CHICAGO, May 5.-A meeting was held to-day to ratify the action of the Philadelphia Irish convention. Alexander Sullivan, the president of the Irish national league of Americs, was met by a storm of applause. He began his address by referring to matters in his personal career which had been commented upon since he had been raised to the head of the new national or-He contended that the Philadelphia plat-He contended that the Philadelphia plat. form had secured the enthusiastic approval of the entire American press without a notable exception, and won for Ireland to a degree hitherto unastained the sympathy of mankind. Yet, unattained the sympathy of mankind. Yet, said the speaker, such is the condition of Ireland to-day that if such a platform were put forth by a similarly constituted body at Dublin the entire assemblage would have been marched under military escort from the convention halt to the jails. The platform declares in a word that henceforth the Irish race in exile is a unit in its determination to aid its countrymen in their struggle for self-government by whatever methods it thinks best for the achievement of the end. He declared the purpose in carrying out the thinks best for the achievement of the end. He declared the purpose in carrying out the wishes of the convention was to make the masses of the American people informed of the truth about Ireland. When they understood the reasonableness of her claim they would be united in its support, and their will properly expressed the power of the British empire could not withstand. In conclusion, he said when Ireland has self-government ehe will use her own capital to create coanufactures. She will then export only her surplus food, and what manufactured farticles her people need they will import

her surplus food, and what manufactured articles her people need they will import from America or some other friendly people. It was said their representatives had never proposed a definite plan of self-government. Much indeed would their candor have availed in the foreign legislature from which they had repeatedly been expelled whenever they attempted to compel its attention to the wants of their country. U. S. FXTRADITION LAW.

What is Required in Order That Fugi-

WASHINGTON, May 5 .- The law which will regulate extradition proceedings, should the surrender of any persons be de treaty of Aug. 9, 1842, which is as follows:

It is agreed that the United States and her Britannic majesty shall, upon mutual requisitions by them or their ministers, officers, or authorities, respectively made, deliver up to justice all persons who, being charged with the crime of murder, or assult with intent to commit murder or piracy, or arson, or robbery, or forgery, or the utterance of forged paper, committed within the jurisdiction of cither, shall seek an asylum or shall be found within the territories of the other; provided thi this shall only be done upon such evitence of criminality as, according to the laws of the place where the futitive or person so charged shall be found would justify his apprehension and commitment for trial if the crime or offence had there been committed; and two respective judges and other magistrates of the two governments shall have power, jurisdiction, and authority upon complaint made under oath, to issue a warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive or person so charged, that he may be brought before such judges or othermagistrate repositively, to the end that the evidence of criminality may be heard and comsi ered, and if, on such hearing, the evidence be deemed sufficient to sustain the charge, it shall be the duty of the examining judge or megistrate to certify the same to the proper executive authority that a warrant may issue for the surprehension and delivery shall be borne and defraved by the party who makes the requisition and receives the fugitive.
