The Mayor of Chicago Murdered in His Own Home.

Carter Harrison the Victim of Crazy Crank.

The Assatsin Surrenders Himself to the Police—Last Hours of the Victim —His Prespective Marriage— Biographical Eketch.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Another crazy crank has done his deadly work, and Carter Harrison, five times mayor of Chicago, and cose of the best known men in the west, lies dead in his home, 231 South Ashland Boulevard. Three bullets entered his body, two of them making wounds sufficient to cause death. The murder was committed by Eugene Patrick Prendergast, a paper carrier, who declared that Mayor Harrison had promised to make him corporation counsel and had not kept his word. This he said was his only reason for committing the crime. The only person in the house at the time beside Mr. Harrison was his son, William Preston Harrison, 25 years of age, and the servants. Shortly before 8 o'clock the door bell rang, and when Mary Hansen, the domestic, opened the door, she was confronted by a man about five feet five inches, smoothessayen, his rather clean-cut features lit up by a pair of dark eyes. Hearing the man ask for him he rose and, stepping into the hall, walked toward Prendergast, who, by the time he caught sight of Mr. Harrison, had advanced abent ten feet from the doorway. Without saying a word, Prendergast drew his revolver and commenced to fire. He pulled the trigger but three times and every bullet hit the mark. One ball shattered Mr. Harrison's left hand, another passed into the right side of the abdomen, making a wound that would have been mortal in a few days; the third bullet entered the chest, slightly above the heart. This bullet chest, slightly above the heart. This bullet was the immediate cause of death.

As soon as Prendergast began to fire Mr. larrison turned and walked rapidly toward Harrison turned and walked rapidly toward the dining-room. He walked through the door, across the dining-room, and passed into a butler's pantry opening off the room, where, weakened by the loss of blood, he fell to the floor.

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ESCAPE OF THE ASSASSIN.

Prendergast did not follow up his victim or make any attempt to ascertain how deadly his aim had been. He replaced his revolver in his pocket with the same deliberation that had marked all his actions and started towards the door. Just as he was passing through the doorway William Preston Harrison, the mayor's son, came tearing down the stairs from the upper portion of the house just as Mr. Harrison's coachman ran into the rear end of the hall. The cries of Mary Hausen directed the son to where his father lay, but the coachman was after other game. He had a revolver of hislown and as quickly as he realized what was after other game. About ten minutes to S o'clock the assassin left his post of observation and gained admission to Harrison's house as already described. The only warning of death received by Mr. Harrison was the gleam of a revolver as Prendergast pulled it out of his pocket and fired the fatal shots.

The INQUEST.

The verdict of the coroner's jury recommended that Prendergast be held for the murder until discharged by process of law. The report of the examination made by Dr. Mitchell says: "I found five wound openings on the body such are usually made by bullets. Number one passed through the left hand, breaking the bone of the little finger and came out in the palm, forming wound number two. Number three passed once through the bowels and lodged in the muscles of the back. Here a bullet was found. Number four wound passed through the tenth rib and liver and a bullet was found in the bowels. Number five wound was just below the front right shoulder, and passed down under the skin about four inches. Here a third bullet was

Carter H. Harrison was born near Lexington, Ky., Feb. 15, 1825. His greatgreat-grandfather was father of Benjamin, who was father of President William Henry Harrison. His grandfather was ladarson and he who was father of President William Henry Harrison. His grandither was first cousin to Thomas Jefferson, and he himself was cousin of John C. Breckin-ridge and Benjamin Harrison. By the death of his father he was left, when 8 years old, to the care of his mother, who was daughter of Col. William Russell, of the United States army, and a northwestern pioneer. Dr. Lewis Marshall, brother of the chief justice, prepared him for Yale, where he graduated in 1845. After graduating at Transylvania in law and traveling two years abroad he came to Chicago in 1855, invested in real estate and became weelthy. He was commissioner of Cook county from 1871 to 1874, when he went to Congress, serving two terms. He ent to Congress, serving two terms. He tracted attention during the Hayes-iden contest, introduced a resolution for ears presidential term, and making exdents eligible for one term only, but ors for life. He was elected mayor picago in 1879, 1881, 1882, 1885 and In 1884 he was the Democratic canagainst Oglesby for governor of and the same year delegate-at-the national convention that nomi-

Died on Duty.

Tragic Death of a Noted London Detective.

B. B. Allan Shot Dead at Long

Point, Norfolk, Whither He Had Gone to Look After Poachers.

Mysterious Circumstances Sarrounding the Sad Affair - A Warning-Pre-sentiment of Trouble-Sketch of the Officer's Li.e.

