It has been largely through a reign of terror that blue victories have been won already, we must make a stand if in this election we are to prevent terrorism in the country, owing to the greater proportion of the people who are more or less dependent upon others for employment. They will probably to-day get such a dressing down in Toronto as will put them on their good behavior for a while.
