The Agreement Approved by the City.

The supplementary agreement was approved of both by the Trades and Labor Council several days ago, and also the company's own employees, the one that was referred to them.

Municipal Affairs—No. 2.

When a financial institution has first care is to economize, reduce working expenses and discharge unnecessary clerks. First he recommends a number of expensive improvements in his department, and then he secures his appointment. Next he applies for an increased salary on one case of the increased importance and expensive work carried on by his department. Street Commissioner Jones and Park Commissioner Chambers are cases in point. They are both fond of making recommendations. The former was glad to accept his present position at \$800 per annum. He now receives \$2500. He recently recommended other city assets to be paved, and a large expenditure being carried out would probably have seen another increase in his salary on account of the increased work of his office; that is the way it works.

They ransacked the bureau and scoured together about \$100 in cash and two valuable watches.

A FAKE METER-READER

How an Impostor Gains Entrance to a Number of Private Residences—Householders Should Be on the Watch.

There is another 'new fad' going the rounds of Toronto, but just what his game is has not yet been ascertained. His mode of procedure is to call in the residential districts of the city and represent himself as a meter-reader from the gas office. He displays a silver badge similar to those worn by the employees of the gas company and obtains an entrance to the house. As far as known he has confined his operations to the northern portion of the city. Nearly all the residents in Gwynne and Collier-streets have been visited. The fraud was not discovered until yesterday, when the regular meter-reader called and was informed that another man had called the day previous. So far only one robbery has been reported to the police since the stranger made his rounds. The complaint is Mr. Harry Brown, of Gwynne-street, who claims to have lost several articles of value. Householders should look out for this man and the badge he shows is a correct one.

SUBMITTED TO HIS INJURIES

James Barker of Hamilton Killed by the Explosion of an Empty Barrel.

A TRIP TO LAKE TCHAD.

A FRENCHMAN'S INTERESTING AND REMARKABLE JOURNEY.

Commandant Montell's Perilous Trip Across the Dark Continent—Through a Dangerous Country—Safe Arrival at Tripoli.

Commandant Montell has made a journey remarkable and interesting alike from a geographical and a political point of view, says The London Times. It is now more than two years since he left Senegal, almost immediately after the signing of the Anglo-French agreement of August, 1936, by which the Senegal-Barrua line was agreed on as roughly defining the spheres of influence of Great Britain and France in the Central Sudan. About the same time Montell left St. Louis other expeditions, with Lake Tchad as their goal, were sent out by the French Government. Lieutenant Mizon, whose differences with the Royal Niger Company gained him a somewhat undesirable notoriety in this country a few months ago, was in command of one expedition which was designed to reach the lake by way of the Senegal; another expedition, which had the same object in view, was under the leadership of the unfortunate M. Paul Crampel. Lieutenant Mizon, as everyone knows, found it impossible to reach Lake Tchad, and abandoning the original object of his expedition, turned his face in another direction and made for the Saouha River, where he effected a junction with M. de Brazza, and claims by the treaties made en route to have effectually cut off the German colony of the Cameroons from expansion toward the interior. To the sad fate of the Crampel expedition, the murder of its leader and of most of his companions, it is unnecessary to refer. Of the various expeditions which were sent out to reach Lake Tchad, that of Commandant Montell has alone been successful, and the French officer's undoubtedly brilliant achievement will therefore receive more generous recognition than in this country, where the difficulties and dangers of travel in the heart of Africa are known and appreciated. A special correspondent of La Politique Coloniale, who met Commandant Montell on the edge of the desert, has forwarded to his journal the first detailed account of his expedition.

