FROM SUFFERING TO HEALTH

The Experience of a Well-Known Bruce County Farmer.

It is the story of the illness that afflicted him, the suffering he endured and how he found Release—Other Sufferers May Take Hope From His Release.

From the Temperance News. Of all the ills that flesh is heir to, perhaps none causes the sufferer keener anguish, and few are more persistent and more difficult to eradicate from the system than that nervous disease known as sciatica.

It is surprising how nearly united in opinion judges are as to the proportion of crime due to liquor, considered as it is by the experience of countries where statistics on this subject have been tabulated.

Take two illustrations from Boston, Mass. In November, 1872, at the time of the great fire, the order was given by the city to close the saloons.
