The Company has to furnish reports of all surveys to the Governent from time to time. If at any ime petroleum is discovered in com nercial quantities "the Company or any lessee or lessees to whom leases may be granted, shall proceed with all reasonable speed and continuously to work and develop same."

And that is one of the causes of the present high price of nearly all commodities. But there is an even more important factor but in keeping up the high cost of living, and that is the enorme burden of taxation under which we are at present living. Practically all our taxes are obtained by ad valorem duties on goods imported into the colony, and the sur-super-sales tax, whilst possibly a necessity, nevertheless bears heavily on rich and poor alike. Frequently duty on imported goods amounts to over one hundred and twenty per cent. above cost, and even more, and to attempt to live under such circumstant cents.

With the coming spring it i ssible that our economic situaon may brighten to the exte of permitting a reduction in axation, and in the meantime teps should be taken to see that no extortionate profits are made at the expense of the public.





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
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
