Will Grain Be Cheaper.

It begins to look as if the prices for feed stuffs in Ontario are coming down to a basis that doesn't mean prohibition to the ordinary farmer. With the possibility of securing this feed wheat, at Ontario mills, there is the question of American corn, that is coming in freely, and the declining prices in barley and oats.

Added to this there must be reckoned the fact that thousands of cattle have been sold by the farmers to go to the western ranches and to the Middle States. A large run of hogs has gone off to the market in only fair condition, while few pigs are being held for spring feeding. The crop of young pigs has been lessened in many ways. In many parts of the country no care was taken to ensure the safety of the litters. It seems to be within the mark to estimate a falling off of over one-third the usual supply of hogs for the spring markets, and the failure to keep breeding stock will no doubt as largely discount the summer marketings. Old horses have been got rid of in many places. All these facts demonstrate the economy in feed that has been made in view of high prices.

A lowering of the price of barley will have a tendency to send some of this grain to the feed lots also. This, with the increased supply of available grains and the decreased supply of stock on the farms, ought to figure out.

The farmers are thinking out profitable feeding rations as never before.

Or the other hand a table of retail prices compiled from the lists of reputable firms does not reveal that any general increase has taken place in 1907 as compared with 1906, except in regard to butter, cheese and also eggs, particularly the latter. In so far as the majority of meats are concerned, the retail figures are identical. True, milk has advanced in price, yet perhaps it is in respect to butter, cheese and eggs, that the greatest grumblings—if the word may be used—are heard.

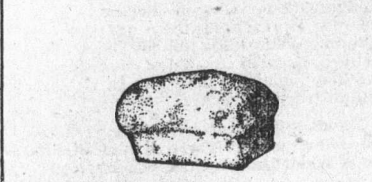
**New System of Roadmaking in Kent.**  
Quite an interesting innovation in road-making has been introduced in the County of Kent, where a new road engine, to which is attached five cars, has been put to work on the improvements which are being made on the county road. The cars are supposed to carry five wagon loads each, the entire outfit therefore hauling the same load as twenty-five wagons. This road train will make two trips a day which will keep the three crushers busy to provide the necessary loads. The cars are so constructed that by the use of a crank an aperture is opened in the bottom to allow the emptying of the cars in a manner which will distribute the material evenly on the roadbed.  
A man will travel with the outfit to attend to the distribution. The wheels of the wagon are 14 inches in width, and are so arranged that they are not in line and will serve to further harden the road by rolling it on their trips. The outfit was purchased from the J. I. Case Company. Formerly a large number of teams were used and men were engaged to spread the material. By the new process

the material is spread and the number of men employed is decreased. The new outfit is supposed to cut all the expenditure by about \$25 a day.—London Advertiser.



Port Huron, Nov. 22.—Van E. Crane,  
 aged defendant in the breach of promise

 "Well, really, I had not thought of  
 that yet. I hardly know what I will do,  
 but my, isn't that great. Ten thousand  
 dollars!"  
 Miss Barnes admitted that she did not  
 expect so big a verdict, but added that  
 she has suffered as a result of the aged  
 man's refusal to marry her was worth  
 every penny of the compensation that  
 the jury had given her.

**Homestead Entries.**  
 Ottawa, Nov. 26.—There was a big  
 decrease in the number of homestead  
 entries made in September, 1907, com-  
 pared with September, 1906. Of 200 or  
 a total of 611 made in September, 1907,  
 by persons coming from the United  
 States, there were 174 from North Dakota,  
 116 from Minnesota, 30 from Kansas, 33  
 from South Dakota, 39, each, from Wash-  
 ington and Wyoming, 29 from Michigan,  
 and 25 from Illinois.

