

Mr. Keir Hardie is extremely fond of preaching revolutionary doctrines to the various peoples who live under British Government, but it is seldom that he is quite so outspoken, as he was yesterday. For three days he has listened to much seditious talk from the Egyptian members of the National congress. His own chance came yesterday, and he evidently thought that as a member of the British House of Commons it was his the partition of the Soudan is void. duty to put the sedition of the native speakers in the shade. In this he

succeeded. 'People ask me why I support the Egyptian Nationalists." he shouted. 'It is because England who have a sense of honour share these views. Mr. Gladstone's and Lord Salisbury's pledges about evacuation must be respected.

"We should thus have a united congress of the victims of Great Britain," she declared, and

Egypt under British rule, summing it up by declaring that "in every do main British rule has been infamous and unjust.



Editor Evening Telegram. respecting agricultural resources would seemingly not be unheeded, as we all are at least interested in farming. Teachers take interest, and I deem it necessary that we all should study and observe the natural every-day commonplace degradation of the land. Some time ago we were startled about the canker—a dreadful potato disease, which is not half as tato disease, which is not half as prevalent as previously reported. Although not an expert on farm work, a few notes cannot go astray. What do your readers think of the canker? My opinion concerning the canker is this: that the canker is not in the ground; it is in the seed potatoes These words may appear as erroneous ones; yet, if "experience teaches," as it surely does, this may be verified. A question asked may not be unappropriate: "How did the canker get into the ground?" It didn't fall there, nor did it grow there. But first of all it came from the seed. In one bed of potatoes there is one kind of seed and in another a different kind. The first bed is not marred by the cank-er, while the other is. My opinion concerning the matter is that the disease comes from the diseased tubers, and after the seeds are sown a while ngw tubers acquire a fungus, and so the disease spreads. It does not af-fect the ground so very much if when the area affected be laid down to a meadow. The canker seed should be destroyed, and it is my belief that ere many years go by the canker will be




