

LIEUT.-GOV. M'INTYRE NOW. The Ex-Member for Kings Gets the Appointment for Prince Edward Island.



General Lawton is Now Taking Rest After His Marvelous 30 Days' Campaign.

Manila, May 24 .- (6.25 p.m.) -Two companies of the Third Infantry and two companies of the 22nd Infantry, forming Gen. Lawton's rear guard, returning from San Miguel to Balinag, yesterday, escorting a signal party, which was picking up wire laid with Gen. Lawton's expedition, found that the insurgents had re-occupied the country and hard fighting followed from daylight until the Americans camped at night. But the troops completed their work, though harrassed by the enemy.

One American was killed and 14 were wounded. The troops captured 20 prisoners and 30 rifles.

Five Men Were Drowned. Five Men Were Drowned.

It developed to-day that five men, instead of one man, were drowned by the sinking of a raft, loaded with soldiers of the 14th Regiment, at the Pasig Ferry yesterday. Twenty insurgents were killed and 40 wounded in the engagement with Major Bell's reconnoticering party in the vicinity of Santa Arita yesterday.

General Lawton with most of his troops has arrived at Malolos. His remarkable expedition marched 120 miles in 20 days and had 21 fights, captured 28 towns, destroyed 3000 bushels of rice and only lost six men killed and 31 wounded. On the other hand Gen. Lawton estimates that his troops killed 400 insurgents and wounded double that number.

The United States commissioners and many American officers celebrated Queen Victoria's birthday to-day on board the British first-class cruiser Powerful. Lawton a Fighter.

LAWTON TAKING A REST

After His 30 Days of Successful Campaigning With 6000 Men. New York, May 24.-Gen, Lawton, after 30 days of successful campaigning, is resting with 6000 men at Candaba, says a Manila special to The Journal. He said: "It pained me when we got into San Isldor to see on the walls of the prison there the names of the 15 Americans from the Yorktown. From Colonel Ray, the Spanish officer, whom we rescued, I learned that one of the American prisoners escaped from his captors. His freedom was short lived, however, for he was afterwards recaptured. He was stretched on the ground before his fellow prisoners and 20 lashes were given to him.