**Special Prizes for the Seed Depart-  
 ment at the Winter Fair.**

The Official Premium List for the On-  
 tario Provincial Winter Fair to be held at  
 Guelph in December, contains a splendid  
 offering of prizes for the various depart-  
 ments embraced by this rapidly growing in-  
 stitution. The development of this fair  
 has not been a one-sided one but has taken  
 place along all lines which conduce to pro-  
 mote the general Agricultural industry of  
 the Province. Of all the various depart-  
 ments perhaps none had a more humble be-  
 ginning than did the Seed Department yet  
 no department has made more rapid growth  
 in the degree of intelligent interest taken in  
 the cause which it champions. This speaks  
 well for the far-sightedness of the Live  
 Stock Men of the Province who are quite  
 cognizant of the fact that while the Live  
 Stock industry of the country is relatively  
 the most important yet the success of this  
 industry really depends upon our ability to  
 successfully grow suitable and adequate  
 grain and fodder crops.  
 The losses that arise from sowing mixed  
 and inferior strains and the danger from  
 sowing weed seeds are coming to be recog-  
 nized more and more each year and as a  
 result the Seed Department at the above  
 fair as an institution designed to assist in  
 alleviating the prevailing difficulties has an  
 important place to fill. This Department  
 contains two general divisions. One divi-  
 sion provides accommodation for exhibits  
 of ordinary farm seed which has not re-  
 ceived any particular attention apart from  
 what any up-to-date, intelligent grower  
 would aim to give. The other division pro-  
 vides for the exhibition of "Specially Sele-  
 cted Seed" which has been grown and se-  
 lected according to the regulations of the  
 Canadian Seed Growers' Association. This  
 latter exhibition is designed chiefly to give  
 publicity to the work which the various  
 growers are doing by way of applying ap-  
 proved methods of seed-growing. The  
 prizes in this division are given by the  
 Association, while those for the first di-  
 vision are provided out of the general  
 funds at the disposal of the Fair Board.  
 This year a number of special prizes each  
 valued at about \$100.00 are offered.

**MORE THAN HALF PASSED.**  
**Results of Examinations for Teachers'**  
**Certificates and Matriculation.**

The following report has been issued by  
 the Minister of Education:  
 There were 4,368 candidates for teach-  
 ers' certificates, of whom 2,312 passed,  
 335 passed as result of teachers' report.  
 Of the 3,110 candidates for junior teach-  
 ers' certificates 1,518 passed or 49 per cent.;  
 341 of these would have failed but for  
 Latin 1,780 took Latin and 1,365 passed in it.  
 Of the candidates for district teachers'  
 certificates 92 per cent. passed; for junior  
 teachers' 49 per cent.; for senior teachers,  
 part 1, 61 per cent.; for senior teachers,  
 part 2, 74 per cent. Six out of the seven in  
 commercial and three out of four in art  
 passed.  
 The total number of appeals was 306, and  
 of these 76 were allowed.  
 For honor matriculation, in whole or  
 in part, there were 138 candidates who  
 were not candidates for teachers' certi-  
 ficates.  
 For junior matriculation in whole or in  
 part, the candidates numbered 2,959; 399  
 made full matriculation standing; 1,207  
 made what they tried for, partial matricu-  
 lation in what they tried for. Of 39 appeals 11  
 were sustained some only in part.

**A New Invasion.**  
 The statement made by prisoners in the  
 police cells at London that Canada is to be  
 invaded by an army of unemployed from  
 the United States is proven true by con-  
 ditions on this frontier at the present time.  
 The invasion is in full course now. The  
 discharge from employment of thousands of  
 men by the railways and steel and iron-  
 working concerns of the eastern States has  
 flooded the country with men seeking for  
 work. Throughout the States tales of  
 Canada's prosperity and the building of the  
 National Transcontinental Railway, and  
 other great works of development are cur-  
 rent, and the men out of work flock across  
 the border to seek it in Canada. Many  
 come from Ohio and Pennsylvania, but  
 others are from Buffalo and the cities of  
 western New York. At Buffalo the steel  
 plants have reduced the number of their  
 employees and the discharged men have  
 formed the army moving into Canada. The  
 dismissal of several hundred men by the  
 shutting down of the shipbuilding plant at  
 Bridgeburg has also had an effect on the  
 labor market along the frontier.

