MORE PAY FOR SOLDIERS.

Applications for boards will be forwarded to the War Office for consideration.

Ottawa, Sept. 7.—Military general orders promulgated this morning contain the following:

Permanent force, pay of warrant officers—The following will be inserted after paragraph 28, part III, regulations and orders, 1898: "29.—An increase of pay will be granted at the rate of 25 cents per diem to all warrant officers after four years' service as such. A further increase of pay at the rate of 25 cents per diem will be paid to such warrant officers after eight years' service as such."

Allowances for drill instruction—With reference to paragraph 37, part III, regulations and orders, 1898, the allowance for drill instruction to companies of garrison artillery, 50 rank and file or over, is increased from \$20 to \$40 per annum.

Examination of recruits—Paragraph 40, part III, subsection 3, regulations and orders, 1898, is cancelled, and the following inserted as subsection 3: "It is the intention of the regulations, as regards examinations, that recruits who are recommended by the commanding officer of a company to be admitted to the ranks of the regiment, shall be examined by the commanding officer of the regiment, and the examination will be confined to that company, and to the handling of the arms as mounted officers of infantry."

No medals will be awarded to successful candidates who receive a certificate of approval.

Woman's World

THE OPENING AT SIMPSON'S

Millinery Show Rooms at the Big Store Were Crowded With Admirers of Femininity Yesterday.

The fall millinery openings are with us, and upon each woman devolves the pleasant duty of selecting a hat or toque or bonnet for the coming season. As happens every year, selection becomes more difficult owing to the wealth of novelties shown and the great beauty and style of fascinating headgear. At Simpson's yesterday the temporary, the very effective, showrooms up in the new store were thronged with admiring femininity—an amazing number of them Americans, with whom it has become a custom to purchase millinery in Toronto—all bent upon securing early in the season a smart and becoming hat wherewith to adorn their heads thru fall or winter. A glance at the show cases, which, by the way, display the greatest taste in arrangement, each containing its own color, reveals many interesting facts in regard to the millinery for the coming season. Strikingly noticeable in the hat, lined with velvet, and the capeline, and in the countless other shapes for which there appears to be no name. These are trimmed with the most lovely plumes, feathers, and flowers, and, amazingly, indistinguishably beautiful in tone, with ostrich plumes, monster roses, feather pompons, bunches of coque feathers or drapes of lace or embroidery. Buckles are more artistic, and consequently more expensive, than ever, and an entirely new trimming is shown in epingle, a fine, thin silk, which comes in all the new shades, very finely plisse.

As to color, that loveliest of shades, known as pasha, which comes in so many tones, each more lovely than the other, is the color of the season. Cantor, in many shades, combined with turquoise, is very charming, and the always effective combination of turquoise with black is very noticeable. "Yellow", from delicate lemon shades to the deep, warm orange tint, is especially attractive and modish, while good browns are so exquisite as to divide honors with cantor. Many other colors, and shades of color are shown, of course, but these are the chief ones chosen from the Paris hats shown at Simpson's.

Feathers are as much in use, and pheasants, doves, guilts, algeas, coque's feathers and ostrich plumes will be the striking feature of the winter hats. Whole quills, made of feathers or birds' breasts, require little trimming, and huge feather pompons, edged with chenille, are among the novelties which bid fair to have an immediate vogue. Then, Simpson's have an especially attractive lot of wings, made of net, or mousseline, exquisitely embroidered in gold and silver, and trimmed with feathers, and made of modish masses of lace in black or cream. These make very effective trimming.

The huge roses, which are of themselves almost sufficient trimming for a hat, will command themselves to every woman's heart. Many of them are blue—in fact, black flowers and pompons are the very latest idea—the note of color being supplied by the elaborate and ornate center of the crown.

But the toques are still in high favor, and Simpson's are showing some beauties. One, which comes over the face, is of red and black panne, in two shades; about the brim is a rich and beautiful drape of camel and blue, in varied tones of reds, and a high mount of white coque feathers, with a fascia band of paradise egret at the left side, completes an exceedingly stylish affair.

Platter and broader is a toque of white couglat, having a crown of green velvet leaves and a drape of camel and blue on the brim. A white bird of paradise egret which rises high at the side, is caught by a handsome buckle of reseda and steel. Under the brim are sprays of the green velvet leaves.

The double-brimmed hat, which drops over the face, is one of the very new at Simpson's. It is of white panne velvet, each brim bound with black velvet, and has a low black velvet crown. At each side of the crown is a large black feather pompon, and between these, and directly across the front of the crown, is a beautiful steel and green metal buckle. At the back there is a huge black bow of black velvet, stitched three times about the edges.

Very striking and stylish is a capeline, lined below the brim with narrow folds of black tulle, bound with black velvet. On the underside is a long bow of camel and steel, handsomely studded with turquoise. The crown is composed of drapes of turquoise panne velvet, edged with narrow stripes of black ostrich feathers, and a large drooping breast of black feathers trims the side.

Alternate filled rows of narrow black velvet, and ribbon are employed with stylish effect to form a low, drooping-brimmed hat, with graceful lines. The trimming of this hat is a huge black feather pompon, whose leaves are edged with chenille; beneath the crown is a large black velvet bow, and the whole is finished with black ribbon velvet.

Black and mourning hats are especially good this year at Simpson's. I noticed that a great many of them are made of black silk, bound with black velvet, and often the crown is a huge black rose. Others equally stylish are composed entirely of softly folded black epingle. Indeed, softly-draped brims are the general rule in all hats this season.
