The Meat Strike.

The present strike in the packing industry is teaching the United States Already the prices of beef and pork in the large cities have risen from 3 to 5 cent per pound. The prices of other meats will go up correspondingly if the strike is not soon settled. People will turn to other food products, and the increased demand will make these dearer also. In the villages and towns the pinch may not be felt severely, as meat is walking around in the neighboring farms and pastures; but the great cities get the largest portion of their meat supplies direct from the packing houses. The packers have a perfect system of distribution, and in the hot season, by means of refrigerator cars, keep millions supplied daily with fresh meat. The large cities in this way live almost from hand to mouth. The strike is confined to what is known as the packing combine, but the combine embraces the largest houses in the United States and controls so much of the meat production of the country that it regulates the price of cattle and of meat. It squeezes the farmer and grazier at one end, and the public at the other. The prices of meat have sharply advanced during the past two or three years, but the ranchers of the south and west claim they have not shared the increase. It has been absorbed by the packers as extra profits squeezed out of the consumers. The feeling among the ranchers is so strong that they talk of forming an independent political party, and running a cow-

The latest reports indicate that the packers and strikers are further apart than ever. Pending arbitration, the packers agree to take back all the strikers they have room but will not discharge the men taken on to fill their places. The strikers insist that they shall be all taken back.