Mrs. Holmes, probably the oldest woman



### REVISION OF TEXT BOOKS.

**It is Being Urged by the Advisory Council of Education.**

The Advisory Council of Education is urging upon the department the necessity of the revision of the whole of the text book system, apart from the readers, on the revision of which the Council has been engaged for some time, in use in the public and high schools of the Province. The sub-committees who have had the matter under consideration have presented reports to the Minister of Education, in which they express themselves as being greatly dissatisfied with the existing condition of affairs. Not only do they complain that in the matter of the text books in use in the high schools that is considerable overlapping, but in respect to text books relating to such important subjects as history and geography, and which are in use in the public schools of the Province, they complain of inaccuracies.

### Champagne From Apple Cores.

The United States Consul at Collingwood, in a report to his Government, says that a Rochester firm has established plants at Collingwood and Creemore in which inferior apples have been evaporated for the Northwest market. But this Rochester firm has gone further than this. Following the example set in Chicago packing houses, where the squeal is the only part of the hog not turned to profitable account, the peelings and cores from this inferior fruit are dried and shipped to France for the purpose of forming the raw material for champagne.

This Collingwood case is not, if current reports are true, the only one in which the son in the form of finished product might be excused for failure to recognize its own father in the raw material. Thousands of bushels of turnips have this year been shipped from Ontario to Chicago, where it is said at least a part of the shipments, when mixed with timothy seed and properly flavored, become a very fine line of raspberry jam.

### STRAIGHT SALARY INSTEAD OF FEES.

**For Many Local Officers—Crown Attorneys May be Prohibited From Engaging in Private Practice.**

The Ontario Government has under consideration a comprehensive scheme for the general abolition of the fee system, particularly in relation to local semi-judicial officers.

Hon. Mr. Whitney, the Prime Minister, is out of the city, but a member of the Ministry told The News that, in view of the consideration and investigation which must necessarily precede any legislative action, it was doubtful if any programme would be sufficiently matured to present to the Legislature at its coming session. It is not improbable, however, that indications of the Government's plans may be submitted.

The object in view is understood to be the payment to all such officials as sheriffs, registrars and county crown attorneys of straight salaries, instead of the existing practice of authorizing them to collect fees. It is believed that the change will do away with many abuses, be equitable and just to the officials, and in many ways be of benefit to the municipalities. It is recognized that the remuneration would have to be determined to a large extent upon local conditions, and the average amount of work the officer is called upon to perform. The adoption of an equitable scale of salaries would be one entailing a close examination of many individual cases in which exceptional circumstances exist.

Some action may also be taken in relation to substituting the fees allotted to county magistrates and justices of the peace by a direct stipend. Another matter which may have consideration is the advisability of prohibiting county crown attorneys from engaging in private practice.

### Addresses on Agricultural Subjects At Winter Fair, Guelph.

A number of important subjects have been decided upon for discussion at the coming Winter Fair to be held at Guelph. The sessions of addresses will commence on Tuesday evening, Dec. 10th, and will continue through until Friday morning, Dec. 13th.

The necessity of good roads throughout the province is receiving considerable attention at the present time, and a session is being devoted to this subject at which, as well as Mr. A. F. Campbell, Good Roads Commissioner for Ontario, being present, Mr. D. Ward King, of Missouri, who is a good roads expert and the originator of the Split Log Drag, will be present to discuss this matter. This is a subject in which every person will be sufficiently interested to procure all available information as to how the roads may be improved.

Special attention is being given to addresses on the "Economic Feeding of Different Classes of Live Stock." Under the conditions prevailing at the present time, a discussion on this subject will prove very helpful to all feeders of live stock.

One of the most interesting addresses or demonstrations, will be given on the Friday morning, consisting of a practical demonstration of breaking or training a horse, by Mr. D. Ward King. As well as being of practical value to persons having horses to train, this demonstration will be of interest to everyone, and persons going to Guelph should remain over until Friday morning to see Mr. King and his plan of handling an unbroken horse. Two sessions will also be devoted to questions in connection with the horse industry, following the report of the special investigation into the horse industry of Ontario by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

A single fare passenger rate has been arranged over all lines running to Guelph from December 7th to 13th inclusive, good to return up to December 16th.