ACCOUNT OF THE EXPEDITION.

which has reached Europe. Commandant Montell, accompanied by only one European companion—Adjutant Badaire—left St. Louis on October 9, 1936, and arrived at Segou on the Niger river, the first point at which the French had then succeeded in establishing their authority. From Segou he struck out for Say, across the great bend of the Niger. On April 21 Wagaduga, the extreme point reached by Capt. Bulger and Dr. Grozat, was reached. His reception was far from cordial. At Uro Guadajo, a town of 3000 inhabitants, Ibrahim, a powerful chief, whose father had befriended Barth, gave the mission a better welcome, though his counselors were by no means friendly to the white men. As Ibrahim is superior of a large number of 20,000

tribes, the treaty made with him is, in Commandant Montell's view, of especial importance, and it was due to the good will of this chief that the mission on its arrival at Say on Aug. 19 met with a cordial reception, and so liberally was found in obtaining the signature of this local chief to the usual treaty of friendship with France. Say is one end of the line which under the Anglo-French agreement already referred to is the boundary between the respective spheres of influence of the two countries. It was contemplated by the agreement that the actual delimitation of the boundary should be made by commissioners appointed for that purpose, but up to the present moment no delimitation has been attempted. EXTREMELY DANGEROUS COUNTRY.

Fortunately the powerful "Serki" of Kabi, who is a moderately amiable man, as he had recently captured a large village, and allowed the mission to enter Argungu, a strong fortified town with a population estimated by Commandant Montell at 20,000. By dint of much firmness the Serki was induced to sign a letter granting the right of free passage through his country to Frenchmen. A treaty the Serki refused to sign, but this refusal proved of no use to the expedition as Sokoto, where they arrived on the 15th of October. The Serki of Kabi and the Sultan of Sokoto were at war, and news of the difficulties that had arisen between the Serki and the Commandant Montell having reached the Sultan, the latter gave the French expedition an enthusiastic reception. The emperor of Sokoto is by the agreement of 1890 expressly recognized by France as within the sphere of influence of Great Britain. The Royal Niger Company have acquired and exercised rights of trading in the Sultan's dominions, and have now for some years paid to the Sultan the subsidy agreed on by the company's agent, Mr. Joseph Thompson, at the time the treaty was signed. All this was no doubt, known to Commandant Montell, but it does not seem to have prevented him from making the "Sultan" the same treaty which had been signed by the other Sultans on his route. "What that treaty may be we are not told, but it can hardly be relied upon by the French Government, whatever its nature may be, in any way modifying the international agreement of 1890, and that the Sultan signed the treaty of his own free will," as Commandant Montell is careful to explain, does not in any way affect the question. At Kano, his next stopping place, Mr. Montell was obliged to remain two months, owing to the difficulty he experienced in negotiating some drafts on Yola, which the Sultan had given him in payment for goods sold. At Kano many difficulties were caused as to his entering Borno, but as

MOST INTERESTING DETAILS.

When the story of the expedition comes to be told. From the bare outline which is all the information as yet available it appears that the expedition passed through Kargin, Borari and Killula, and at each of these places they were subjected to a sort of quarantine, but were allowed to continue their journey until permission had been obtained from the Sultan of Kuka. When Kuka was reached the population turned out to receive the strangers, and afforded an escort into the town which Commandant Montell estimates at 20,000 persons. On the 12th of April the Sheikh Malam Adam received the French traveler in state, and begged him to consider himself at home at Borno. Commandant Montell presented his credentials, and so far did outrage to the republicans sentiments of his native land as to describe himself as accredited by "King" Carnot and "Victor" Etienne, a description which he justifies on the ground that no other would have been intelligible to the Sheikh. A present of some articles known as yet available of a copy in Arabic of "Thousand and One Nights" greatly pleased the Sheikh. Four months were spent at Kuka, but at present nothing is known as to the result of Commandant Montell's long stay at the capital. No mention is made in the necessarily brief account as yet available of any treaty having been made with the Sheikh, but as to this information will no doubt be obtained, and in any event a traveler of Commandant Montell's experience and attainments cannot have spent some months on the shores of Lake Tchad without having learned much that will be of interest and value to geographical science. On August 16 the journey across the desert was begun, and after many difficulties and hardships has now been safely ended by the arrival of Commandant Montell and his companions at Tripoli.

ART OF CHINA PAINTING

PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS TO HELP AMATEUR WORKERS.

Color Mixing and Tinting—How to Manage the Flesh Tints and How to Paint the Hair—Directions for Laying in the Background.

