

CANADA.

So far as we can learn from some of the Montreal papers, political affairs in the lower province are assuming an unpleasant aspect. The Herald of Thursday says, that the house of R. B. McGinnis, Esq. in the Parish of L'Acadie, has been torn down by the "Rebels," because he would not resign his commission as captain of militia. The Toronto correspondent, in a postscript of Monday last, says that an express arrived in that city the day before, with an order from Sir John Colborne, to have every soldier at the Garrison sent without a moment's delay to Montreal.

The Catholic Bishop of Montreal has issued a circular, addressed "to the clergy of all the faithful of the diocese," earnestly exhorting them to the duties of obedience and submission to the constituted authorities, as enjoined by the scriptures and by every consideration of humanity and of Christian obligation, and enforced by the express language of the Supreme Pontiff, the acknowledged head of the Catholic church throughout the world. The circular was appended to the read from all the pulpits, on Sunday the 29th of October.

Riot in Montreal.—The prohibition of the contemplated procession by the "Sons of Liberty," seems to have proved the occasion for a very pretty row. The Herald gives a long account of it, from which we gather that about 250 of the "Sons" mustered in Great St. James Street, made an unprovoked attack on some loyalists who were quietly looking on—fired two pistols, which did no mischief—pounded sundry individuals—and chased others through the streets, breaking the windows of loyal houses as they passed along.

The loyalists, however, thought they would take their turn, having received large reinforcements, but at sight thereof, the "Sons" dispersed. The riot act was read, and the royal regiment was ordered out to parade the streets, supported by the artillery, but nothing happened to give them employment.

About six o'clock the loyalists took to their heels to attack the house of Mr. Piquet, but were restrained by their leaders. The office of the *Vindicator* they would not spare—the types, paper, and every thing movable, were thrown into the street.

Magistrates with troops were stationed through the night, at various points—but nothing further happened.

A gentleman who came from St. John yesterday forenoon, informs us that several persons sat up all night to protect the Custom House in case of an attack, as a band of ruffians had threatened to demolish it, and at the same time to compel Mr. McCree, the collector, to resign his commission as a magistrate. The country from St. John to Oklawaha and Napierville, &c., is in a state of great excitement.

The troops in garrison in this city were reviewed yesterday afternoon, under the command of Major-General Sir John Colborne. The occasion was being celebrated by great numbers of spectators who were present, flying artillery also were in the ground, and went through their exercise in very fine style. The steady and which their horses so lately put to the service, performed their part, excited general surprise.

LITERATURE.

BUCKINGHAM'S LECTURES.—We have seldom been more delighted by any thing, than by an attendance at the lectures now being delivered at the Stuyvesant Institute and Clinton Hall, on alternate evenings, by Mr. Buckingham. The subject of the lectures embraces a description of the land of Egypt, with its cities, temples, pyramids, statues and tombs as they were seen by him on the banks of the celebrated Nile. The first lecture gave a general sketch of the geographical features of Egypt, and a subject apparently so barren in interest, was treated in a manner to delight and instruct the numerous audience.

The second lecture was upon the climate, productions, agriculture, and natural history of the country, and was listened to with the greatest attention. The third was a description of the modern cities, and the manners and customs of their inhabitants, and we have never had presented to us a picture more vividly delineating what it was intended to represent.

The lecture this evening, on the ancient cities and monuments of Lower Egypt, will from the nature of the subject, far transcend in interest any which have preceded it. The opulence and splendour of Alexandria, the great temple of Serapis, Pompey's Pillar, Cleopatra's Needle, Ptolemy's library, the temple of Minerva Manuboth of his King Arses, together with notices of Julius Cæsar, Mark Anthony, and Cleopatra, will afford materials for a discourse which cannot fail of compensating those who listen to it.

As a lecturer, Mr. Buckingham is unequalled by few persons. His discourses are entirely extemporaneous, and in choice of his language he is exceedingly choice, giving to it by his constant and judicious emphasis, a force which adds much to the effect of his words. In quotation he is admirably delicate and much as we have often admired the celebrated description of Cleopatra's barge, we never felt half its beauties till we heard it from his lips. Few who have heard these lectures will forget "Green Egypt, with her tripped harvests crowned."

In conclusion, we have one word for the ladies, when preparing for the lecture, select your smallest, not your largest hats. It was our misfortune on the last evening to be seated behind one of the latter description, and we could not help wishing that Mr. B. had excepted the wearer of it from the just and beautiful compliment to the sex, with which he concluded his discourse.

Mr. J. S. Buckingham.—This extensive traveller has addressed a letter to the people of the United States, upon the subject of his coming, and the places he has visited.

