The Hurricane in the West Indies.

Our advices from various parts of the West Indies, giving details of the ravages of the late hurricane in the Caribbean Sea, show that the brief account of the terrible storm first received by telegraph from Havana by no means exaggerated the extent of the calamity. Coming from the Atlantic Ocean, the tornado burst in the first instance, upon the small islands of St. Thomas and Tortola, both of which it swept with terrible fury, working immense destruction of property and life. It then advanced to Porto Rico, devastating the northern part of that island; and it ended its desolating course on the Island of Hayti, after laying a portion of the City of San Domingo in ruins. At all these places it made dreadful havoc with the shipping, scores of vessels, including several steamers, having been sunk or broken in pieces. At St. Thomas, it is estimated fully five hundred lives were lost; in Porto Rico over two hundred persons are supposed to have perished; in San Domingo about as many are reported killed as in Porto Rico; and, although the news of the submersion of Tortola during the storm is hardly creditable, yet there can be no doubt that the storm has wrought fearful damege in that island likewise. Altogether, this tornado has been one of the most destructive of those terrible visitations to which the region it traversed is subject.

The following is an extract from a letter addressed to a gentleman in Kingston by an officer of the French steamer Caravelle, giving particulars of the hurricane: "On the morning of the 29th of October the-wind commenced to blow in slight squalls, which, succeeding each other in great rapidity, increased in violence. In the meantime the storm became more serious, so much so that several vessels ran foul of us, their anchors being broken; in one moment we were surrounded by the vessels, which one after another capsized. I then thought the Caravelle would have been smashed to atoms. After this the wind saddenly abated, and we saw the calamity which had taken place in the harbor. Unfortu

2nd That the principle of exempting

2nd. That the principle of exempting
the press from postage, on the ground of
its being a means of promoting education
and diffusing scientific and general knowledge, is now recognized in the consolidated States of Canada.

3rd. That the imposition of newspaper postage would involve additional labor, risk add expense on the part of the publishers, to an extent at least equal to the amount of revenne deriveck from this source, and would therefore place additional burden on a class of persons who pay their fair share of taxation otherwise.

4th. That the collection of newspaper postage, if made effective, and accompanied by proper checks and rigid surveillance over publishers' issue lists, must involve so much additional expenditure on the part of the Post Office as would tend materially to decrease the revenue derived from this source.

5th. That the carrying of newspapers imposes very little expense on the Post office Department in addition to what is incurred by the carrying of letters; all other legitimate means of raising a revenue should for this and other reasons already stated be exhausted before this made of doing so should be adopted.

6th. That the representatives of New Brunswick in Parliament who concur in the sentiments expressed in these resolutions, be respectfully requested to use their influence to prevent the imposition of newspaper postage.
