mixture for half an hour before washing them in the ordinary manner.

Colored gingham should be washed through this starch water, without any soap, and then rinsed in soft cold water and hung to dry in a shady place, as few colors can stand to be exposed to the sun while damp.

A Pretty Basket.

There are many pretty and useful things that can be made with a crochet hook and a ball of common twine. Baskets may be made in bag shape, then starched and shaped over a suitable dish. The dish must be slightly greased before stretching the bag over it, so that it will come off readily after it is dry. Two coats of varnish will be needed after it is stiffened with starch. By mixing a little bronze paint and some turpentine with the last coat of varnish a very pretty basket is secured. Shellac varnish should be used with the paints, and gold or silver paint may be used instead of the bronze if preferred.

Whitening the Teeth.

The teeth are improved by the use of salt. Rubbed wet when the mouth is stained with fruit it will bleach perfectly. Rubbed in once a day with a brush it is a tonic and antiseptic, and combined with peroxide it makes a powerful bleach. This is done by wetting a brush with a few drops of peroxide of hydrogen and then dipping it into the salt. This will have a most pronounced effect upon yellow teeth, whitening them noticeably, but it should not be used oftener than once in ten days or the enamel will be injured.

Tender Feet.

A good bath for tender feet is composed of five quarts of hot water, 200 grains of boracic acid and five grains of tannin. The feet should be soaked in this bath for ten minutes. Dry thoroughly. If your feet are sore after a long walk or vigorous exercise, massage them with olive oil. They respond to cure very quickly. If your feet swell from long standing, dissolve one ounce of alum, two ounces of rock salt and two ounces of Epsom in the bath.

The three Chatham Chinese laundrymen who were accused last September of breaking into the building occupied by a fellow countryman employed in the same business and murderously assaulted him, and tried before Judge Gregory, convicted and sentenced to four years each in the Dorchester penitentiary, have, through the efforts of R. A. Lawlor, been discharged.

An advance of ten cents in the barrel was made recently on all grades of Ontario flour. This is directly due to an increase in the cost of wheat. The Manitoba flour did not advance, as the summer freight rates came into effect a day or two ago, and these give Manitoba flour advantage of ten cents per barrel which about counteracts the advance in wheat. Ontario flour will retail at \$5.00.

McElroy, Robert Wall, and Patrick Connor, and burial was in St. Michael's cemetery.—World.
