



In a recent work entitled "Labour, the giant with the feet of clay" written by Mr. Shaw Desmond, the statement is made "that the great war has (already) tried to teach . . . . the lesson that nationality and national conceptions play one of the major parts in the division of mankind. Man has yet to learn that there is something even still deeper, more inevitable in its effects, and that is the outlook of human beings upon ial." And the writer adds, "one is not here speaking of theological differences. Nor is one lenying that some of the noblest and finest men and women, who have existed have believed themselves quite sincerely to be helping humanity by "fighting the idea of God in the sense of theological definition, though such men and women, nominally materialist, have actually taken the spiritual view of life and living, and have been unconsciously "on the side of the angels." But what one is speaking of is the fundamental irreconcilable difference between the materialist proper with his goal of fleshly or purely intellectual (satisfactions, and the anti-materialist, between that overwhelming mass . . . . which steadily trends to a material conception of existance, and that minority, which regards the body as of little importance by the side of the soul, and only urges the care of the former in order that it may be a more worthy vehicle

Perhaps no one foresaw at the time the likelihood of such serious financial depression and dislocation of the usual sources of revenue as has since arisen, but looking back it appears unfortunate that the proposed increase in expenditure should have coincided with this financial depression, for without doubt the effect of our legislation has been to discourage and dishearten rather than the opposite. Notably has this been in the case of smaller parishes fall ing vacant; and in proof of this statement I may say that practically all Parishes which have become vacant since have failed to qualify and have been unable to elect Rectors, and only temporary provision, if any, has been made for serving them,

THE DIOCESAN BUDGET.

I have not thus far made any reference to the Budget Plan introduced operation as of vital importance our financial stability. Its working has a direct bearing upon the question of stipends. It was to my mind unfortunate that we were unable to launch this system until late in 1921, and in the circumstances it is not to be wondered at that the total in come derived from this source fell considerably below our anticipations The result has been that the Executive Committee found it impossible to naintain the stipends of clergy in charge of Missions at the figure paid regrettable but it was unavoidable. 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



AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House met at 3.30, the Lord Bishop presiding, and reading the opening prayers.

The minutes of the previous session were read and confirmed. Rev. Canon Bolt moved the Report of the Ordination Candidates Council, which on being duly seconded was adopted.

signation. Rev. J. T. Richards gave notice that he would on to-morrow draw the attention of the Synod to the work of Dr. Grenfell in Northern Newfoundland and Labrador, and move a resolu-

pointed Headmistress of Bishop Spen-cer College up to the time of her re-

The House resumed its debate on adoption of the Report of the Literature Committee. Several memhers expressed oninions of the very satisfactory character of the Diocesan Magazine under its new management, and of its increasing usefulness to church people. The main problem in connection with the Magazine is, however, the problem of financing it, and a suggestion was thrown out that a limited liability company be formed to carry on this useful Diocesan publication. At this stage the Report of the Literature Committee was adopted.

Rev. Canon Bayly then moved and it was duly seconded that a Select Committee be appointed to consider this question of the formation of a limited liability company in connection with the Magazine, and to report at as early a date as possible to this Synod, Agreed. The Committee nominated and approved by the House comprise the following, viz: Rev. Canon Smart, Canon Bayly, Messrs. G. J. Adams, A. L. Barrett, Geo. A. Bartlett.

Pursuant to notice, Dr. Blackall moved his resolution that the Synod request the Legislature to increase the number of Directors of the Church of England Colleges, so that representatives from the outports and women may be introduced; and that a Bill may be introduced into this Synod to give effect to this resolution. On being seconded the motion was put to the House, and on division was lost. The House resumed the debate on the motion of Rev. W. R. J. Higgitt relating to the question of the enforcement of law and order especially in connection with the Prohibition Act, and of the Resolution in an amendment by Rev. J. T. Hiscock, to ask the Gov-

ernment for a referendum on this question. The matter was debated by many members until the closing hour, when on motion, seconded and carried, the whole subject was deferred. On motion, duly seconded, the House adjourned.

## EVENING SESSION.

The House resumed at 8 o'clock. The Select Committee appointed in connection with the proposed amendment to Chap. 1 and Chap. VII, of the Constitution and Rules concerning the franchise to women, reported that: "Having considered the matter to them entrusted the Committee are of opinion that the qualification for speaking and voting should be the same for women as for men." On motion, duly seconded, the Re-

port was adopted. Rev. Canon Jeeves moved the House into committee of the whole on the Report on the Bill brought in by the Select Committee. On being seconded this was agreed.

The House went into Committee. It was moved, seconded and carried that the report be adopted. Agreed. It was moved, seconded and carried that the committee rise and report the Bill passed without amendment.

The Committee rose and the House resumed. Canon Jeeves gave notice that he would on to-morrow move that the bill be read a third time and passed.

The House resumed its debate on the adoption of the report of the directors of the Church of England Colleges.
