When Shadow Started.

The first perceptible darkening was noticed at 9:48, when a shadow began to steal over the edges of the bright circle. From that time the black covering was seen to increase in size unby 11:13 o'clock ninety-two-onehundredths of the moon was hidden. Only a narrow strip of the lower part the disc was visible at that time, its shape being that of flat-end crescent whose horns pointed upwards

London, March 12 .- May Richardson. the militant suffragette, who on Tuesday hacked the celebrated Velasquez picture known as the "Rokeby Venus" in the National Gallery, was today sentenced to six months' imprisonment for her crime. The public prosecutor, in addressing the jury on behalf of the Government,

said that one might well doubt whether the prisoner was in her right senses. There was, however, no medical evidence to show that she was a person not responsible for her actions. Miss Richardson, who had been on 'hunger strike' since her arrest, pleading guilty to the charge, said it had been

Owner Is Unable to Give Any Explanation of the

Mystery.

Whether fate, firebugs, "spooks" or acaused the mysterious blazes at 159 Albert street they have succeeded in driving the family of Charles Adams, the occupant, to distraction. This morning the fifth of the mysterious fires that have visited the house during the past two weeks was discovered in a clothes closet on the second

Two weeks ago, when the second alarm was turned in to fire headquarters from the same house, it was regarded as a coincidence When the third and fourth fires occurred on Tuesday night it became more than a coincidence. It became a mystery that has puzzled the Adams, the police and the fire department alike. When the fifth fire was discovered this norning it served to not only deepen the mystery that has enshrouded the other fires but to drive the occupants of the house into almost hysterics. Detectives are now working on the case.

Most Mysterious. This morning's fire was even more mysterious in its origin than the preceding nes. It was discovered in a closet on the second floor, and had got a good start before the brigade arrived. Mr. Adams was summoned from his work by tele-phone, and found the firemen at work trying to locate the source of the fire. Most of the smoke was in the attic, but after a time the fire was found in the small closet on the second floor.

There are no electric wires or anything that could cause fire in the closet, and the natural inference is that it was deliberately set. Happily, the damage was

small.

Puzzled Over Entry.

How a person could enter the house in road daylight and make his way to the second floor without being observed is what is causing Mr. Adams the greatest perplexity. He is satisfied that nobody in his own household would be guilty of the act. The servant girl had been given strict injunctions to let nobody enter the

"I locked the door myself when I went out this morning," Mr. Adams stated, "and I don't see how anybody could get Agent Only One Suspected.

So far there is only one person whom any suspicion attaches, and the evidence connecting him with the occur-

rences are slight. One day about two weeks ago, an agent selling a new household fixture was away. He endeavored to sell one of his appliances to the servant girl, but she refused to buy.

He went away and returned next day insisting that he had left one of the articles with the girl the day before and demanding that he receive it back or else be paid the price of the fixture. He became abusive, and finally Mrs. Adams threatened to call the police, whersupon he departed. He was seen by one of the family a day or so later, passing in the vicinity of the house, but nothing was thought of it.

Mr. Adams does not think he responsible for the fires, but he is the only one with whom there has been any unpleasantness, and who might cherish a desire for revenge.

BIG FIGHT ON IN COURTS OVER ISLAND IN LAKE ERIE

[Special to The Advertiser.] Windsor, March 11.—Fight for a dot of land in Lake Erie, the southernmost possession of Canada, will be made in the assize court, in Sandwich, before Justice Middleton, on March 24.

A suit filed by John Napress, of Detroit, against W. R. Goodchild, of Amherstburg, for the possession of the Little Sister Island, has revealed that the island is virtually an independent possession of Great Britain.

James Ross, now dead, was the first owner of the island, which is little more than a danger point for ships on Lake Erie. He gave it to Napress, who, 45 years ago, is declared to have sold it to Goodchild. Since that time, Goodchild's fishing crews have been the sole inhabitants.

