JANUARY.

On the 21st of this month the Sun enters Aquarius, the eleventh sign of the Zodiac, so called from water, because it generally brings rain. This constellation is represented by the figure of a man pouring out water from an urn. The Mythology is as follows:—Gany-mede, son of Troas, King of Troy, was taken by Jupiter, in the form of an eagle to Heaven, as he was tending his father's flock, on Mount Jela, and became cup-bearer to the Gods instead of Hebe.

Recipe to prevent the feet of horses balling with snow.—If the frog in the hoofs of horses and the fetlock be cleaned, and well rubbed with soft soap, previously to their going out in snowy weather, it will effectually prevent their falling, from what is termed balling the snow. A number of accidents might be prevented by this simple precaution.

January will set in this year with clear cold weather, which may be expected to last several days,—about the middle of the month soft weather, with occasional falls of snow,—towards the end of the month, severe frost,—on the 28th, the glass will stand at 27½ below zero.

FEBRUARY.

On the 18th of this month the Sun enters the constellation of Pisces, properly a fish with scales, being the last of the twelve signs of the Zodiac. Minerva placed this constellation in the heavens to commemorate the escape of Venus and Cupid from the giant Typhon.—They were one day sitting on the bank of the Euphrates, and seeing the giant approach, they threw themselves into the sea and became fishes, and so escaped.

The planet Venus will be the Evening Star until July 26,—after that period she will be the Morning Star to the end of the year.

To bring horses out of a stable on fire.—Throw the harness or saddles to which they may have been accustomed, over the backs of the horses in this predicament, and they will come out of the stable as tractably as usual.

This month will set in with variable weather. Occasional heavy falls of snow, succeeded by severe frosts, will be the distinguishing features of the weather until the 16th, when, at 8 minutes after 6 o'clock in the evening a change will take place, when softer breezes with showers of rain may be expected.

MARCH.

On the 21st of this month the Sun enters Aries, or the Ram, being the first sign of the Zodiac, and makes the Vernal Equinox. Phryxus and his sister Helle, flying from the designs of their Step Mother Ino, got upon a ram, to aid their flight, but while swimming across the narrowest part of Pontus, Helle was drowned, whence the sea was called the Hellespont, — Phryxus got safe to Æta, King of Colchis, where he sacrificed the ram to Jupiter, who afterwards placed it among the constellations.

Table Beer from Sugar.—To 4 pounds of coarse brown sugar, add 10 gallons of water, then put in three ounces of hops, and let the whole boil for three quarters of an hour, and work it as usual. It should be kept a week or ten days before it is tapped, when it will improve daily afterwards, within a moderate time of consumption.

March will set in this year with mild weather and occasional falls of snow. Towards the middle of the month, heavy gales of wind from the north west may be expected, — about the 25th the weather will become more settled, and indications of the snow melting will be observable.

APRIL.

On the 19th the Sun enters Taurus, or the Bull, being the second sign of the Zodiac. This constellation contains the Pleiades, Aldebaran, &c. The Pleiades derive their name from a Greek word signifying sailing; when they rise they portend good weather to sailors. They were the seven daughters of Atlas, and were translated into Heaven, because they incessantly lamented the hard fate of their father, who was converted into a mountain.

To destroy the Fly on Turnips.—Lime sown by the hand, or distributed by a machine, is an infallible protection to turnips against the ravages of the fly. It should be applied as soon as the turnips come up, and in the same daily rotation in which they were sown. The lime should be slacked immediately before it is used, if the air be not sufficiently moist to render that operation unnecessary.

On the 2d of this month the River will be quite clear of ice, although until the 15th the mornings and evenings will be particularly cold,—after that period fine weather will set in, when the Farmers will be very busy.

MAY.

On the 20th the Sun enters Gemini, or the Twins, the third sign of the Zodiac. This constellation derives its name from its containing two large stars named Castor and Pollux.

These were twin brothers, the sons of Jupiter and Leda. Castor, being mortal, was killed by Lynceus. Pollux was an immortal, and being warmly attached to his brother, prayed to Jupiter to restore him to life again. This was refused, but finally it was agreed that Pollux should divide his immortality between himself and his brother Castor, so they afterwards lived by turns every other day, or, as some say, every other fortnight. At length they were both placed in the Heavens and became the constellation Gemini.

Remedy against the bite of the Turnip Fly.—It is upon the principle of creating an offensive smell that turnip seed is recommended to be steeped in train oil before it is sown. This has been found to be a perfect security against the bite of the turnip fly.

The beginning of this month will be cold and rainy, towards the middle fine weather will set in, and will continue fair to the end of the month, the glass ranging from 56 to 62.

JUNE.

On the 21st of this month the Sun passes the Tropic of Cancer, the fourth sign of the Zodiac.—It is that parallel of latitude over which the sun passes at the greatest declination, 23° 28' north. The sun at the same time reaches the constellation Cancer, or the Crab. Hercules was sent to destroy a *hydra*, a serpent that had seven heads, in the Lake of Lerna.—When any of these heads were cut off another instantly grew in its place, unless the blood which flowed from the wound was immediately staunch'd. Iolaus brought lighted brands, with which he seared the wounds Hercules made, and so killed the monster.—Juno sent a crab to annoy his feet while thus engaged, which he destroyed, but the Goddess, to reward its services, placed it in the Heavens.

To destroy Slugs upon Wheat.—Collect a number of lean ducks; keep them all day without food, and turn them into the fields towards evening; each duck would devour the slugs much faster than a man could collect them, and they would soon get very fat for market.

This month the weather will set in with temperate heats, the glass varying from 66 to 75. From the middle to the end of the month the weather will become warmer, with rain and thunder squalls.

JULY,

On the 23d of this month the Sun enters the constellation of Leo, or the Lion, the fifth sign of the Zodiac. It contains 95 Stars and Regulus of the first magnitude.

