THE BELT LINE.

NO CHANGE TO BE MADE IN THE LAW.—Passes

LONDON, Jan. 26.—In the House of Commons
today the Attorney-General for Ireland,
replying to a question by T. W. Russell,
member for South Tyrone, in regard to
priests acting as agents at polling booths,
said that without pronouncing an opinion
upon the facts or the expediency of
altering the law, he was disposed to add
no controversial measure to the Government
program at the introduction of a bill on the
subject would ensue.

A RICH OLD CARDINAL DEAD.
Jesse Simon, the son of a Cobbler, became
a millionaire.

PESTH, Jan. 26.—Cardinal John Simon,
Archbishop of Gran and Primate of Hungary,
died at Gran to-day at the age of 78
years. His father was a cobbler at St.
Wolfsburg, Hungary, and it was with
such a lowly start in life that Jean set out to
what he actually became, one of the most
powerful of all the Princes of the Church
in the prime of life, with a diocese richer than
any in the Christian world, and with
his palaces and parks of great splendor.
From his hands in 1877 Francis Joseph
received the crown of Austria.

TRAVELERS FROM VIENNA TO PESTH pass in
view of his palaces and parks of great
splendor, which is almost an exact copy of St. Peter's,
at Rome. He is the only Cardinal in Hungary,
and the Cardinal visited money upon
him without stint, spending over a million
dollars in the purchase of furniture and
decorations. His real estate alone is
valued at 2,000,000, and covers an area
of 120,000 acres.

LABOR TROUBLES AHEAD.
Four Thousand Workmen in Hamburg
Ask Aid From the Government.

HAMBURG, Jan. 26.—Four thousand meeting
workmen of this city held a meeting
to-day to consider means for the relief
and amelioration of their condition. It was
resolved to send a petition to the Senate
asking that landlords be prohibited on next
quarter day from evicting tenants who
pay their rents; also asking that loans of
small amounts be made to tenants who
are unable to pay their rents, and that
children in the public schools be supplied
with hot meals daily.

A COMMITTEE formed to help relieve the
distress of the unemployed distributed
500 letters to-day.

Spanish Port Laborers Quit Work.
MALAGA, Jan. 26.—The port laborers of
this city have all gone on strike.

HE MURDERED A WOMAN.
Sentenced to 20 Years of Penal Servitude
at the Age of 19.

PARIS, Jan. 26.—Peter Vladimiroff, age 19,
rich Russian, has been convicted of the
murder of his paramour, Mme. Catherine
Ovieska, at Ville d'Avray, in October last.
Owing to extenuating circumstances attend-
ing the crime Vladimiroff, with the
additional penalty that he will not be allowed
to leave France until he has served a term
of imprisonment without special permis-
sion from the authorities. The murdered
woman was 25 years of age and had two
children.

A Dynamic Scare.
LONDON, Jan. 26.—There is another dynamic
scare among the authorities, who have
received information from the United States
that the dynamite scare is active
preparing to resume operations. The
authorities in London and elsewhere are
increasing their vigilance and detectives
swarm in quest of dynamite in London
and other ports. The police guards have
been increased around the public buildings
and the authorities are increasing the
number of inspectors for a closer examina-
tion of the baggage and goods arriving
from the United States, which was stopped
a few months ago.

WOLSELEY COULD NOT VISIT CANADA.
LONDON, Jan. 26.—The Hon. Lord Wolseley
Gazette, an authority on military affairs,
gave a promise to-day to an in-
formant of a mischievous report circulated
in London that Lord Wolseley had been
temporarily taken from his command
of the Irish forces and was to be sent
to Canada. In the present state of public
opinion, this report created a great
excitement. Lord Wolseley received an
invitation from the Government to go to
Canada for some salmon fishing. He applied
for leave, but was informed that it would
not be convenient for his services to be
present in view of the coming redistribution
of the military force in Ireland. This
leak out of the Home Guards and gave rise
to the false report.

A RAILWAY ARTIST CONFESSED.
LONDON, Jan. 26.—The "White
Eyes" artist, an American young singer,
has created a sensation at Brighton by sing-
ing some topical verses about the Farnell
O.S. case, on an occasion when Mrs.
O.S. and some friends were present. The
whole audience knew of the presence of the
singer, but he did not, and he is in a state
of confusion over the incident.

RECIPROCITY WITH SPAIN.
LONDON, Jan. 26.—Spain has accepted the
proposal of the United States for a reciprocity
treaty relative to American trade with Cuba.
In political circles it is said the only serious
difficulty in the way of formulating and
adopting such a treaty appears to be the
question of reciprocity on the tobacco ques-
tion.

BOLOGNE CONFERENCE DID NOT
SETTLE MATTERS FINALLY.
Farnell and O'Brien to go to America.
John Dillon to go to jail and assume
the leadership after his release.

LONDON, Jan. 26.—The belief grows that
the Bolognese settlement is merely a status
quo. Mr. O'Brien, in an interview since
his return, expressed hopes of a speedy set-
tlement, and it is known that William
O'Brien threatened, in the event of the
negotiations failing, to issue a manifesto to
the Irish people throwing the entire respon-
sibility of the continued rupture on Mr.
Carlyle and his friends. This he will
surrender himself to the police and go
to prison to serve out his term. The last
visit of Mr. O'Brien to Mr. Dillon was un-
dertaken with the view of arriving at a
compromise and to obviate a further split in
the party. Mr. Farnell had made such
suggestions as Mr. O'Brien desired.

WYOMOUTH, Jan. 26.—Last evening a
number of artillerymen belonging to No. 2

Finally the fight became general, and
the soldiers to the number of 70
charged through the crowd and

icked, fled in all directions, leaving a
number of wounded upon the ground. When
the news of the disturbance reached the
officers in charge of the artillery barracks they
sent a detachment of soldiers to call the men
back to their quarters. The riotous artillerymen
heard the commands they refused to obey
and for hours argued terror through
Wyomouth. The soldiers were drawn
down and struggled back to their
quarters. When they were arrested. All the rioters
were taken to the barracks and may also
be sent to work for the civil authorities.
