Local and Provincial.

We learn that there is a probability of a baseball match to-morrow, between the Kentville baseball club and our "juniors" to be played here.

Quite a severe thunder storm occurred on Tuesday night, accompanied by rain. This, the first of the season, was quite severe—the lightning being very vivid.

Mr. C. R. Burgess' barque *Belt* is now undergoing repairs at Kingsport. She is the oldest vessel in Mr. Burgess' fleet. The *Kelton* has also been repairing at Kingsport.

Eggs wanted at 12cts. R. Prats. The Methodist church at Kentville has been undergoing improvements and will be reopened for worship next Sunday. The building has been thoroughly and neatly painted.

Messrs. Moir, Son & Co's, bread baking establishment at Halifax, was totally destroyed by fire on Tuesday. The loss is placed at \$100,000, and there is \$20,000 insurance. One hundred and seventy-five hands are thrown out of employment.

We have not yet heard of any Dominion Day demonstration to be made in Wolfville. Other towns, such as Windsor, Annapolis, etc., have made extensive plans and are now busily preparing for a grand day. We would like to see Wolfville show in some fitting way due respect for the natal day of "this Canada of ours."

"The launching of the ship," always a very interesting occasion, promises to be this time of especial interest, and no doubt many will avail themselves of the opportunity of witnessing such a grand event.
