Immigration to Canada.
We are glad to learn that the Onprio Government are adopting vigcous measures for attracting a large
numigration to this Province next eason. The number of immigrants during the past season was much larger than in any previous year.
Still the demand for all kinds of labour is as great as ever, and in many
sections of the Province there has
been a great scarcity both of mechanics and labourers. The Government are increasing the number of their agents in Great Britain and Ire-land. They are also about to send agents to the continent of Europe, especially to Alsace and Lorraine, where a perfect exodus has been going on for some time, and from where a large immigration is expect-ed next year. Two agents sailed for Great Britain on Saturday, and others will follow, who will be sent into the different rural sections of the kingdom, and who will be busily engaged during the winter months in diffusing information respecting Ontario by lectures, letters to local papers, circulation of tracts, maps, and in every possible way they can convey information to the class of people who are most required in this country.

Such vicescus measures are not

Such vigorous measures are not only wise but necessary. If we are to secure our fair share of immigrants we must not only itell them of the advantages Ontario offers as a field for their energy and effort, but must induce them to come to our shores by every reasonable encouragement and assistance. The \$6 paid to every immigrant who came to Ontario last season will be continued, and in order that only deserving people claim or receive this allowance, a better system of checking has been adopted. Agents in the old country will give certificates to those who, in their judgment, ought to received the allowance. A duplicate of this will be sent to Toronto, and the presentation of the one given to the immigrant shall be taken as evidence of being entitled to the money. "A little over a year ago the minister of St. Andrew's Church, (Kirk of Sottland,) was ejected from the building by the Sheriff, through the power conveyed to him in an undefended writ of ejectment. The parties ejected took with them several books and other moveable property, including the melodeon and benches used in the Sabbath School, and gave possession to the parties holding the claim. On October 22nd, 1871, six days after the ejectment, the Rev. Mr. Burnett commenced preaching in St. James's Hall, and has since regulatly preached there to the congregation that days after the ejectment, the Rev. Mr. Burnett commenced preaching in St. James's Hall, and has since regularly preached there to the congregation that went out with him from the old church to distinguish it from the new one, though it is not an old church by any means, being a stone building put up only about twenty years ago. The spire is generally allowed to be the finest in Canada, and is one of the most conspicious objects in any view of the city. The old church, then, remained closed for almost a year, until the first of September last, when it was recopened for public worship. Some time before a memorial, praying for the constitution or recognition of a second congregation, had been presented to the Presbytery, and that body, by a majority of votes, decided to take action in favor of the memorialists. From 1st September last September last September and the public has been occupied Sabbath after Sabbath by various ministers, among them the Rev. Kenneth Mc-Lennan, of Port Hope; the Rev. Mr. Mc-Rae, of Hopewell, Nova Scotia; Rev. Mr. Pierson, of Detroit, and others. Meantime Mr. Burnett and his friends have not been idle, and are building a new church on Hayter and Park streets, facing the north-west corner of the Central School Grounds.
