



Ancient Shark. Off the coast of Norway not long ago was captured a specimen of the shark tribe, which, in the form of its teeth and in other characteristic features, closely resembles a species of shark that inhabited the ocean in that snark that innasted the ocean in that immeasurably remete period called in geology the Devonian age. Vacuum-Made Films.

At a meeting of the Academy of Sciences in Paris Professor. Houle-vigue described a method of producing thin metallic films by volatilization in a vacuum.
