Public Positions Must Go to Returned Soldiers Who Have Given Their Service to Their Country.

Technical Training for Re urned So'diers

OTTAWA, Feb. 9-Parliament is more than willing to give our returned soldiers the preference in appointments to the civil service, and to that extent the ordinary office-seeker must take a back seat. The chances that when the war is over, the civil service, and to that extent the ordinary office-seeker must take a back seat. The chances that when the war is over, and indeed before its conclusion, the young man or middle-aged who wants a government job will have a poor chance of getting it, if there a man around who is at all fit for the work and who responded when the call came for service at the Front in defence of our liberties. The demonstration that this is so was the chief feature of the proceedings in the house of commons today, and the member who was instrumental in showing it to be the fact was W. S. Middleboro, Conservative member for one of the Greys, and who has more than once visited the Maritime Province.

Sir Robt Borden gave point to the discussion by pronouncing strongly in favor of technical training for returned soldiers, so as to enable them to take up a new business if their old one was gone, or they were unfitted for it, and not only thus maintain themselves, but also add to the wealth and well-being of the community. Incidentally he mentioned that the Government by order-in-council last November, had established the policy that returned soldiers should have the prefence should be given to those properly qualified candidates who have served with the Canadian expeditionary forces in the present war. The adoption of such a system would stimulate recruiting and would be simple justice. If no precedent existed, we should create one, but ther was precedent in Great Britain and France.


