THE NOVA SCOTIA CONFERENCE

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

HELD IN "GRACE" CHURCH, PARRSBORO', N. S.

THE SEVENTEENTH SESSION OF THE NOVA SCOTIA CON-FERENCE was opened in "Grace" Church, Parrsboro, on Thursday, June 21st, 1900, at 8.45 o'clock, a. m. The Rev. Eben E. England, President of the Conference, occupied the chair.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

DEAR BRETHREN—Assembled in our Annual Conference it is our privilege once more to send you our greetings.

Let us begin to speak at once of the subject which more than all others is upon our hearts—the spiritual condition of our beloved Church within the bounds of our Conference.

In all true public worship Divine power is present, manifesting itself in one or both of these ways—the conversion of sinners, and the holy joy We have to thank God that these signs of His presence have not been altogether absent during the past year. But we have to mourn the presence of those conditions which argue a lack of spiritual

power. To speak generally, and surveying the whole field, we have to admit that there is an absence of aggressiveness from all departments of our Church work. It would seem that we are content to hold our own, and as a matter of fact on many of our Circuits we are not holding our own, but steadily declining. Now we are convinced brethren that we offer no valid excuse when we say that this is the characteristic of the time. God called Methodism once to change the characteristic of the time, and He is calling her to do so now. When we say that burning zeal for God and souls is the desideratum of our age, we are simply saying that God is calling Methodism to face the current that sets away from Him, and turn it back again as she did at least once before. And then we have to remember that God can do this without Methodism should she fail to hear that call.

That this should be the spiritual condition of our Church just now, causes us the greater sorrow and anxiety when we remember that we are just upon the threshold of the Twentieth Century. If ever Methodism needed to be equipped with sanctified human energy and Divine favor and grace it is now, when the forces of materialism and sensualism are girding themselves as never before to withstand the conquering advance of the Kingdom of Jesus Christ. It is therefore impressed upon us that we should speak very plainly in our message to you this year, and not hesitate to point out some of the things by which we believe we are grieving the Spirit of God.

First. There is a too easy tolerance of the presence of evil on the part of many of the members of our Church. In business, and in politics, and in the various interests of community life they do not make clear and well-defined distinctions between right and wrong. For instance in business there is a too easy tolerance of the sin of lying. As members of companies, by permitting the issue of deceptive prospectuses; as members of firms which find it convenient to forget promises which have not been made in writing; and in other ways similar to these even members of our church sometimes lay themselves open to this charge. to cite only one other illustration, we are too tolevant of the rum evil. It is not too extravagant a statement to make, that the rum traffic in Nova Scotia is carried on by the sufferance of the members of the Methodist Church. The Annual Conference declares it is a sin, the members of the Church are required to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes; and yet by patronizing liquor dealers who engage in other branches of business; by allowing, through indolence, indifference or cowardice, opportunities for dealing blows at this terrible evil to pass by unimproved; even it is to be feared by directly sharing in the profits of the business in the way of rentals, or in the way of dividends to shareholders in hotels where liquor is sold; we too often have to share the responsibility of its continuance.

Second. There is grave neglect of home religion and the public means of grace. We are not of those who desire to say that the former

times were better than these, but we do fear that the descendants of many of the fathers and mothers of the last generation in whose homes the family worship was the chief event of the day, have not followed in their footsteps in this particular. Not only that, but too often the duty and privilege of the religious training of the children is altogether left to the Sunday School and other organizations of the Church. tion to these, in the home the public worship of the Lord's Day, and the prayer meeting, are not held in such honor, and deemed so important as the places they occupy in the economy of the Gospel, demand. things are put in the second place. If the demands of business are not very pressing, and if social or literary engagements permit, the services of the sanctuary are then considered. Thus many children grow up to feel that religion is a secondary consideration, that there are other things of far greater importance.

Third. There is again a growing tendency to conform to the usages of society in matters of recreation and amusement. It may or it may not have been a wise and judicious thing to append that note to Wesley's Rules, but since it is there, we cannot disregard it, and in so doing break our solemn promise to "cheerfully be governed by the rules of the Methodist Church," without grave moral injury to ourselves. shall be the outcome of the discussion as to the retention of that note, this we believe will always be true, that those followers of Christ who shall substantially contribute to the advancement of His Kingdom, and to the usefulness and power of our own church, will find themselves confronted with matters of so weighty concern, as to exclude from their interest, not to say from their practice, all the things mentioned in that note, as well as many other things of a like character. And our counsel to any who are troubled over this question in casuistry is this, plunge yourselves, and induce the members of your families to plunge into some honest, laborious work for the Master and those for whom He died; and we firmly believe that all that is vexatious about it will disappear.

