Although But 250 Guests Were Present-What the Bride and Bridesmaids Wore.

New York, Nov. 10.-Fifth avenue, in the vicinity of the church, was the before and leled at any of the previous great weddings in New York. Paris, Nov. 10. - The French Government has recognized the de facto government of the Republic of Panama. The instructions forwarded by Foreign Minister Delcasse to the French consul at Panama authorizes him to leave relations with the new Government to the United States consul at Panama. The instructions sent to the French consul will have the effect of giving the same recognition of the new regime as the United States has already given. A formal recognition will follow later, when the new Government is fully organized; but the instructions of the consul definitely establish the attitude of France toward the new republic. 



Says It Is Loyal But Decidedly Anti-Imperialistic.

Mr. Bourassa pleaded for the broad British sense of justice in ception of things relating to Canada. breadth was necessary in the founding of a nation such as he conceived Canada was destined to become It was a nation of two races. This made the amalgamation more difficult but none the less certain. In judging French-Canadian he conceived there were two schools among the other element in the Dominion—one that gave them credit for having contributed in a measure to British dom-ination in this part of America, and the other according the race little place in the history of Canada-mak.

There were four facts not to be lost sight of in analyzing the situation as the speaker viewed it. One, that the French-Canadian is not an inferior race; two, that they are a race by theirselves; three, though united they are a different race; four, that they are anti-Imperial, but still Canadians. With this division he plunged into his subject, first insisting that though anti-Imperial, the French element in Canada was not anti-Entish. He thought his race had played well its part in the sturdy development of Canada. Turning over the pages of history, he asked his audience to remember that the present French element in Canada and the United States developed from some sixty thousand peasants whose blood had not been replenished from the other side in 150 years. The present progress he consicered splendid under the circum-

Mr. Bourassa thought there was mixed sentiment among the French-Canadians toward the British-half o' admiration and half of distrust. On the subject of contributing to

imperial defense, Mr. Bourassa thought in constructing great railroad systems improving the waterways and the appreach to the ocean the country had contributed at the rate of about \$10,-000,000 annually to the imperial defense. At the same time the country had been developed substantially. He thought one young French-Caradian who helped develop the trade, the substantial interests of Canada, was worth a dozen men who wore long swords; tinsel and gold braid and went camping once a year at the expense of the country. It was not to the advantage of the best in the nation to develop a spirit of militarism, nor desirable for the youth of the country to be taught that it was the destiny of the nation to run around over the globe provoking quarrels with other nations.

He thought Canadians best qualified to say what was best for Canada: British to determine what was best for England: Australia in the best position to decide what is best for that country. In military matters he was sure they would oppose any con-tributions not strictly for the defense of Canada. With the English Canadians he thought these questions those of sentiment, but with the French element they were those of reason, purely He could not see that flags, tinsel and music were necessary attributes to genuine patriotism. French-Canadians he confessed, were provincial in their patriotism, and if the feeling wa broadened he feared it would be weak ened, but there was common attachment to the country, to the flag and to the crown. In closing Mr. Bourassa declared he was not ashanied of the charge that stirred up the national sentiment of the race he represented. 