### Drainage Decision.

Ekfrid vs. Grand Trunk Railway.—The railway commissioners' engineer has reported and the commission decided to allow the McGugan drain to be constructed along the railway company's right of way, as desired by the Township of Ekfrid, but the commissioners require it to be kept sufficiently near the fence to allow the widening of the embankment for a double track, 28 foot beam (space between top of embankment and the top of the ditch).

This is the first decision which has been announced by the Railway Commissioners, with regard to their recent sittings in Chatham.—Planet.

After spending a few weeks in England and Ireland, Mr. Westgate will come on to Canada, expecting to spend Christmas at his old home near Watford. He has been in mission work for over nine years.

With additional contributions by sympathizers, a wing, to be known as the Sarah Maxwell Memorial, will be added to the Children's Hospital.

The oldest teacher in Elgin County is C. T. Burdick, of Aylmer, who announces that he will retire from active work at the close of the year after thirty-six years of active work in the public schools. His mantle will fall on Mr. John C. McLennan, the esteemed teacher of Watson's Corners, who has been active in the profession for twenty-eight years, twenty-five of which have been in his present school. This is a record that is probably unprecedented in the Province, and one that speaks well for Mr. McLennan's abilities as a successful teacher.

### The Price of Milk.

The following article, which is taken from the Wyoming Enterprise, applies with equal force to other places, and will be read with interest by a large number who have come to the conclusion that the boosting of prices has been carried too far:

Our milkman has raised the price of milk from 5c to 6c per quart. We protest against this action not because we are unwilling to pay the just and honest price of a commodity, but because of the injustice of the raise in the price. At any time milk is a dear commodity at 5c per quart. It pays the farmer better to sell milk at 5c per quart than it would pay him to sell the butter made from the same quantity of milk at 40 cents a pound. A cow that will produce one pound of butter per day is considered a paying animal. To do this she will produce four gallons of milk or sixteen quarts. Sixteen quarts of milk at 5c per quart is worth 80c. Allowing the milk man one half for the loss of buttermilk and for the wear and tear of rigs in delivery, (which is allowing him a large dividend for those things) our contention is still correct that he is better paid at 5c per quart for milk than other farmers are at the highest prices ever paid in Ontario for butter. A close estimate of the question would probably show that the milkman gets for his milk the equivalent of 50c per pound for butter.

It is true that in the cities the price of milk has gone up, but it must be remembered that there the milk has to be brought in by express from ten to fifty miles and after that it is put through the sterilizing process which involves an annual outlay of tens of thousands of dollars. The cases are not at all parallel. Six cents a quart for milk in Wyoming is an extortionate price, and is only the result of having no competition. If a few of the farmers in the surrounding country who have cows for the winter will put their milk into one can and bring it into the village they will have no difficulty in getting patronage and pledges for a year, and at 5c per quart they will make as good as forty to fifty cents per pound for milk. Here is a proposition for farmers worth their careful consideration, as we know of other villages not any larger than Wyoming where two milkmen have made a good thing out of the business and both sold at 5c per quart and even gave twenty one cents a quart for a dollar when paid in advance.

### Cheap Turkey for Christmas.

Everybody who cares to can enjoy turkey for Christmas dinner. In the first place the farmers do not want to keep anything this winter that will eat feed, and in the second place, there is a surplus of the big fowl in the country. As a consequence turkeys are much lower now than they were last year at this time. Saturday the market was flooded with turkeys of all kinds and sizes, and the farmers were very anxious to dispose of them. Of course, they may become a trifle scarcer along about the holiday time, but this is doubtful.

Last year there were many people who could afford this luscious dish, but this time it will be different. Saturday the price of a fine turkey was from 12 to 13 cents a pound. Last year at this time they were selling at an advance of two cents a pound over that price, which is about the same as beef.