Fourth. And to mention only one other thing, there is an absence of burning desire for souls. Not that we mean, that there are none who with strong crying and tears long for the conversion of sinners, but looking at our Churches as a class, we say this desire is not a sufficiently prominent characteristic of their spirit. The energies of our people are too often all expended in maintaining the various organizations of the Church, and in running the whole institution in such a way as to make a fair show as compared with the other Churches round about. developed an indifference to the sin outside the Church, and when we do make efforts to bring people from outside in, we make these efforts first of all in the interests of the Church. The joy of the Master and the eternal well being of the individuals, are after-thoughts. The spectacle of a Church, burdened with the shame of the sin and forgetfulness of God in the community; down before God in self-abandonment and dedication to His work; oppressed with the sense of the responsibility of the

knowledge that the Divine commission to go immediately and make disciples has been placed in its hands; girding itself as if it felt that the time was short and it was necessary to go out into the highways and hedges and compel them to come in—this, we say, is a spectacle which is so rare that practically it does not exist in our time.

These are some of the things which, it seems to us, are helping to destroy the usefulness of the Methodist Church in Nova Scotia as an evangelizing agency, and as an instrument in God's hands for the propagation of Gospel truth and the establishment of His Kingdom. In short, brethren, the revival which we need in our midst just now, more than any other, is an ethical revival. We believe that the cause of the spiritual barrenness of our Church is not to be found in the conclusions of the so called higher critics, or in the spread of an evolutionary philosophy, or in a less doctrinal and more humanitarian style of preaching, but in an emphatic departure from the plain, unmistakable principles of righteousness on the part of so many of our people.

You see then, brethren, that a large share of the responsibility of the inauguration of the revival we are looking for rests upon you. privilege of interpreting the doctrine of the cleansing power of Christ's blood, as applied to business and to politics belongs to you, as well as in great part the privilege of interpreting that doctrine in social and community affairs. The work of the minister is necessary and responsible beyond words to express. He must stand before the people and declare on the authority of God the eternal principles of righteousness, and he must preach "Christ crucified the power of God and the wisdom of God," and he himself must be a living example, by the grace of God, of the truth of that which he proclaims. But while his work on most sides of it has no bounds, it is limited in one direction. He cannot go into business and it is inexpedient and unwise for him to go into politics except in very rare cases. It is therefore left to business men and to public men to interpret and apply the teaching of Christ to Business life and to political life. They, and they alone, in the strength of Jesus Christ, must face and disprove the statement which is so glibly made, that no man can make any headway in business or in politics who strictly adheres to the ethics of the Gospel. We think, brethren, that we are not blind to our own short comings, and we are humbling ourselves before God and seeking as never before Divine power and wisdom; but it is very plain, that though a minister proclaim with conviction and heavenly unction, that "The blood of Jesus Christ God's Son cleauseth us from all sin," and that it is Christ's command that we should "Seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness," and all things necessary to our life and wellbeing shall be added unto us, if influential and successful business men in his church go down into business life and quietly ignore these truths and conduct their business in no way different from the man who avowedly follows only the worldly standards of expediency and utilitarianism, men watching them will come to one of two conclusions, either Christianity is not practical or it is an outworn philosophy. The aspect of unbelief which the Christian Church has to face today is the desire to dismiss Christianity as a lofty ideal which will be applicable to a human society evolved in some far away future age, but which it is impossible to apply to this present age and time. And that is only a mild way of saying that God is dead, and Jesus Christ has suffered in vain. Unless Jesus Christ can send a man into the world of business and politics, and by the co operation of his human will keep him from the evil of that world, Christianity is a sham and the Gospel is a lie. This as we see it is the problem which the Christian Church is facing today and the responsibility of its solution, as far as the Methodist Church is concerned rests with you.

Now, dear brethren, we have a proposal to make. You know that the financial part of our Twentieth Century Thanksgiving movement will be brought to a close by the first of October next, and that then the spiritual part of the movement is to be inargurated. An Evangelistic campaign throughout the whole of Canadian Methodism is to be undertaken, special recommendations concerning which are made by this Conference. Our proposal then is this:—

First. That every individual member of the Methodist Church within the bounds of the Nova Scotia Conference immediately undertake a most solemn and serious examination of himself as to the actual facts of his own private and personal relation to the Lord Jesus Christ, and that this examination include a close scrutiny of everything which, in the nature of the case would affect that relation.