His plan of operations he develops in the following paragraph in his letter:—"I will say no more, except to add, that should my humble labours among you be crowned with the success which I venture to anticipate, and should Providence spare my life and health to follow out the plan I have long meditated and designated, it is my intention, after visiting every part of the United States of America, to extend my tour thro' the British Possessions of Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and the West Indies, to visit from thence the Isthmus of Darien, for the purpose of investigating this barrier between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans; to make an excursion through Mexico, and from thence pass onward by the South Sea Islands to China, visit the Philippines and the Moluccas, go onward to Australia and Van Diemen's Land; continue from thence through the Indian Archipelago, by Borneo, Java, Sumatra, and Malacca to India; traverse the Peninsula of Hindostan, from the Ganges to the Indus, and return to Europe by the Red Sea and the Mediterranean."

UNITED STATES.

AMERICAN POLITICS.—The Whig party in New York have beaten the Jackson or Van Buren party at the late election, by a majority of nearly three thousand. The Editor of the *Kennebec Journal* exults at this triumph, in the following terms:

On Monday afternoon the valley of the Kennebec rang with the thunder of one hundred guns, in celebration of the unexpected triumph of the Whigs of New York, in the recent election.

It was the good fortune of the writer of this paragraph to hear a salute of 500 guns fired in the city of New York, for the Whig victories of Maine, Rhode Island, and the western States, in September last, and we then assured the New Yorkers, that we hoped to have the pleasure of hearing salutes fired in honor of the political regeneration of the empire State. And now we have it!

But such a sweeping triumph never dreamed of. The result is immeasurably beyond our most sanguine anticipations. Never was such a total rout heard of before.

It is possible, it bears Indian and Kentucky. Such a victory in the great State of New York will be hailed with unbounded acclamation, and celebrated with the ringing of bells and the roar of artillery, from the fir covered shores of the Schoodic, to the alluvial savannah of the Red River and the Arkansas.

The knell of Jackson Van Burenism, has been sounded in tones which must vibrate upon the ear of the millions who inhabit this Republic. The dynasty of the Office holders is at an end! The Waterloo defeat of the enemy is at length achieved.

Not Sunk.—The report of the sinking of the Island of Juan Fernandez, comes from French papers. There is every reason to believe it is not true, for on inquiring, it is proved that several American vessels have touched at the island since the time when the French accounts could have originated. Probably some French vessel endeavored to touch the island, but through misadventure could not find it, and hence concluded it had disappeared. The U. S. Sloop of war Peacock is one of the vessels which touched there.

IN COUNCIL.

October 12th, 1837. Obedience. That no expense shall be incurred for surveys, as such expense might exceed, by a large amount the whole price to be received for the Timber applied for; such further surveys do not appear to be necessary, as the applicants, who are acquainted with the respective berths, may in most cases proceed to cut their Timber without danger of collision; and when collisions do take place and surveys in consequence become necessary, it will then be a question to be settled by the Governor and Council, as to which of the parties to the dispute shall pay the expenses of survey, or whether such expenses shall be borne by the Provincial Government.

Governor, conveying in terms the most gratifying to His Excellency, the entire approval of Her Majesty's Government of the various important measures which have been adopted by His Excellency since His assumption of the Government of this Province, as well in reference to the Provisional extension of the Board of Audit, and to the formation of the Board of Audit, and the financial reforms which have been introduced into several Departments of the Public Service.

We learn that Mandamus for seven new Members of the Executive Council, including the three who have already been provisionally called by His Excellency to take their seats at that Board, were then passing thro' the requisite forms, and may be daily expected.—*Royal Gazette.*

New Councilors.—We are informed that Her Majesty the Queen, has appointed the Honorable Anne C. Bosford, Neville Parker, William Crane, and John W. Weldon, Esquires, additional members of the Executive Council in this Province.

On the 24th ultimo, a deputation of the Micmac Tribe of Indians, residing at Richibucto, waited upon His Excellency the Lieut.

Governor and presented a Petition, praying that His Excellency would approve of their choice of NOLE ANTOINE ATHINXRE, as Chief of the said Tribe.

The gracious manner in which His Excellency was pleased to receive the Deputation, which was attended by an Interpreter, and his ready approval of the choice of their Chief, has given great satisfaction to the Tribe.

His Excellency also directed the Trespassers on their Lands to be immediately removed, and every protection to be afforded to them, in order that they may extend their agricultural pursuits, which in that district of the Province are not inconsiderable.—*Ibid.*

Circular to Deputy Surveyors. In consequence of the above order in Council, I have to desire that you will entirely abstain from laying out Timber Berths, or interfering in any collision between parties who may have licence to cut Timber, without express orders from me.