Everything in the poultry line is cheaper this year, but eggs continue brisk at good prices.

The continued fine weather has much to do with the surplus of turkeys, for as long as the weather is good the farmers will not bother to pull roots, but will continue to bring in their produce.

The poorer classes are not bothering much as to the reason. The result is what they are looking at and they are thankful that prices are down.

### BY-LAW NO. 13, 1907, OF TOWNSHIP OF WARWICK.

A By-law to provide for drainage work in the Township of Warwick, in the County of Lambton, and for borrowing on the credit of the municipality the sum of \$252.30 for completing the same. Provisionally adopted the 11th day of Nov. 1907.

Whereas Thomas Brush, a party to be benefited by the drainage work has petitioned the Council of the said Township of Warwick to have the Six Side Road Drain extended to a proper outlet.

And whereas thereupon the said Council has procured an examination (under Section 76 of the Municipal Drainage Act), to be made by C. A. Jones, being a person competent for each purpose, of the said area proposed to be drained and the means suggested for the drainage thereof and of adjacent lands and roads liable to assessment under the Municipal Drainage Act, and has also procured plans, specifications and estimates of the drainage work to be made by the said C. A. Jones, and an assessment to be made by him of the lands and roads to be benefited by such drainage work, and of adjacent lands and roads liable for contribution thereto, stating as nearly as he can the proportion of benefit, outlet liability, and injurious liability which in his opinion will be derived or incurred in consequence of such drainage work by every road and lot or portion of lot, the said assessment so made being the assessment hereinafter by this by-law enacted to be assessed and levied upon the roads and lots or parts of lots hereinafter in that behalf specially set forth and described, and the report of the said C. A. Jones in respect thereof to be the said drainage work being as follows:

Petition, Sept. 4th, 1907.  
To the Municipal Council, Township of Warwick.  
GENTLEMEN:—In accordance with instructions received from your Honorable Body I have made a survey for the extension of the 67 sidewalk drain, con. 1, S.E.R. of your Township, to a more efficient outlet.

The present termination of work on this drain is on the 67 sidewalk, con. 1, S.E.R., about 24 rods east of the 67 sidewalk and 1 rod now proposed to extend it across lot 7, crossing the Blind Line, between cons. 1 and 2, 16 rods west of the line between lots 7 and 8, then continuing easterly along the southern side of said Blind Line 33 rods, then southerly about 2 1/2 rods where it empties into a drain of considerable size on lot 8, con. 2, S.E.R., all as shown more particularly by red line on the accompanying plan of the locality.

I am starting the upper end of the proposed work at the 67 sidewalk of Sept. 1904, as the lower portion of the previous work has filled up on lots 7 and 8, then continuing easterly along the 67 sidewalk, con. 1, S.E.R., to the point where the drain leaves the sidewalk and enters lot 7, and I have then continued the drain along the southern side of the Blind Line, and at lot 112 is at the outlet into the drain above referred to.

The average depth across lot 7 will be about 2 ft. and along the Blind Line about 2 ft. 8 in.

I have prepared a plan and profile of the work, specification, estimate of cost and schedule of assessment, all of which I herewith submit.

4th. For paying the sum of \$9.80 the amount assessed against the said roads of the Municipality and for covering interest thereon for 2 years at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, a special rate on the dollar, sufficient to produce the required yearly amount therefor shall over and above all other rates be levied and collected, (in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are levied and collected) upon and from the whole rateable property in the said Township of Warwick, in each year for two years, after the final passing of this by-law, during which the said debentures have to run.

5th. This by-law shall be published once in every week for four consecutive weeks in the GUYTON ADVOCATE newspaper, published in the Village of Watford, and shall come into force upon and after the final passing thereof and may be cited as the Six Side Road Drain Outlet By-law.

### Ontario's Fruit Was Badly Packed.

London, Nov. 28.—British Columbia captured the gold medal at the Royal Horticultural Society's Show, which opened to-day.