The first labour of Hercules was, that he tore to pieces with his nails the terrible lion of the woods of Nemeæ, and made a shield and breast-plate of his skin. Jupiter, to commemorate the deed, placed the lion among the constellations.

Dysentery and Bilious Disorders.—The medical qualities of pulverized charcoal are daily developing themselves. In addition to its value in bilious disorders, two ounces of the charcoal, boiled in a pint of fresh milk, may be taken in doses of a wine-glassful, by adults, every two hours, in the most obstinate dysentery, until relief is imparted, which has not failed to be the effect in almost every instance. It is harmless and the experiment may be safely tried. Charcoal made from maple wood is the fittest for this purpose.

The weather during this month may be expected to be uniformly fine, with the exception of occasional severe thunder storms. The glass on the 21st will stand, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, at 90 in the shade.

AUGUST.

On the 22d of this month the Sun reaches the constellation Virgo, or the Virgin, being the sixth sign of the Zodiac. Astræa, the daughter of Aurora and Astræus, the Titan, was esteemed the Princess of Justice, and the heathen poets say that in the golden age she descended to preside over the earth, but became at last so disgusted with the wickedness of the world, that she returned to Heaven and became the constellation now called Virgo.

To Correct Damaged Grain.—Put the injured article into an oven, from which the bread has been just drawn. Spread it in a bed, of from three to four inches in thickness, and stir it frequently with a shovel or rake, to facilitate the disengagement of the vapour. In ten or fifteen minutes, according to its humidity, withdraw it; when perfectly cool and aired, it will be restored to its wholesome qualities.

From the 1st to the 12th of this month the weather will be intensely warm, with occasional heavy thunder storms.—After that period, to the end of the month, the heat will be more temperate. The weather during the entire of this month will be most favorable for agricultural purposes.

SEPTEMBER.

On the 23d of Sept. the Sun enters the constellation *Libra*, or the Scales, containing 51 stars and being the seventh sign of the Zodiac. The sun at this period is perpendicular over the equator, and as it enlightens half the globe 90 degrees every way, the rotative circles are cut into equal halves from the north pole to the south; consequently at this time the day and night are equal all over the globe—and hence this constellation is called *Libra* or the Scales.

To Preserve Wheat.—Kiln dry it and put it in cubical cases of earthenware, glazed on the outside, and filled full as possible; cover them by a piece of the same ware made to fit close, and secured with a mixture of pitch, tar, and hemp cloth, till the whole be made air tight. A case of this kind might be made which would hold four bushels or a quarter of wheat.

The same temperate weather which characterized the last part of last month, will continue until the 9th of this,—after which period we may expect much rain, together with heavy gales of wind, until the 25th, when it will become more settled, and clear cold weather will ensue, which will last but a few days.

OCTOBER.

The Sun enters the eighth sign of the Zodiac, Scorpio or the Scorpion, on the 23d of this month. This constellation contains 44 stars, and was so called from Orcon, a lover and constant companion of Diana, being killed by a scorpion, sent for that purpose by the Earth, who was sorely displeased at his presumption in boasting that he could outrun and subdue the wildest and fiercest beast.—He was afterwards carried to the Heavens and placed among the constellations.

Pea Straw.—In Scotland, the haum of peas is used as fodder for working horses instead of hay; and when well harvested, forms a very excellent provender, inasmuch that it is considered to be of almost equal value to the grain itself.

The first few days of this month will be dry and clear, with slight frosts during the night, but temperately warm at midday. On the 11th this weather will break up with a violent gale of wind from the north west, accompanied with rain, which will last 24 hours; afterwards to the end of the month the weather will be broken and rainy. On the 31st a shower of snow will fall but will not lie.

NOVEMBER.

On the 22d of this month the Sun enters the 9th sign of the Zodiac, Sagittarius, or the Archer. This constellation contains 69 stars. Chiron, the centaur son of Saturn and Philyra, who was eminent for his skill as a physician, while handling the arrows of Hercules, one of them, dipped in the poisonous blood of the Lernaean Hydra, fell on his foot, and inflicted an incurable wound; the pain was so intolerable that he desired to die, but could not, being of immortal parentage. The Gods, however, translated him to the firmament, and he became the constellation Sagittarius.

To make Excellent Bread.—Mix seven pounds of best flour, with three pounds of pared boiled potatoes. Steam off the water, and leave them a few minutes on the fire, mash them fine, and mix them whilst quite warm in the flour, with a spoonful or more of salt. Put a quart of water, milk warm, with three large spoonfuls of yeast, gradually to the potatoes and flour. Work it well into a smooth dough, and let it remain four hours before it is baked.

The weather, during nearly the entire of this month, will be unusually changeable, rain and snow, with occasional gales of wind, will generally prevail until the 27th, when a sharp frost will set in.

DECEMBER.

The Sun on the 22d of this month enters the constellation Capricornus, or the Goat, being the 10th sign of the Zodiac. Astronomically speaking, the sun on the above day arrives at the Tropic of Capricorn, a parallel of the earth's surface over which the sun passes at its greatest southern declination, or 23° 28' south. Pan, the heathen deity of the woods, while feasting on the banks of the Nile with some of his companions, was attacked by the Giant Typhon, and escaped by diving into the water,—while there his body became metamorphosed, the lower part into a fish, and the upper part into a goat. Jupiter, to commemorate this exploit, placed him in the shape of a goat among the constellations.

In the commencement of this month the weather will be clear and frosty. On the 15th snow will begin to fall, and on the 18th there will be good sleighing. A brilliant Aurora Borealis will be observable on the 20th. The heaviest snow storm known in the Upper Province will take place on the 26th, which will block up the roads leading to Kingston for two days.
