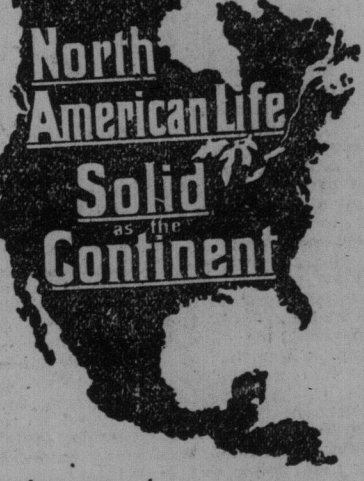

C.P.R. AND THE STEAMSHIP LINES
 The most difficult detail to adjust in the fast Atlantic deal is the interests of the various shipping companies, which will not participate in the proposed subsidies, if the C.P.R. gets the contract. Public opinion undoubtedly favors the C.P.R. against all other competitors for the service. The C.P.R. is the only company that is able to give the service that is desired. None of the existing steamship lines can quote a rate, as it were, without the co-operation of the C.P.R., whereas the latter can undertake to cover the whole ground from London to Vancouver. The C.P.R. is a sine qua non of the proposed express highway through Greater Britain. At the same time, it is just possible a wrong may be done if the shipping companies now doing the business are to be heavily subsidised. As we understand the deal, the proposed subsidies are intended solely for the establishment of a fast service for passengers and mails. We do not think it is contemplated to subsidize the freight end of the business. Whether it is possible to give any particular line a subsidy for mails and passengers without also giving it an advantage in the matter of freight, we do not know, but we do not believe it is the intention of the government to subsidize the carrying of freight, nor would public opinion favor such a policy. The steamship lines have all along contended that a fast service could not be operated, except at a loss, and the fact that none of them have accepted the government's standing offer would seem to establish the honesty of their convictions as to the absolute necessity of a large subsidy for a fast service. This being the case, the matter for adjustment would seem to be limited to the amount that should be given by way of subsidy to the C.P.R. The steamship companies all admit the necessity of the subsidy to the line giving the service demanded. The whole question simmers down to one of amount. The various lines have already placed themselves on record in this matter. None of them have seen fit to accept the government's money and give the service. They cannot now very well object to a new concern offering to do what they have for years refused. Still, they have a right to demand that the subsidy shall be limited to the specific object of the passenger and mail traffic, and shall not be extended so as to give the company an advantage in the matter of freight. Experts in the business ought to be able to fix on the "differential," as the railway people express it. The steamship lines cannot oppose the subsidy on principle, the only valid argument they can raise is that the subsidy is too large. If so, let them show to what extent it should be reduced.

STATISTICS WOULD BE VALUABLE.
 We have accurate statistics as to the quantity and value of the various kinds of merchandise that are imported into and exported from the country. We don't seem, however, to have any accurate information as to the amount of money that is collected by foreign railways, foreign ports and foreign steamship companies for handling this merchandise. It would be very useful if such information were available at the present moment when the subject of the proposed fast Atlantic service is under discussion. The business in transportation that is lost to Canadian carrying companies must in the aggregate reach a very big figure. We learn, for instance, that eighty per cent of the imports of the T. Eaton Company come to Toronto via Boston and New York and over United States railways. During five months of the year

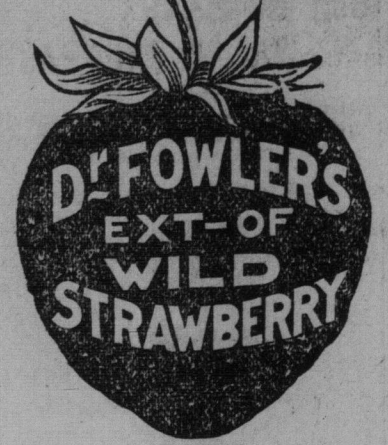

at least the bulk of Toronto's imports come through the shipping that now finds its way through American channels were diverted to Canadian shores and Canadian railways, the gain to Canada would be very considerable. The establishment of a fast Atlantic service and the betterment of the question of subsidies ought to secure for Canada a large part of the business that is done by the United States. The whole of this business, in fact, should be done by Canada, and while the conference is considering the question of subsidies the Dominion government might also discuss the advisability of limiting the 33-1-3 per cent. British preference to such goods as enter Canada in British bottoms and through Canadian ports. The question could be much more intelligently discussed if accurate statistics had been prepared, showing just what Canada is losing and what the United States is gaining through our inadequate shipping facilities.

