The Intercolonial.

Editorial Notes.

The Murray government sustained another severe defeat on Thursday of last week in the by-election in Victoria county, where Philip MacLeod, Conservative, won by 38 majority a seat carried at the general election in June, 1911, by the late Liberal member by a majority over four hundred. More than usual interest attaches to the contest because Victoria is the county represented by the premier. The seat had been held for fifteen years by the Liberals and was regarded as absolutely safe. Such a defeat at a by-election where the government is supposed to have the advantage, and being the fourth straight win for the opposition, would indicate that the days of the present administration are narrowing down.

Apple Packing School.

On Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, of next week, Feb. 24th, to 27th, practical instruction in apple packing in barrels and boxes, particularly the latter, will be given by the Dominion Expert in apple packing, Mr. J. P. Carey, in the old Court House, Kentville.

This course is similar to that put on in Ontario and British Columbia. It affords an opportunity for those who wish to learn the various methods of packing and how to pack properly. They will be given the opportunity to do the actual packing themselves under the direction of an expert.

In view of the trade in box packing apples becoming a factor in the out put of the first grade fruit in the near future, Prof. Shaw, Provincial Horticulturalist, has considered that such a course should be started this year in Kentville, having in view, if this is a success, the putting on of several in different sections next season.

Without a doubt this is a move in the right direction, and it is to be hoped that many will avail themselves of this opportunity to be abreast of growers of other countries in the art of properly packing fruit in boxes.

A demonstration and talk on bin and barrel packing will be given promptly at 7:30 p. m. each day, covering the principal points, and the time from 2:30 p. m. to noon the next day will be given up entirely to the practical work.

Lectures on various horticultural topics will be given on the evenings of the 24th, 25th and 26th by Prof. Brittain, Mr. Carey, Prof. Blair and others.

Died in the West.

John W. Rubland, for many years a prominent contractor of Halifax, died rather suddenly at his daughter's residence (Mrs. Bill) at Nings, Manitoba, on Wednesday night. For many years Mr. Rubland was one of our leading master builders. He came from Lunenburg in the middle fifties and served his time as a carpenter with David Calder. Engaging in business on his own account he constructed during his business career some of the finest buildings in the city in the outside counties, too, notably in Cape Breton, he erected churches that were ornaments to their respective localities. Mr. Rubland was a member of the city council in the eighties, representing ward two. He was a most enthusiastic mason, being in 1876 the grand worthy master of the order. Few men were better informed in the working of the principles of masonry than John Rubland. He left Halifax about ten years ago for the west—beyond Winnipeg—and resided there ever since with his son-in-law, Ingraham Bill. His wife predeceased him about two years ago. The funeral took place yesterday and he was buried with masonic honors, the order's services being conducted by Doris Lodge, Rosevalley. He is survived by one son, Milton, and the daughters—Mrs. Bill, Mrs. Frank Blackader, and Mrs. Peter Mylne. Mr. Rubland had been contemplating returning to Halifax early in the spring—The Halifax Herald.

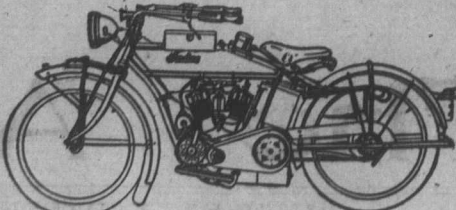

The ends of candles are useful in kindling the fire. Cut them into small pieces and distribute them among the kindling. The fire will burn up much more quickly.