Second. That each such member manfully face and record every fact of conduct and practice in his relations to business and to public affairs, in his private, domestic and family relations, and his relations as a pledged member of the Methodist Church, which would be calculated to disturb the peace of his soul as he stands face to face with the Saviour who died for him.

Third. Six new churches have been built at a cost of \$22,300.00, and two parsonages at a cost of \$2750.00. Debts upon Church property have been reduced. The heavier part of this burden we fear is borne by the few. A more generous recognition of the grace of liberality on the part of many more in all our congregations would place many of our Churches and funds in a much better position. The Supernumerary and the Sustentation Funds especially are worthy of much more general support.

We have reason to congratulate you on the condition of the Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund. Let continuous and unflagging effort be made to gather in the smaller amounts that may yet be obtained.

Our educational institutions at Sackville have had a very successful year. A magnificent new residence, to replace the one destroyed by fire, has been built for University students. We trust that from the homes of our people an increasing number of our young people shall go up to these institutions to pursue their studies under the wise oversight of the Christian men and women who compose the several aculties.

We would be speak a much larger patronage for our Book Room and a much wider circulation for the Wesleyan. The Book Committee's report this year is very satisfactory. Out of a surplus of \$364.69 the sum of \$200.00 was donated to the Supernumerary Fund.

And now, brethren, we commend these things to you. We earnestly pray that our Nova Scotia Methodism may this year, more nearly than ever before, fulfill its mission, to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land. "For what is our hope, or joy, or crown of glorying? Are not even ye, before our Lord Jesus at His coming? For ye are our glory and our joy, and the Lord make you to increase and abound in love one toward another, and toward all men, even as we also do toward you; to the end he may stablish your hearts unblameable in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all His saints."

Your Committee is deeply impressed with the conviction that the Sunday School is one of the most important departments of work in the Church; and that it should be the aim of the Sunday School teacher not only to instruct the children and young people in the teachings of the Holy Scriptures, but also to lead them up to decision for Christ. With deep regret we learn that while there has been a slight increase of teachers and scholars, there has been a very marked decrease in the number of those who have united with the church.

Your Committee would strongly urge upon our officers and teachers the importance of giving most earnest attention to the Spiritual side of the work, appointing decision day on which the members of our schools shall be urged to give themselves to Christ. That these days of decision may be most fruitful of good, it is of the utmost importance that most faithful preparation be made on the part of the teachers, by prayer and self-examination, and that those who are led to make a decision be gathered at once into catecumen classes.

It is recommended that Sunday School superintendents be urged to establish normal training classes for teachers, and that "Hulbert's Normal Lessons" be used; and also that our schools be systematically graded, and that a suitable course of Supplemental Bible Lessons, and the Catechism be taught in the schools; so that the young people (of our church) may have an intelligent conception of the Scriptures and of the doctrines of our church.

Your Committee wishes to emphasize the fact, that wherever day schools can be kept open during the winter, Sunday Schools ought also to be sustained throughout the whole year.

And it is further recommended that ministers give more attention to the Sunday Schools, and that at least once a quarter a service be conducted especially adapted to the young.

And we also strongly urge that our Sunday Schools use the literature published by our own Book Room.

3. EPWORTH LEAGUES.

Your Committee begs to report eighty-nine (89) Epworth Leagues, and Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavour; but call attention to the fact that there is a decrease of *nine* and earnestly urge that efforts be made this year to organize societies wherever practicable.

There is quite a respectable increase in the amount raised for Epworth League work, and there are also small increases in givings for General Epworth League and Mission funds.

The tabulated returns appear in the Conference schedule, and we think it unnecessary to repeat them here. The forward movement in Bible Study, and also the forward missionary movement, we heartily endorse, in harmony with the finding of the Provincial Convention, and recommend that an effort be made to raise an amount equivalent to the salary of the Rev. A. C. Borden, now in Japan.

We are sorry to note a decrease in the number of Reading Circles. We believe that careful perusal of the books of the Epworth League Reading Course will result in a quickening of intelligent spiritual life among our people.

5. REPORT OF SUPERNUMERARY FUND COMMITTEE.

8. TEMPERANCE REPORT.

The Committee on Temperance met in the Methodist Church, Parrsboro, on June 22nd and 23rd. The Rev. William Ryan was elected Chairman, and the Rev. Joseph Seller, Secretary.

