TWENTY-FIVE LIVES LOST IN TENEMENT FIRE IN NEW YORK.

Mad Scramble to Escape Caused Fearful Scenes—Incendiarism Believed to Be Cause.

New York, Nov. 1.—Twenty-one men, three women and a ten-month-old baby, met death either by suffocation or burns in a fire early today in the fifth-story tenement at No. 429 Elysee-avenue, which has been of incendiary origin. Some witnesses are of the opinion that the fire was caused by a gas stove, which was practically extinguished in 20 minutes, but the police could learn of no one person being injured, other than those who lost their lives and whose property loss was only \$7000. The dead are mostly Italian. The only person injured as far as can be learned, is Mary Jane Quinn, 47 years old, who was severely bruised by leaping from the second floor to the ground.

HOME THIS VERY MORNING.



Boston, Mass., Nov. 1.—(From Our Own Man.)—The Mayflower arrived this morning from England just 12 hours late. A. B. Aylesworth, K.C., Toronto, was on board, and declared he had had a pleasant voyage, the weather had been rough at times. He is looking in the pink of condition. Asked to give a short statement of how the Alaskan award had been arrived at, he replied to The World: "The award was decided chiefly on the strength of Vancouver's history, as the treaty of 1825 was written in French. The point of the arbitration was the interpretation of the word 'tains'. The signers did not know where the mountains lay. The United States contended that the line was to be the coast line, and the British contended that it was to be the line of the mountains. The award means a great loss to the merchants of Vancouver and Victoria, until a railway is constructed to Dawson. While the award will not affect the business of the White Pass and Yukon route, it does affect the business of the Portland Canal, and followed the mountains nearest the sea coast. Canada should have let deep enough to her possessions. The lands conceded are worthless, except for their mineral and strategic location." Mr. Aylesworth will arrive in Toronto tomorrow morning, 10:30.

TRIED TO CROSS THE TRACKS BUT STREET RAILWAY WAS THERE FIRST.

Grand Trunk Railway Restrained From Putting in Diamond on Front Street.

The Grand Trunk Railway Company endeavored to steal a march on the Toronto Street Railway on Saturday by putting in a diamond crossing over the car tracks on Front street between John and Peter streets without the knowledge or consent of the street railway people. Even Mackenzie, however, was notified about noon, and at once took proceedings to stop the work by having James W. Bain of Lawlor & Co. present an affidavit reciting that the Grand Trunk had not obtained proper authority to cross the street. This was signed by General Manager Keating and an ex-parte injunction was granted by Chancellor Boyd, restraining the company from proceeding with the work.

RESENTMENT THE KEYNOTE OF BANQUET TO AYLESWORTH

Music, Songs and Flags Will Mark the Sentiment of the Occasion and Lead Peculiar Significance to the Gathering.

BLAZE IN THE VATICAN LEO'S LIBRARY DAMAGED

Several Roman Officials Enter the Pope's Palace and Assist the Firemen.

Rome, Nov. 1.—A fire broke out at half past eight this evening in that portion of the Vatican containing the Hall of Inscriptions, where the Pope gives his audiences, and which is adjacent to the famous Sistine, or Raphael's, gallery. The flames caused a great deal of damage to the library, and the firemen were called to assist in the restoration of their original condition. The matter will be argued this morning before Chancellor Boyd at Osgoode Hall.

FIERCE BATTLE ENDED WITH RESULT IN DOUBT

Greatest Political Contest in New York's History Closed, with \$2,000,000 in Wagers Up.

Elections will be held in eleven states across the line on Tuesday. Full state tickets are to be voted for in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maryland, Ohio, Kentucky, Iowa and Mississippi, while in New York, Pennsylvania, Nebraska and Colorado a contest is being waged between the state university, or minor state officers are to be chosen. Municipal officers are to be selected in Greater New York, San Francisco and Salt Lake City. The most interesting contests are in Greater New York between Tammany and the fusion forces, the effort of Tom Johnson to save his political life in Ohio. Indications point to a close race in Greater New York and both sides are claiming victory. In Maryland the battle is between the national administration and Senator Gorman. Chairmen of state committees have made their final statements and all parties are ready for the ballot.

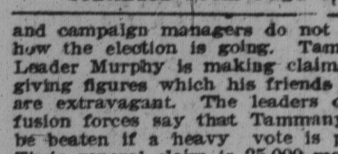