I have also to desire, that in the event of your being called upon by any person to perform a survey at their private expense, either with the view of the person applying for the ground to cut timber, or to settle and cultivate the earth, you will confine your survey from some angle of a former grant or survey, running all the lines round the same and conforming in all cases as much as possible to the course of the line at surveys in the neighborhood.

In transmitting returns of these surveys to the office you will be particularly careful to report what or there be any or what Pine Timber, Mill Sites Meadows, Intervale or any other circumstances which may enhance the value of such lands, and which ought to be brought under the notice of Her Majesty's Executive Council; the first book of the survey must also accompany the plan, and you will observe, that in no case will I hold myself responsible for the expenses you may incur in executing such services.

Regulations for the Leasing of Mines and Minerals in New Brunswick.

All persons wishing to obtain a lease of Mines and Minerals must apply by Petition to His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, in which Petition he must state particularly the district in which he wishes to work; whether he possesses the means to enable him to carry on his operations; in what extent he proposes to go; He must also state whether he owns the Land upon which he wishes to work; or whether, if owned by another person, he has made any, and what arrangements, with that person; and he will be required to produce evidence of the facts.

On looking over our Quebec and Kent papers, we do not find any proceedings on the part of the Papineau party much more dignified, consistent, cowardly, or rebellious, than we have been accustomed to read of for several years past.

It is not for the firmness, fine tact, and sterling ability shown by Sir John Colborne, the temporary and weak policy of Lord Gosford would probably have suffered the malcontents to push their purpose to extremes long ago. The "row" in Montreal was merely a practical exhibition of sentiments which sooner or later will find vent in actual rebellion. A sort of alarm has been spread on account of those movements among the troops, which the General Commanding in Chief has thought proper to direct for the purpose of counteracting any demonstration which the French origin party might be mad enough to make; but we do not think there is any serious apprehension of this occurring at present; and it may be ultimately prevented by the prudent measures of Her Majesty's Government.

The *Montreal Morning Courier* of the 6th inst. quotes from the *Quebec Mercury* the following observation:—"With regard to the 43d Regiment, should their services be required, a march across the province, is not impracticable either in summer or winter. The gallant Officer who now administers the Government of New Brunswick made the trip, on snow shoes, in 1812-13, when he came out on his appointment to the Staff in Canada."

The *Executive Council.*—People will take the liberty of prying into public acts, and it is said that the wholesome exercise of popular opinion in this Province has been productive of much good. Twelve years ago, to our knowledge; and longer back, by report; a few members of the lower House hazarded the dangerous doctrine that it was unconstitutional for the Judges to sit in Council over the acts of the Assembly in their legislative capacity, when the same council at the same board could resolve it, itself into a privy council, advise the governor to sanction a bill affecting the liberties of the people, and then go down to the bench, construe it under the bias of their political prejudices, and give judgment accordingly. There might have been some obliquity in this doctrine, but in process of time the parent government decided that as their honours the Judges did sit, their successors should not have a place in "His Majesty's Council." The reforming party rejoiced in this decision and exerted in the formation of a legislative Council, although the triumph of intrigue went to paralyze the good intentions of the Government, and for a while kept the lawes and fishes where they should not have been; as for example:

When a substitution for the law was resolved on, and the motion was to be fixed in Council, a high officer drove to the house with red tape for one rein and two or three old garters for the other, with the word "compensation" conspicuously dangling over the back of his high on a piece of thread-bare linen in lieu of a comfortable buff!

Intrigue proved triumphant—a flaw was found in the despatch, and 12 months consideration allowed the fees to be received just as formerly—the type and garters were repaid and His Honor went home in a splendid vehicle with a driver Petre and a footman behind!

Such tricks could not be expected to prevail, and the House Government have now conceded to the country these changes which a few years ago it was next to treason to mention. It will be seen by the various articles we have extracted from the Royal Gazette, that the new Machinery is in operation, and that a complete change has been made in the disposal of the lands and timber. The mode of applying for timber berths and for tracts of land we published in former numbers, and shall continue to add whatever intelligence appears interesting to the Public.

"INTERESTING."—The writer of the communication on our first page who encloses himself behind the parapet of abecedary initials, has thought fit to ridicule our use of the term "interesting" in referring to the account of the dinner given to Mr. Brown, by a number of his constituents, at the house of Tristram Moore Esq. We do not think it was wise in A. B. C. to open his battery on us with one random shot and two flashes in the pan, leaving us unscathed and ready to repel the covered attack. If he thought that in passing through the Standard to assail his nobler foe he was in an enemy's country, it had been better policy to gain permission to advance by conciliation, than to commence all authority by a sneer.