The Committee presents the following report :-

1st. Whatever debases the people taints the government, and corrupts its life-blood. For this debasement we indict the liquor traffic. It makes bad citizens, bad voters, and a corrupt government. As streams do not rise higher than their sources, therefore, if we want our country wellgoverned we must have good citizens. Hence we regard the liquor traffic an unmitigated evil. Not one honest word can be said in its favor. All other trades have just and honorable foundations; but this is the trade of death. Shall rum rule and ruin, are the home and heart questions demanding our immediate and serious consideration. We entreat the members of our congregations to sustain by their voice and ballots measures and men looking to the destruction of this traffic. We appeal to you in confidence, and plead the cause of humanity, for the youth of our land whose lives, characters, and eternal destiny are at stake; for the honest sons of toil whose path is beset, and whose earnings are filched by the conscienceless rumseller. In the sacred names of God and government, let us demand of our legislators, the destruction of this unrighteous traffic. Legal Prohibition places rum-selling in the category of crimes, and like all condemnatory laws, educates. We cannot afford to listen to the silly sneer, "Does Prohibition prohibit?" Do the Ten Commandments prohibit? Are murder, lying, stealing, adultry extinct? The Decalogue, nevertheess has placed the ban of displeasure, human and Divine, on those sins, and thus f which is n liquor traf not suppor to drive th

and thus for centuries has been educating the public conscience. That which is morally wrong can never be made legally right. A licensed liquor traffic is wrong, and as members of the Methodist Church, we cannot support consistently a government that will not use ways and means to drive this wrong and wrong doing from the land.

The Plebiscite vote, with its 14,000 of a majority, we regard as an expression of the moral sentiment, the intelligent conviction of a large portion of the people of this Dominion, that this traffic is a menace to, and an assault upon every sacred interest, for which government exists to foster and shield; a curse which ought not longer to be endured.

We deprecate the action of our government in allowing one Province to dominate the Dominion, and prevent on this line advanced legislation, and therefore we call our people, independent of party-politics, to crystallize their thoughts into ballots (for that is the only power the traffic fears), and not be partners in the crime of legalizing a traffic which is constantly destroying men and women for whom Christ died.

2nd. In relation to a communication from the public School Board, Winnipeg, re Dominion legislation to prevent the sale of tobacco to persons of tender age, your committee, recognizing the value of our own Provincial law on the subject, most heartily commends this larger movement to shield our youth from a demoralizing practice.

3rd. At the request of the Dominion Alliance we recommend the appointment of four persons to the Council of said Alliance to be held in Toronto on July 18th.

4th. Your Committee also recommends the Conference to adopt the resolution submitted by the Rev. J. S. Coffin *re* the sale of intoxicating liquors at Militia encampments, and that a copy be sent to the Hon., the Minister of Militia, at Ottawa, viz:

"Whereas,—The season of the year is approaching for the assembling of our volunteers in their annual encampments, and in numbers which, because of the prevailing military fervor, will no doubt be largely in excess of previous years; and

Whereas, it was last year made to appear that the military regulations regarding the sale of intoxicating liquors at these camps, were openly and extensively violated.

Therefore Resolved, That this Conference earnestly denounces every provision and permission, which would place the temptation to indulgence in drink in the way of our volunteers, and we strenuously demand the faithful enforcement on the part of those having control of our encampments, of the existing regulations which are designed to shield our volunteers, there assembled, from this great evil."

One District reports a better attendance at the Sacrament table, which fact we are glad to note and commend, knowing there is a tendency on the part of many of our members to look lightly on this Godappointed means of grace.

The class tickets have been utilized to good purpose on some circuits. We recommend their general adoption.

A want of spirituality is the general report concerning the Epworth Leagues and Young Peoples' societies. This we regard as a very serious situation, demanding immediate attention. The hope of the church is with the young people. We believe, however, that the coming year, when there shall be, according to our faith, a revival on every circuit, will see the condition of our Young Peoples' societies greatly improved.

We notice, with thankfulness to God, that there has been good work done in some of our Sunday Schools. The suggestion made last year, with reference to a "Decision day," has been acted upon with marked results in many schools. The "Home Department" we believe, rightly and earnestly conducted, will greatly enlarge the sphere of Sunday School work.

We regret to report a decrease in membership again this year. Death and removals by letter, have taken away large numbers. If the reports can be fully relied upon, our outlook for the coming year, is more hopeful than it has been for years past. A revival of "pure and undefiled religion" upon every circuit is the evident watchword. The gracious influences of the present sessions of Conference point to this. The brethren appear to be looking earnestly for seals to their ministry. Conversions on our circuits will prove most conclusively of all ways, that "the best of all is God' is with us."

