McManigle Told All.

Taken from his cell in the Federal Building, where he had been lodged before daylight after his secret trip, in the custody of Government fficials from Los Angeles, Cal., Mc-Manigle, the confessed accomplice of John J. and James B. McNamara. went before the jurors after his writ ten confession had been presented in detail. That the prisoner will be kept in attendance on the Grand Jury States Attorney Chas, W. The Grand Jury devoted much attention yesterday to witnesses from Tiffin, Ohio, where last April 540 lbs. of dynamite were found by detectives in a barn in the rear of the home of James L. McManigle, father of Ortic. This was one of the stores from which Ortie McManigle and James McNamara replenished their supply of explosives when they started out to do "jobs" in Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio, Indianapolis or Illinois

Fur Sealing.

Fur experts say the 25,000 seal

skins recently sold in London at an average price of \$27 per skin means that only about 6,000 new sealskin coats will be available this year for the women of the whole world. The same authority says that in March next there will be offered for sale in London 300 more seal skins from Copper Island by the Russian Government. The fact that Russia has only 300 pelts to offer from the Commanderofski rookeries, which less than ten years ago had 40,000 skins, shows the inroads made by Japanese raiders. These raids have badly cut up the Russian herds during the past few years. In 1904 the raiders began while the guard was withdrawn during the war.. Five schooners took 12,000 skins. In 1906 a fleet of schooners from Japan made a concerted raid, landing a field gun. The guard was driven back and held in the guard house while the raiders lubbed and killed on the hauling round. No details of this raid were ever made public.-Fishing Gazette.



How the Accident Occurred.

Sergt. Jno. Byrne of the Detective Department of the police force, narrowly escaped sharing the sad fate of Rev. E. Curran in the terrible explosion of Saturday evening at Poucl Cove. While Fr. Curran was in the generator house charging the cyclin der with the gas, Sergt. Byrne re mained with him from 5 to 6 p.m. an then left for Grouchey's hotel. Bu that the Sergeant had some business to perform he might have remained with the priest, who left the place for a short time until he returned with Nellie Wall, who brought a lantern. Sergt. Byrne says that when the Priest reached the generator house he stood in the porch which leads to the house and on opening the door the fumes of escaping gas met him. The girl, Wall, stood outside the porch with a lighted lantern behind her back, and when Father Curran closed the door to the generator house which ignited by the flame of the lantern. and this communicating with the gas which filled the generating house caused the explosion, while the deceased priest stood in the porch. Some weeks ago a brother of the girl Wall while helping Father Curran to charge the generator was overcome by gas which escaped and almost lost his life. The poisonous vapour was inhaled by him in large quantities and extreme measures had to be taken before he could be revived. He narrowly escaped death.
