



Engineer and Fireman Badly Scalded in a Smash at Burlington-Men at the Same Posts of Duty Killed in an Accident a Little East of Smith's Falls.

Burlington, Ont., March 1 .- (Special:)rand Trunk passenger train No. 12, due in Toronto at 1.15, ran into an open switch ere about 1 o'clock this orning and rashed into the rear of a freight special that was standing on a siding.
Engineer Hutchinson and Fireman Clark
were badly scalded and burned as a result
of the accident, and are now lying in a

The force of the collision was such that the baggage car of the passenger train was forced over the tender of the engine. The engineer and fireman were pinned beneath the wreck, and as the baggage car took fire it was only with great diriculty that they were rescued from a most terrible death. No passengers were seriously injured, though several were budly shaken up.

The cagine of the passenger train was badly wrecked, but with the exception of the baggage car none of the coacnes left the rails. The caboose on the freight train was totally wrecked and the other cars forced together, breaking the drawbars. The wreckage was promptly cleared from the track, and traffic over the branch was not disturbed.

DRIVER AND FIREMAN KILLED Smash on the C.P.R. Near Smith's Falls

Resulted in the Death of Charles Sims and William Wilson. Smith's Falls, March 1.-A terrible co. sion, with loss of life, occurred on the 3 and 4 o'clock this morning. M'MASTER UNIVERSITY. Public Meeting of the Theological Society

-Rev. Dr. Strong on the Fall ersity held a most successful open mest ing last night in the chapel, which was crowded with visitors. The president o the society, Mr. W. J. Padey, was in the

crowded with visitors. The president of the society, Mr. W. J. Padey, was in the chair. The evening was opened by devotional exercises, and a fine rendering of "We Praise Thee, O God," by the Glee Club of the University.

The lecturer of the evening, the Rey, Dr. Strong of Rochester Theological Seminary, was introduced in a capital speech by Dr. Goodspead, the honorary president of the Theological Society, and was warmly welcomed by the students and their friends, His subject was "Man's Fail and Redemption in the Light of Evolution," and, 'ntroducing it, the Rev. Dr. Strong said that he had learned four things in the course of his line's teaching: (1) Hospitality to new ideas. (2) Truth is not made to be error because it is taught by men-like Hegel. (3) New truth does not exclue the old, but rather clucidates and confirms it. (4) The truth, he believed, must be trusted and proclaimed by him.

Setting out on this broad-minded basis, the lecturer said that the relation of religion to evolution was the problem of the time. Most people feel the truth of evolution, yet fear the result. He then showed that philosophy and science confirm religion; that evolution is not a cause but a method. God is the cause, Evolution does not exclude Christianity; since we believe in a dynamical universe, with God as the source of energy, evolution is the very backbone of Christianity.

Examining the doctrine of man's fail, Dr. Strong said that science teaches that man is the product of previous forms of life; if these forms are of God, then the biological idea does not exclude the Christian idea; if God is the only feature in nature, then the idea that man is the offspring of fine brute creation does not prevent him from being the offspring of God. That man is mmorality is claimed to be the survival of his brute origin is false. The law of evolution required that when man developed he was no longer a brute, but man. His fall was due to self-perversion; he wilfully wandered from God into the darkness of blunders, and transmitted his

Christian Seciology.

That everybody was not interested in the elections yesterday was evident from the large attendance at the Christian Sociology Conference held in Bond-street Congregational Church. The convention met in the afternoon, when the subject, "Instancy in Our Faith and Service" was ably handled by Prof. Taylor of Chicago, who removed from his home on the Boulevard to a tenement house in the slums, where he carries on a personal socialistic work. In the evening the Professor dealt with "The Chivalry of Modern Social Life." A general discussion followed the address, and an informal reception was held at the close.




