The Guibord Case. The Privy Council in England has just given a decision in this case, which has caused quite a sensation in Montreal, and which will be regarded with interest in every part of the Dominion. He died while still a member of it, and his body was refused interment on consecrated ground and with eelesiastical rites. Hence the suit which was first brought up in the highest Court in Quebec, Judge Mondelet in that Court held that according to French law, the excommunication of Guibord not having been personal was not valid; that he was not a public sinner, and that he be buried in the consecrated part of the cemetery, although not necessarily with religious ceremonies.
