OTTAWA. Monday, Feb. 10. It is announced that the Government has lecided to accept Mr. Laurier's motion declaring that no rebate should be allowed on orn imported for use in the manufacture of spirits. As the Liberals would not consent that the liquor industry should be secured in a privilege that was denied to the farming community the Government will take away the millers' advantage in order to find some stronger ground for refusing the rebate to the farmers. The practice of the farmers was to sell peas and with the proceeds buy corn, which is better adapted to feeding horned cattle. Peas sold at from 25c to 30c per bushel more than was paid for the corn per bushel more than was paid for the corn they imported. The duty was imposed on the pretext of protecting the coarse grains of the farmer. They gave the rebate to the distiller and refused it to the farmer, the distiller and refused it to the farmer, and this rebate they will now abolish sooner than give the farmer the advantage to be derived from the free importation of corn for feeding purposes. The Opposition have been unable to prevent extravagant expeen unable to prevent extravagant ex-penditure, the gerrymandering of constitu-encies and the outrage of the Franchise Act, but upon most questions of public policy the Ministers are forced to adopt the views of their Parliamentary opponents.

TORONTO, Feb. 9-11 p.m.—To-night a large high area, accompanied by moderately cold weather, extends from Manitoba to the Maritime Provinces, with the highest pressure north of the Ottawa Valley. The Governor of Ohio, in a special message in April, 1887, said: "The great majority of the personal property of this State is not returned, but entirely and fraudently withheld from taxation. The idea seems largely to prevail that there is injustice and inequality in taxation, and that there is no harm in cheating the State, although to do so a false return must be made and perjury committed." The State of Ohio is not singular in this respect, for the late Mayor of New York, A. S. Hewitt, in his message to the aldermen for 1888, speaking of the assessment of personal property, says: "This tax is notoriously impossible of collection in this city."

Professor R. T. Ely, in his work on "Taxation in American States and Cities," says: "Nearly all Americans who have given the subject of taxation attention, and who can make the slightest claim to be considered authorities, reject the personal property tax as unjust and impracticable."

Then, what is the remedy for this lamentable state of affairs? The facts and the evidence so far seem to be against the assessment of personal property for municipal purposes. We want a system of taxation that will encourage thrift, and that will bear on all classes equally, according to their ability to pay. This system I believe to be the single tax on land values as being the most practical and certain, and sure to be distributed amongst all classes; remembering that the best of all taxes is the least. Yet we know that whenever any business of im-Tupper either finds an excuse to take a trip over to this country or a Minister of the Crown takes a holiday trip over the water. It would be interesting to know just how much work the High Commissioner and his assistants do, and whether they earn their salaries. At present Tupper seems to be the sole judge of the size and expense of his ret-inue of retainers, and until he shows himself to be a little more careful of the public funds-or at least less anxious to appropriate them for his personal uses-we think he should have small say in determining matters of this sort.

above the Dominion Government has passed an Order-in-Council granting \$2,000 to Sir Charles Tupper, it seems to us time that Parliament took a hand and appointed a commission to overhaul the Commissioner and his entire establishment. There is certainly something rotten, or there would not be any secrecy.

THE ONTARIO TOWNSHIP.

To know our own local institutions their early beginnings and growth is to understand our principles of self-government. There are many citizens of Ontario who record their votes yearly with unfailing regularity for aldermen, councilors and ol trustees who have but a very superficial acquaintance with the workings of our municipal and school systems. It is possible to gain a proper understanding of those without grubbing down into their roots and tracing every step in their development; but whoever desires to know them in the relation of all their parts, and the reasons for their being, must study them from the bottom upwards. How is this knowledge to be gained? To what source can we go for it? Who has made a sufficient study of it to be accepted as an authority? portance to municipal institutions among students of political science as they never before possessed, on this con-tinent at least. And now we see a beginaing of study along the same lines in Toronto University. The gifted professor of political economy there, Prof. W. J. Ashloy, M.A., is already making himself known as a very earnest student of our local institutions. He is acquiring the reputation of a political scientist who works his way down to the roots of things, and in the short time since his arrival in Canada it is pretty safe to say that he has gained a more exact knowledge of the workings of our institutions than all the English and Scotch professors before him put together. And what is of much greater consequence, he is inspiring his students with his own enthusiasm, one striking proof of which we have in a monogram just published on the Ontario township. The writer is a Middlesex boy, Mr. J. M. McEvoy, and his paper is an admirable account of the growth of our township system of government as illustrated by the history our Middlesex municipalities-Westminster and Caradoc in particular. The genesis of the undertaking is thus told by Prof. Ashley in an introduction:

"In working with my class at Canadian Constitutional History, I became aware that one of my pupils, Mr. J. M. McEvoy, possessed a more than usual knowledge of the practical working of the township system; and that the occupation of township offices by his father and grandfather during a long period of years had given him, as it were, an hereditary interest in the subject. I suggested that it might be useful if he would attempt to sketch the history and working of the township system in the district he knew best, as a contribution to the early history of Ontario, as a help to the solution of the difficulties yet remaining in local self-government, and as an indication to those outside of Canada, interested in popular self-government, of a system of administration in some of its features altogether unique. Mr. McEvoy spent his vacation in perusing the early documents of the old London district, in consulting venerable seniors who could tell him of the state of things 50 or 60 years ago, and in the study of the statute book; and the result is now laid before the reader.

1. Local government under quarter ses sions and town meetings.

2. Local government under district coun-

3. The present system 4. The township officials and their duties.

5. The County Council and its relation to

In the introduction he gives an interesting account of the early practice in laying out townships for settlement, under the rules of 1788 and subsequently. The surveying included the fixing of metes and bounds for each township, its division into concessions and lots, and the registering of a plan with the Surveyor-General for the Province. The whole township was divided into strips three-quarters of a mile to a mile in breadth, separated from one another by the conceson roads four rods wide, after which the usually containing 200 acres each. At a later date additional roads were surveyed across the township at right angles to the concessions, at intervals of one and a half to three miles, but instead of being numbered they assumed the number of the lot at which they crossed the township. At first there were only five surveyors in the Province, but these were unequal to the task of laying out the country as fast as it was wanted by settlers, and consequently many fixed the locality of their future homes themselves. Then, Mr. McEvoy says:

"As time went on there was an increase were appointed in each district. Three men were in constant correspondence with the Government, and whenever they saw from the influx of immigrants or the increase of population that the surveying of a new township would be profitable they would acquaint the Lands Department with the fact and secure the right to survey it, receiving as remuneration for their labor a percentage of the acres surveyed or a money payment. In some places large tracts of the best land were taken up by them, and their families still enjoy the fruits of their foresight. It would seem that at first professional men only were employed, but later, intelligent men without special training applied them-selves to the work and became tolerably proficient in it. In some parts of the district, however, immense tracts of land were put into the hands of single individuals who made profitable disposal of it to settlers, laying it out in townships as they Colonel Talbot receiving, for ex ample, 131,130 acres in London district, and 171,200 acres in the Western, in lieu of a pension."