After some practice in painting figures in monochrome on china, the beginner may undertake the work in natural coloring with some assurance of success. Elizabeth Halsey Haines, an excellent teacher of mineral painting, makes her pupils use for flesh tints pompadour red and primary yellow in equal proportions, with sometimes the addition of a little ivory yellow. (Be very sparing in the use of the latter, as it is apt to destroy the quality of the red. All yellows are strong, and must be used judiciously.) In a very fair complexion use more red, and lay the tint very lightly. For a brunette, add a little ochre. For gray and half-tones, use Brunswick black; for the deeper brown shadows, take equal proportions of yellow ochre, pompadour red and lay touches of nearly all the colors with an ivory or horn palette knife; never use the brush.

Lay in the ground tint with one of your largest brushes, covering only a few inches at a time, and blend properly before the color dries. If they dry, get wet, the only thing to do is to clean off the paint with alcohol and begin again.

Having laid the tint as smoothly as possible proceed to blend with a No. 11 quill hair-brush. Always moisten the palm of the hand with alcohol and pass the stippler over it until the hand is dry. Never put a dry stippler to the work. When the tint is smooth carefully remove with the needle any speck of dust or hair. Next lay in the shadows with gray and black tones, using a small brush, lightly charged with color. Stipple from the flesh tint into the shadow, and blend until the job is imperceptible. Always stipple from the high lights to the darks—this is a standard rule.

Next lay in your deepest brown shadows, carefully covering the gray outline, thus giving a softer and richer appearance to the flesh. Should any dark spot appear remove it at once with the needle, which should be first moistened by touching it with the tongue.

PAINTING THE HAIR.

On the flesh tints being completed sharpen all the high lights with the needle or pointed stick; then stipple the edges that they may not be too abrupt. Outline the eyes, ears and mouth, and lay the brown tint for all but the mouth, for which use pompadour red, shaded with brown. Next paint the hair according to the directions given in a previous article. For light golden hair use ivory yellow and deepen the shadow with yellow ochre. For faxian hair use ivory yellow and shade with ochre with a touch of black in it. Yellow brown shaded with flesh brown tints produces a good autumn color; if very warm add a little pompadour red. For dark brown hair use finishing brown. Increase it in

The Possibilities of Gowns That Have Been Laid Away.

More than one woman has the problem of what to wear and how it shall be made starting her in the face. There are new goods to be had of course in endless variety, but if your pocketbook is not very well filled, look over last summer's wardrobe thoroughly first, and I think an hour of such work will mean money saved. Bring everything out to daylight. Inspect every old gown and wear waist critically and with a keen eye to future possibilities. Every woman will find that she has some such list as this: There will be the well-worn black skirt of serge probably, which has seen much wear. It needs darning here and there, and it has a doleful vestige of a train, which is tattered and dragged and looks like the last remnant of respectability. There are cool silk waists, which are reminiscent of dog days and are a trifle faded perhaps, but much too good to be cast aside. Sleeves are badly worn and frills and collars are soiled, but the tasteful, economical woman sees many a possibility of future usefulness about them. There is nothing so gratifying as the respect you feel for yourself when you see a gown which most folks would imagine was spick and span new out of which you have a very threadbare memory. When you have sorted out your garments into their particular piles, and have decided what can be done with them, do not stir over the most particular part of the task. I mean ripping them. It is not a very pleasant job, there may be cuts and tears which will make it difficult work and they may be dusty and dirty, but it will pay to go slow and handle your old gown as carefully as if it were in its new, dainty prime. Never fuss on two dresses at once. It will result in confusion and you will be sick of both before you are finished. Rip the waist first. Get a sharp pen-knife, then pin one side of the goods to your knee, hold the other firmly apart and cut each stitch very straight and carefully, being sure that you do not back into the cloth. Be careful in ripping the neck, armholes and the under arm seams, that you do not stretch the goods, for that would make it unfit for any further use. When it is entirely ripped, whisk out all the dust and dirt which has gathered in the seams and remove every trace of the old stitches. Now look over each piece of the goods and carefully remove stains before pressing and carefully remove the old buttons. If it is so much soiled that mere rubbing is of little avail, give it a good wash, that is, if it is washable.
