(To Secretary of State, Sent 5.30 p.m. 13th August, 1914.) Am desired by the Board of Trade

casks shipped from here via of Liverpool on through Bill of Lading to Spain has been stopped at Liverpool by Proclamation prohibiting export of food supplies. Does it mean that exportation of Newfoundland codfish to Spain, Portugal, Italy, Brazil and other neutral places will be prohibited, or does it mean that export food supplies via Great Britain prohibited? If former case Colony will have no means of paying for food supplies from Canada and the United States or articles manufactured by Great Britain. There is a large shipment awaiting Digby for Spain via Liverpool. Of great importance in interests of trade that transhipment be allowed at once. Hitherto Newfoundland codfish has not been consumed in Great Britain to any extent, and as it is nerishable article could not be held for any length of time.



Each private will receive pay at the rate of \$1.00 per day and free rations, from the date of enrollment to the date of return, a portion of which will be paid to dependents left behind, or it will be allowed to accumulate for their personal benefit until termination

Volunteers from the outports will be given free passage to St. John's.

Any applicant for service, forwarded by the proper authorities and not accepted after arrival at Headquarters, will be provided with a free passage and maintenance back to his home.

The Election Of a Pope.

CEREMONIAL OF THE CONCLAVE. The prescribed form for electing successor to the Chair of St. Peter made vacant by the death of a Pop is by a Conclave. By a conclave is meant a closed room or hall specially set aside and prepared for the Car-dinals when electing a Pope; it is also used to designate the assembly of the Cardinals for the canonical execution

The conclave in its present form dates from the end of the thirteenth Immediately upon the death of a Pope the cardinal camerlengo, who, as representative of the Sacred College, takes charge of the papal household, verifies by a judicial act the death of the Pontiff. After this cere-
