ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Directors present this their thirty-seventh annual report of the affairs of the Hospital for the year ending 30th September, 1887.

The amount received during the year from all sources is as fo-

The total amount expended during the year for supplies, viz:—meat, bread, vegetables, milk, groceries, drugs, salaries and wages, fuel, &c., was \$9,864.95.

The number of patients admitted during the year was 339, and the number of outdoor patients who received medical treatment was 985. The number of days spent in the Hospital by patients was 18,257. The total cost of maintenance for each patient was 54.338 cents per day.

The actual average cost per day for sustentation and medical supplies was for each patient 20.092 cents.

As shown by the list of contributions, the Hospital continues not only to hold its own, but to gain in favour with the general public as the years go by. To the several outlying municipalities which have adopted the excellent system of appropriating a specific sum annually for the benefit of the Hospital, another has been added, viz:—the town of

Carleton Place. It is sincerely to be hoped that this system, so well calculated to inspire confidence in the management, that they have at their command an almost assured source of income, will be adopted and continued by other municipalities similarly situated.

Several improvements and repairs have been made during the past summer. The sheds for sheltering the horses of visitors and the medical staff have been enlarged; a new fence has been made in front of the Hospital for infectious diseases, and these, together with the outside woodwork of both buildings, have been repainted.

Although, in addition to necessary and current expenditure for maintenance, these various improvements have involved a large outlay, they are glad to be able to state that the year closes with a balance on hand, which, together with what may be expected to be received during the ensuing two or three months, they hope will be sufficient to meet ordinary expenses until the next regular yearly collections have begun to come in.

They are pleased to record the fact that there has not been a case of small-pox during the past year, and that there have been only some dozen cases of diphtheria and scarlet fever, very few of which terminated fatally.

Death has again visited the ranks of the life directors. No fewer than five of whom died during the past year, viz:—George May, David Moore, Thomas McKay, Philip Thompson, and William Main. In the death of Mr. May (for many years its vice-president) the Hospital suffered a great loss. At all times and in all places, in business or on pleasure, among friends or strangers, he never neglected an opportunity to present its needs and advocate its claims. Well acquainted with all its wants, a generous contributer himself, he was able to inspire in others a spirit of generous liberality which produced many a valuable contribution.

Mr. John Rochester, for many years member for the County in the Dominion Parliament, was in January last elected to fill the vice-presidency made vacant by the death of Mr. May.

Mr. James C. Bruce, of Almonte, has been placed on the list of life directors; and it is hoped that others will be added to fill the places of those who have passed away.

The Directors desire to acknowledge the receipt of a bequest of \$80.00, made by the late Sarah Kennedy, of Cumberland, Ontario, through her administrator, Mr. L. Jackson.

The Directors, on behalf of the Hospital, tender their thanks to the attending and consulting physicians for their continued attendance and care.

To the Municipalities of the City of Ottawa, the Counties of Carleton and Lanark, and the towns of Perth and Carleton Place for liberal grants.

To the firm of S. Rogers & Son for their customary donation of their receipted account for undertaking during the year.

To the auditors, Messrs. Lindsay and Kenny, for auditing the accounts.

To the proprietors of the city newspapers for acknowledging the receipt of contributions from time to time, and for daily issues of each supplied for the use of the inmates.

To the clergymen of the various churches, the Young Men's Christian Association, and all other visitors for their attendance and kindly ministrations; and especially to the young ladies of the floral mission for flowers supplied to decorate and cheer the wards and sick rooms.

To the gentlemen who have so cheerfully given their assistance in collecting funds for the benefit of the Hospital; and to the many and ever increasing number of its friends who have responded with such generous alacrity whenever called upon.

No change of any importance has occurred in the personnel of the staff during the year. The house surgeon, the matron, and all others connected with the institution, continue to discharge their several duties satisfactorily and well.

The Directors, in conclusion, desire to thank all the friends and well-wishers of the Hospital near and far; and to say that they feel its continued prosperity is assured if all contributors will, when time and opportunity permits, visit the Hospital and see for themselves.

All of which is respectfully submitted.