Discovery of a mineral, the nature of which is being kept secret by those in the case, is the cause of the present suit. Goodchild has no bill of sale, but will depend upon a verbal agreement to sell and the fact that he has held undisturbed possession for 45 years.

RECORD PEACH CROP IS EXPECTED AT THEDFORD

PARTISAN INVESTIGATIONS. THILE it is quite proper that all charges against public officials and all suspicious circumstances connected with public affairs, should be carefully investigated, the truth ascertained, and the guilty punished, yet it may be a question how far justice is promoted by placing the inquiry in the hands of a partisan commission. The judge who tries an accused person is supposed to be impartial; he is not the prosecutor; his only object is to ascertain the truth, no matter who suffers. A commission is, of course, not altogether in the place of a judge, for it cannot decide, or punish. It is only to secure evidence. But a partisan commission is naturally biased. It is tempted to prove the accused innocent or to prove him guilty, according as either result will benefit its own political friends, and injure its oppon-

We have had some illustrations lately. The Government desired to damage the Liberal party in connection with the building of the National Transcontinental Railway. It appointed as a commission of inquiry a Conservative lawyer of the most partisan type, and one of its own officials who had been borrowed from a rival railroad company. The only item of expenditure in over a hundred millions of dollars to which the color of graft could be given was one of about \$7,000 paid for a lease for which the commissioners say proper value was not given. And that after all is only a matter of opin-But by disregarding the policy of the late Government, indorsed by Parliament to build a first-class road, they have been able to show that millions could have been saved had a cheaper road been built. Were that fact fairly and truthfully stated, no harm would be done. That a second-class road could be built for much less money than a firstclass road is a self-evident proposition. But the report is so drawn up, and the figures so presented, that to a casual ob-

server there is an appearance of wasteful expenditure on the part of the late Government. The report is a campaign ecument, pure and simple, but one that is calculated to injure the reputation of Canada. The facts stated might all be correct, but they are stated in such a manner that a wrong impression can be given. Such a report is manifestly un-

Another case is that of the Trent Canal Conservative member of the Local Legislature is appointed to investigate certain charges. That he is prejudiced against the Liberal party is not to his discredit. That he should be chiefly interested in finding evidence of wrongdoing is only natural. But he is in a false position. He is a prosecuting attorney acting in a judicial capacity. Now he resents a report condemning certain Government employees. In so far as the evidence justifies this report he is quite correct in his action. But it was not necessary to drag in hearsay evidence reflecting on prominent Liberals, who and no opportunity to defend themselves.

Wherever a commission, whether partian or not, finds wrong-doing in public affairs, it is its bounden duty to so report, and it is equally the duty of those in authority to punish the guilty. We are not objecting to the fullest inquiry into all the actions of any Liberal dovernment. And where offenses have been discovered, we are not disposed to shield the guilty, or save them from punshment. But we dislike partisan investigations whose chief object seems to be the providing of campaign literature at the public expense.

Savory Bean Soup.

One cup of white beans, 2 large enions 1 quart of water, butter size of an egg pepper and salt, 1 tablespoon of flour. Soak the beans in cold water over

night. Next morning cook them with the enions and water until quite tender, adding more water as that in the saucepan boils away. Press through a sieve so as to keep back the skins of the beans. Return all to the saucepan and bring the soup to boiling point. Bind by stirring in the butter and flour, which have been rubbed smoothly together. Season rathor highly and serve very hot.

Potato and Onion Soup. Four large potatoes, 4 onions, water, 2 tablespoons of flour, 2 tablespoons of but-

ter, 1 pint of milk, 1 tablespoon of chop-Cook the potatoes and onions together in enough water to fully cover them. When quite tender, pass them through a sieve. Reserve the water in which they were cooked and add it to them while pressing through the sieve; so as to help sage and seasonings. Fill the cavities in the process. Blend the butter and flour the onions with this mixture; put a piece together smoothly and add the milk. Stir until boiling and add the potato and three-quarters of an hour, basting with