A year ago this month Detective Phair was slain in the discharge of duty. On Saturday Detective B. B. Allan, of this city, met his death, whether under similar roumstances it is at present hard to say. Chief Williams was the first to receive

ciry, met his death, whether under shared circumstances it is at present hard to say. Chief Williams was the first to receive the news. It came by telegraph, and the message was dated from Simcoc, Ont., the county town of Norfolk. From what has been canred, Mr. Allan's death may have been caused by the accidental discharge of the gun which he is supposed to have been carrying at the time, and in another tespect the affair has the appearance of a murder. This doubt will likely be cleared up at the inquest.

UNE TO CAME ABOUT.

Mr. Allan, though a member of the county constabulary, was very often engaged in private cases. At the time of his death he was working in the interests of a party of wealthy Englishmen on the Island of Long Point, Lake Erie, a few miles from the shore of Norfolk county. This island is, under the statutes of Ontario, included as part of the county. The entire island, with the exception of 82 acres, is owned by a party of English sportsmen, who visit this country every year during the deer season. These gentlemen had been, for some time past, stocking the island, or their portion of it, with deer. The huntsmen commonced the season's sport. Latterly, however, occupants of the 82 acres were suspected of poaching on the rest of the island and shooting the game. To prevent this Allan was engaged by the Englishmen to protect their interests. The game season having opened, and Allan not arriving, a letter was addressed to him in this city, offering him good remuneration and urging him to come right away, Accordingly he left on Oct. 20, taking with

Accordingly he left on Oot, 20, taking with him a months' supplies, a gun and everything necessary to the equipment of a sportsman. With professional caution and to conceal his identity, he purchased a pair of high boots, a hunting cap and a heavy flannel hunting shirt. It was his intention to go among the occupants of the smaller portion and discover, if possible, if any poaching was being done. Whether the tragedy occurred on this section or not is as yet unknown.

Last Friday morning Allan shouldered his gun and went out for a day's work. After he had left the cottage some time two shots were heard. As soon as the report reached their ears two men named Price and Bennett turned in the direction and after a few minutes' travel a ghastly sight not their gaze. Lying at full length on the ground before them was the unfortunate detective. His forehead was badly burned, and between the eyes was an ugly wound. From all appearances the weapon had been rey close to his head. Beside him was a gun—a double-barreled one—with one barrel empty. A few yards further away was a deer, which had been shot and its throat cut. The latter is usual among sportsmen, as it allows the blood to pass and preserves the meat.

The detective's body was taken to Simcos

and identified. Just how the shooting occurred is not at present clear. The fact of only one barrel of the gun being empty, of two shots being heard and of a deer of two shots being heard and of a deer lying a few yards away are very puzzling. Immediately on hearing that Mr. Allan had been shot, Mr. P. McPhillips, hear rister, of this city, telephoned to Simcoe, and obtained the above fatts from Mesars. WARNED NOT TO GO.

In all of his county work Mr. Allan was under the supervision of High Constable Schram. Signifying his intention of going for a month to Long Point, Allan was warned by the former not to go. Being a fearless officer in the performance of his duty, Mr. Allan decided to risk it, and before going went to the high constable to bid him goodbye.

"Well, Ben, are you going?" was asked.

"Yes, I am going," was the reply.
"Before you go, then," said Mr. Schram,
"I would advise you to get your life insured and secure as much insurance as possible."

Mr. Allan laughed at this and departed. He returned again in hunting outfit and again bade his chief farewell. Mr. Schram again warned him not to go and said he did not expect to see him alive again. There

The grocery business engaged his attention for some time. He was in partnership with his brother-in-law, Mr. Edwards, son of Squire Edwards, of East London. After abandoning this business, about fourteen years ago, he joined the detective force of the county. Many important cases were worked up by him, and he was looked upon by all as a shrewd and faithful officer. He spent considerable time in the United States on detective business, and sometimes had to travel as far as lowavisit, but returned and took up his resiand sometimes had to travel as far as Iowa. At the time of his death Mr. Allan was At the time of his death Mr. Allan was deputy game warden for Middlesex, receiving the appointment from Mr. A. D. Stewart, of Hamilton, Provincial game commissioner. He was also county constable for Middlesex, Eigin and Huron. About seventeen years ago he married Miss Edwards, daughter of Squire Edwards, of East London. Two children are left—a boy about 15 years and a bright little girl about 8 years of age.

The news was broken as gently as possible to Mrs. Allan by a friend and she was completely prostrated. Orders were sent to bring the body home to-day.

The inquest into the death of Mr. Allan was started on Saturday night, but was postponed till to-day to allow of some evidence being secured from Port Rowan.