We do not hesitate to maintain that the epithet "interesting" is applicable to the account of the dinner, and in spite of the wit and waggery of A. B. C. we shall assign our reasons for considering it correct.

Mr. Brown's parliamentary career has given satisfaction to a large majority of his constituents, and has gained for him much respect in the Legislature. His abilities have made him known to all parts of the province and his indefatigable industry has been eulogized by his fellow representatives. But "humanum est errare," and Mr. B. has not been exempted from the failings incident to man. Some of his acts have given wide offence, and the unhappy controversy so long carried on in our columns increased the number of his opponents. During that dispute we carefully abstained from interfering as a partisan, but at its close candidly declared our opinion to Mr. B. himself, and we are now free to avow that we thought he laboured under the influence of an error of which he was unconscious. We are of opinion that an honest declaration of a difference of sentiments may be made without apertury and crimination, or imputing sinister and unworthy motives to those whose views we dissent from; but such a consideration was sparingly afforded to Mr. Brown, so that a powerful phalanx was opposed to his success at the late election. It must however be admitted that a majority of the County looked differently at his conduct, and it can hardly be denied that they had a right to act according to the dictates of their reason, and to expect from their opponents a fair appreciation of their motives. It was quite natural that a respectable body of young men should celebrate a triumph achieved by exertions that showed they did not droop like cravens, nor dastardly desert their approved friend, and the account of this celebration we called "interesting." As Mathews used to say—that is all!

Laurens.—On Tuesday last a fine Ship of 723 tons, new measurement, was launched from the building yard of Mr. Isaac Garcelon, head of Oak Bay, with her lower standing rigging, lower masts and top masts all standing. She was built, under Mr. Garcelon's contract, by Mr. David Eastman, for Messrs. Parkinson & Roberts of this place by whom she was named the "QUEEN VICTORIA," the first compliment of the kind to Her Majesty that we have yet observed in the Province.

Also, on Wednesday last from the ship yard of John Wilson Esq. at Chatham, a beautiful Ship built by Messrs. Townsend for Messrs. Edwards & Joseph Wilson of this town, named the "WILSON," her register according to the new mode of measurement being 505 tons. This "Wilson" was launched into the spacious Wet Dock, which forms part of the extensive establishment at Chatham, and afforded an interesting spectacle to a numerous assemblage drawn together to witness this sight amongst such picturesque scenery.

The Spirit of the Times.—There is a kind of conventional understanding existing among the members of almost every craft, that like the secret signs of free masonry, enables them to comprehend each others intentions, and respond to each others desires, in a manner unobtrusive by all the world beside but perfectly understood between themselves. Among the fraternity of the Press a telegraphic communication is established that requires neither system nor code, but merely consists of a flourish of the pen, surpassing that made by corporal Trim's stick, which was worth a thousand of Tristram Shandy's father's most subtle syllogisms; and such a flourish we intend to draw round this article for the especial notice of the *Spirit of the Times*.

A weekly paper under the above title, was projected in New York as an experiment to ascertain whether in the United States sufficient encouragement could be found to sustain a respectable and spirited sheet dedicated to the Sage, the Stable, the Courte, the Field, and the Fine Arts, and it has now reached the seventh volume, with complete success. As a proof of its merits we may mention that it is quoted in Britain by the best prints patronized by the sporting world, and many of its articles highly commended. Every thing connected with the Drama, at home and abroad, which these "of imagination all compact" look for as "a consummation devoutly to be wished," may be found in its columns. The *Gentleman* and the *Jockey* will there meet pleasure and profit in the accounts of pedigree, stud, heats, matches, lists of English and American winning horses and the statistics of the Turf. The *Angler* may hook out bait for his amusement, or fly to the stream of fancy, parake of old Isaac's patience, or enjoy the sun-shiney salmon of Sir Humphry. The *shot* may find prime sport in the wit and fire of sprightly anecdote—"by flood and field," the Editor's aim accidentally being "to shoot folly as it flies." The *Huntsman* will there meet "laughter holding both his sides," and the *Satirist* may obtain ample food to feast his spleen upon, and deal out his sarcasms on the heads of cattle, not so well bred as many to be found in the racing calendar. "Though last not least in our dear love," as grave and pondering politicians, we have to acknowledge our indebtedness to the "Spirit of the Times" for the latest English news, conveyed through its London correspondent in a peculiarly agreeable strain. In short there is hardly any taste which may not, in this racy mélange, meet something suited to its appetite; and although the old saying hold—de gustibus non est disputandum—we can conscientiously say it suits our own, and think that therefore we are warranted in recommending it to others.

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
