

Harley Cole' Killed by Live Electric Wire in l. C. R. Yard.

Harley Cole, son of Mr Edward Cole, the well known ferryman at Derchester, was instantly killed in the I. C. R. yard in front of the check office about a quarter to five this afternoon.

The death came with horrible suddenness and was the first instance of that kind known in Moncton. It is the second death which may practically be associated with the burning of the I. C. R. The fatality occurred during the necessary work of straightening the wircs out.