SHOT A BOGUS GHOST.

QUARTER OF A MILLION.

Attendance at the World's Fair Friday

Assured—Theftr.

World's Fair Grounds, Chicago, Oct.
28.—Director Ellisworth, of the exposition, said yesterday that Marshall Field, the drygoods prince of Chicago, had given \$1,000,000 to the Columbian memorial museum under certain conditions. One hundred thousand dollars of the additional cash fund has already been subscribed by George M. Pullman, the palace car magnate, and the directors who have interested themselves in the museum are confident that the remainder, \$400,000, will be raised in a few days.

-The enthusiasts who have been boom ing the Huron and Ontario Ship Canal scheme, which it was alleged would carry Northwest lake traffic to the seaboard by way of the Georgian Bay and a short cut to Toronto, and render the Welland Canal next to useless except for local business, have received many rebuffs in recent weeks, but none more withering than that extended to them by Mr. Keefer, C. E., who says that the scheme contemplates having a summit level cut about ten miles in length of continuous cutting, averaging 90 feet, and being nearly 200 feet in depth at the deepest place. Without taking into account other questions, adds Mr. Keefer, this cutting alone stamps the whole enterprise as commercially im practicable. Engineers know the danger of encountering slides in the material, and in some cases a tendency in the cutting to close in on both sides and destroy all the work that has been accomplished. Mr.

Keefer continues:

"For the summit level cutting of the Huron and Ontario Canal, with the certainty of trouble from water, and very possibly quicksand, the difficulties and amount of money required for the execution of the work would be simply impossible to estimate. The only parallel for this summit level cut is to be found on the abandoned Panama Canal, where the Culebra cut, intended to be about the same length and depth, stands partly excavated to not Keefer continues: cut, intended to be about the same length and depth, stands partly excavated to not more than half its depth. This cut obliged some of the wealthiest and most experienced European firms of contractors to succumb before its difficulties, and was probably one of the chief factors in the failure of the whole enterprise, a failure so disastrous, that while only about one-third of the excavation of the whole canal, 47 miles in length, was completed, obligations amounting to several hundred millions of dollars have been incurred."

It is an inspiration to read an address by Sir Edwin Arnold. There are no gloomy torebodings, no fearful borrowing of trouble In the make-up of this distinguished Englishman. He is convinced that life is worth living, and that to the man who lives

"I return to Birmingham just as con-princed of what can never be proved as when left it. I have found life in the highest legree charming and interesting, and this notwithstanding an ample share of what

I quitted Birmingham in the pleasant beginning of my days, glad to live; I come back to it, after much experience and many labors, glad to have lived—well satisfied with my share in the world, and a resolute philosophical opponent of those who love dismal dialectics and draps the universe in the black hangings of pessimism. If there have been ages in which because it did not know much—our race had good reason not dismal dialectics and draps the universe in the black hangings of pessimism. If there have been ages in which because it did not know much—our race had good reason not to bope nuch—the time seems to me to be now arrived when the despair which has been so fashionable grows foolish as well as needless. From the lowest point of view hope is very cheap and gladness is a sovereign medicine. Consider the social, moral and individual advantages of a cheerful view of life contrasted with the cheerless view. Sunshine has not a stronger effect in developing the beauty of flowers and the form of leaves than radiance of mind and lightness of heart in bringing forth all which is best in men and women. We have partly found this out as regards children, and society conspires pretty generally nowadays to render their early years happy. The Japanese knew that high duty 2,000 years age, and possess in consequence the best-mannered and mostljoyous little ones in the world. But why stop at childhood? There is nothing better than to be happy; joy is the real root of morality, no virtue is worth praising which does not spring from minds contented and convinced and free of dread and gloom. Upon the face of facts is life, even were it transient, so bad a thing as some people make out? Look at common modern existence as we see it, and note to what rich elaboration and large 'degrees of comfort it has come. I leave aside for the momentuncivilized nations and the bygone struggles of our race. I invite you briefly to contemplate an artisan's existence in your own Birmingham. Let alone the greatness of being an Englishman and the safety and liberty of his daily life, what king of old records ever fared so royally? Yet that justly famous expositor of science, in his Romanes lecture at Oxford, arraigned the cosmos for immorality and declared that 'the ethical progress of society depends not on imitating the cosmic process, but on combating it.' How was it nossible that so luminous a mind could overlook the fact that the ethical faculty and the ethical ideal, which he contrasted with the course of nature, have likewise come, by evolution, forth from the cosmic process, just as much as those things that shock him in the natural world. The cosmic process is not immoral, not even cruel. 
