#### Charles J. Shaw

The death occurred on Dec. 33 of Charles J. Shaw, a life-long resident of Victoria Corner, but who went with his son to live in Houlton last spring. He was just 90 years of age and had been in very feeble condition for a long time. His wife died many years ago but he is survived by nine children: Leighton and Frank R. in Houlton, Coleman in British Columbia, Byron at Victoria, and two sons in Montana, also Mrs. Bennett Healey and Mrs. Henry Hall of Houlton and Mrs. James Alterton in Montana.

No resident of Carleton county was more respected than the deceased. He was a Liberal in politics and was for many years an active worker. In religion he was a Baptist and lived a consistent Christian life.

The funeral was held in the Hartland Baptist church on Saturday, the sermon being preached by Rev. E. C. Jenkins, pastor of the church at Victoria. The remains were laid to rest beside those of his wife at the old burying ground at Victoria.

#### Bernard Travers

On Dec. 4. death closed the long life of Bernard Travers of St. Thomas. He was born a Donegal, Ireland, 88 years ago. When a boy he came to the settlement where he died, and lived there the whole of his long career, He was an honored man, faithful to his God and his church, and his end was peace.