NEW SCHEME FOR INCREASING BUSINESS.
 The merchants of several of the cities of the United States have adopted a new scheme for increasing their trade with the residents of the surrounding country. The idea consists in paying the railway fares of persons who come to the city and purchase a certain amount of goods. Buffalo, Syracuse and Utica are among the cities of New York State which have adopted the idea. In these places the scheme is confined to the wholesale trade. In Indianapolis it is the retail merchants who have adopted it, and they have agreed to a plan which involves the refunding of the entire railway fare, both ways, to persons living within a radius of 54 miles from the city upon the purchase of \$25 worth of merchandise from any one member of the association or from all combined. Those living at a greater distance than 54 miles are to pay for the excess over that distance. For the carrying out of the scheme a "rebate" book is used, containing the names of all the firms in the association with a place opposite each firm's name for the entry of the amount of goods purchased. The customer makes for one of these at the first store of those named as members of the association which he enters. As the purchases are made, the amounts are entered in the book, and at the last place at which the customer does his shopping he is directed where he may receive his rebate. A record is kept by the association of all amounts purchased of the various stores, so that the assessments against them may be equitably adjusted according to the benefits received. The book also has a list of the towns and villages within the radius. The initiation fee is \$25 and the annual dues are \$10. In addition to this an assessment is levied upon each of the members of the association, this fund to be used under the direction of a special committee for the payment of the salary of the business manager, advertising, printing expenses, etc.

The final adjustment of expense to the individual members of the association is to be determined on Sept. 1 by proportioning the amount of business transacted by each firm or member with the total amount transacted by the association according to the plan in use. So that, if the benefits derived are less than the initial assessment, the difference is to be rebated; but if the benefits are in excess of the initial assessment, an additional assessment is levied on the members of the firm doing such in-lieu benefits. This makes each member's assessment at the September adjustment proportionate to the amount of business transacted.

The holding of excursions at certain times enables the association to secure special rates on the railroads and makes their advertisement of the plan more effective. For this purpose, all the members of the Indianapolis association furnish it with copies of their mailing lists. A complete list is then made and sent to one of the city papers in which an advertisement of the plan is to appear. Besides its issue to its usual subscribers, this paper sends a copy of the edition containing the advertisement to each of the customers named in the list.

The Chamber of Commerce of Philadelphia is now considering the advisability of applying the scheme to that city and the Philadelphia Union says that it will probably be in operation by the first of next month.

Inquest on Dead Infant.
 The investigation into the death of the infant found in High Park on July 24 by Mounted Constable Gutrie, was resumed last night by Coroner Lynd at No. 6 station. No important evidence was forthcoming and another adjournment till next Friday night was made. In the meantime the detectives will attempt to learn the identity of the dead infant.

Stoddard's Wife Dead.
 New York, Aug. 1.—Elizabeth Barry Stoddard, wife of Richard Henry Stoddard, the poet and critic, died today at her home in this city, aged 80.

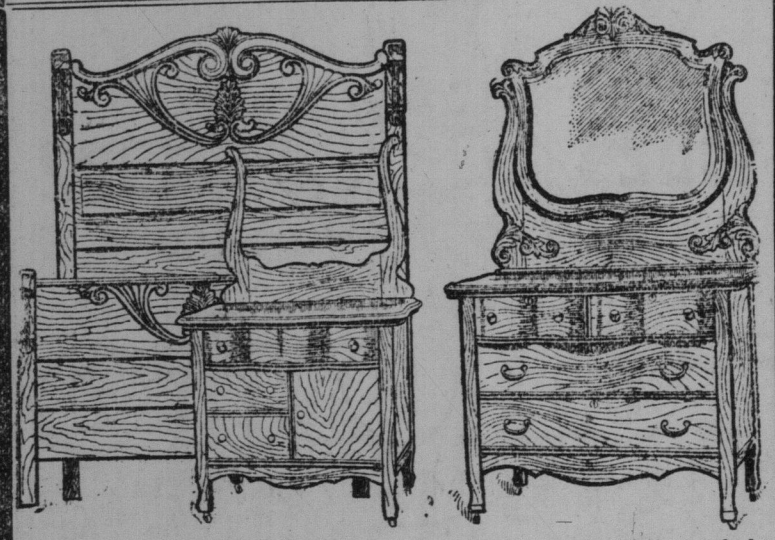
Police Court Record.

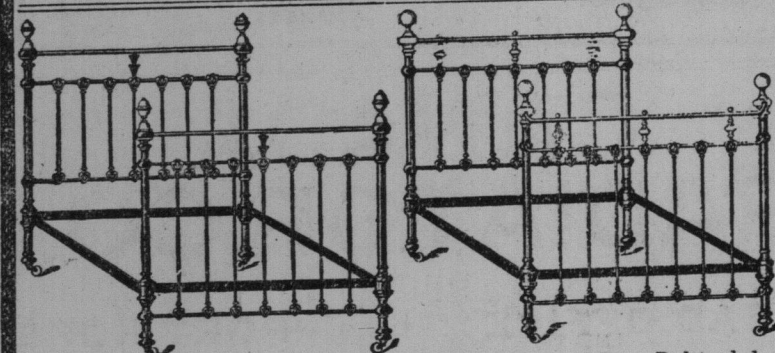
