London, Oct. 10.-5:10 a.m.-An official message from Berlin states that Antwerp has fallen, according to a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam.

TAKEN IN FORENOON. (Canadian Press.)

London, Oct. 10.—11:32 a.m.—The official announcement of the fall of Antwerp, given out at German general headquarters late last night, and transmitted here via Marconi wireless, says: "This forenoon several forts of the inner line of the fortifications of Antwerp have fallen. The town since midday has been in our possession.

"The commander and the garrison evacuated the fortifications. Only a few forts are still occupied by the enemy, and this is without influence on our position in Antwerp."

French infantry occupying the town of Lille and its surroundings. Savage fighting was continual in the streets and suburbs until Monday morning, when the enemy was finally repulsed. Terrible Havoc.

"On Tuesday a fight occurred between the French and a big army stretched along the whole eastern, northern and northwestern suburbs of Lille.

The battle raged all day long, and well into the night, and the French guns wrought terrible havoc. The German infantry fire was ineffective, and the battle ended with the complete rout of the enemy, and the German army at Armentieres, which had been intended to cover the flank of the main body advancing on Lille and Arras, was driven back thirteen miles.

Again Beaten. "The following day the Germans gradually retired east and north, and today I hear they have been driven back to the northeast of Lens, with GOES WITH HIS FATHER heavy losses.



At the time the bullion was seized it was claimed that it was secretly being sent out of the country in violation of the law prohibiting such exportation. The silver, valued at \$2,000,000, was held in the Government vaults until awnership was established.

RESIGNATION ACCEPTED.

OTTAWA, Oct. 9. — The Anglican House of Bishops, in session here, tolay accepted the resignation of Arch bishop Hamilton, of Ottawa, both as head of the Ottawa Diocese and metro-politan of Canada. The Bishop of Algoma presided, and the resignation was eccepted only after the archbishop had firmly declined to reconsider. The retirement will take place on Oct. 18, and successor will be appointed a month

GERMANS WANT NO ENEMY IN BELGIUN

Why Assault On Antwerp Was Begun-First Tried Argument.

LONDON, Oct. 10. - 3:40 a.m.-The correspondent of the Post at Antwerp, in describing the events leading up to the present situation at Antwerp, says: "About a month ago the German

commanders began to realize the danger of the Belgian army occupying a fortified position, which continually threatened the German lines of communication. The Germans threw out feelers to ascertain if Belgium would agree to keep her army in Antwerp in return for the German promise not to attack the

"The Belgians indignantly rejected all such proposals, and replied by gallant sorties, which, how-ever, failed of complete success. The taking of Alost renewed the German conviction of the necessity for an aggressive campaign against the Belgians, which began after further German proposals for agreement were rejected by the

To Wreck Morale of Garrison. "Accordingly the Germans brought up some of their heaviest field pieces, and opened with the bom-bardment of Malines. For a week afterwards the Germans each day bombarded some open town outside of Antwerp, with the idea that the fleeing civil population from the vil-

lages would wreck the morale of the Antwerp garrison.

"There is no question but this policy had its effect, and if the final event proves that Antwerp has decided not to endure the horrors of a bombardment, no one can utter a word of censure. These streams of refugees are enough to break down the most heroic resolution, especially as their clvic government is kept constantly engaged finding food for the incoming horde.


Shells Always Destructive.
On Tuesday Fort Wavre-St. Catharines was put out of action. Later on the same day Fort Waelhem was damaged and became ineffective. Whatever the German shells struck they destroyed. On Thursday a Zeppelin attack on Antiwerp failed, for the vessel was severely punished by the Belgians. "By this time at least 50,000 refugees were in Antwerp.

"Thursday evening the German infantry attacked Lierre, Duffel and Termonde, only the Duffel attack being successful. Up to this time confidence had been good, but it now began to waver.

"Friday the bombardment of Lierre continued good, and the authorities began to consider the possibility of Antwerp being occupied by the enemy. On Sunday the German attack seemed to be slackening in its intensity. "On Monday the German artillery

made a furious attack on Lierre, and the city council urged the Government to continue the defence of the city without interruption to public interests. On Thursday there were further attacks on Lierre and at one point the Germans got a handful of men across the river by swimming, but they only came over to be killed. The German artillery attack was rather diffused,
