The fifty Italians brought up from Cornwall by Alphonso Balastini on Saturday last, are still in the city, starving and neclected. Balastini himself is around town enjoying himself without shelter and without food. What makes the matter worse, is the charge preserved by the men against Balastini, that on leaving Cornwall he drew all their money from the Grand Trunk people and has it still. The men want it to get back to New York, but Balastini hangs on to the money and refuses to let them have a cent. Italian Consul Gianelle and Mr. Michael Basso have taken the nen's cause up, and if the allegations against Balastini can be testablished they propose to teach him a lesson which he will remember.