A memorial is presented by the Halifax District, which your committee thinks best to embody *verbatim* in their report, viz:—

"We recommend that whenever practical, in harmony with the legislation of the General Conference, and to signalize the close of the century, that a session of each Financial District meeting to be held in the early autumn, shall be given up to the consideration of spiritual interests, and that wherever in our cities and towns, a few members can easily assemble just prior to the first of October special meetings be held for deepening the spiritual life of the ministry; and that the officials of our church and membership on

This means of co operation has been greatly blessed in some parts of the Conference during the past year. We learn that in one District, a student probationer has been employed during vacation, by two of our ministers, as a means of helping to extend the work. We recommend this to our ministers on large fields, and where there is a growing population.

The opportunity seems to be with us to extend our work in Cape Breton. Your Committee would submit that some provision be made through the agency of presidential supply, or evangelistic committee, towards strengthening the hands of the pastors in the Sydney District, where there is a large influx of population.

16. REPORT OF CONFERENCE VISITORS TO MOUNT ALLISON INSTITUTIONS.

Your Committee felt that in being appointed visitors in behalf of the Nova Scotia Conference, to the Mt. Allison Institutions, a very important duty had been assigned them.

They were anxious to discharge this duty, not in any perfunctory manner, but as far as circumstances would permit, in a manner altogether satisfactory to the Conference.

Your Committee were well aware that in a technical sense they were not entitled to any special recognition at the hands of the authorities of Mt. Allison, and therefore feel the more in duty bound to record their deep sense of the courtesy extended to them, and the kindly efforts made to facilitate the objects of their visitation.

The time chosen as most suitable was during the later weeks of the first term. The visitation extended to the University, the Ladie's College, and the Academy, in all of which the classes were very fully visited, and matters of interest inquired into.

Your Committee were particularly impressed:

- I. By the spiritual influences which marked the devotional exercises at the opening of the day's session.
- 2. By the great competency and earnestness displayed by the Professors and other instructors in their several departments.
- 3. By the very encouraging attendance, especially in view of the draw backs and inconveniences resulting from the loss of the residence. In the Ladies' College the attendance was exceptionally good.
- 4. By the excellent *morale* of the several branches of the Mt. Allison Institutions.
- 5. Your Committee would make special mention of a class in Scripture history, conducted by the Preceptress of the Ladies' College, as a hopeful beginning of the systematic study of the English Bible.
- 6. Your Committee would respectfully suggest that in their judgment the prime need of the Institutions at the present time, is the inlarged attendance of students.

The Committee on the Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund, begs to report that to May 7th, of the one hundred and nine Circuits composing the Conference, sixty-four Circuits have reported, showing a total amount subscribed of \$30,615.76, of which \$6221.74 has been paid to the Treasurer (Dr. Pott's) to date.

The Committee finds that several errors have been made in the account of the Treasurer, some of which are as follows: Under the head of Superannuation Fund, which is a Fund belonging to the Western Conferences, they find the amount of \$105.89, being from Hantsport, \$100.64; from Halifax South, \$1.00; from Nap-Your Committee is informed that the amount from pan, \$4.25. Hantsport should have been credited to the Supernumerary Fund of the three Eastern Conferences. Your Committee finds further that the sum of \$5094.80 is credited under the head of Educational Institutions and only \$399.22 to Mount Allison; this as your Committee understands it, would mean that only \$399.22 would be applied directly to the Institutions at Mount Allison from this Conferences, and that the much larger sum of \$5094.22, would be divided among the eight educational establishments of the Methodist Church, by, and in the discretion of the Central Committee, appointed by the General Conference to divide amounts not given for specific purposes.

Your Committee is persuaded that this was not the intention of the donors, and recommends that Dr. F. Woodbury, W. B. MacCoy and A. M. Bell be a Committee to prepare a circular which shall be sent to each Circuit, this circular to make such suggestions as will keep those Circuits that have not yet reported from making similar mistakes; and informing those Circuits that have reporied as to how their subscriptions have been applied, so that the superintendent of each Circuit may take steps to correct any errors that may be found.

With regard to the Circular about the General Conference Evangelistic movement, the Committee recommends that this be handed to the Committee on the state of the work.

19. DISTRICT VISITATION.

Your Committee begs leave to report that during the past year, increased attention has been given to the matter of District visitation. Although full reports have been received only from the Truro, Guysboro' and Cape Breton Districts.

- I. The formulas authorized by the last Conference were prepared and forwarded to the Chairmen and Ministers generally.
- 2. The returns submitted embody important information concerning our mission circuits, and indicate clearly the advantages likely to result in the near future, when this provision of our decipline is more fully carried out.
- 3. It is too soon to be able to submit comparative statements in tabulated form, yet it is safe to say, that some of the fields have not only been for many years claimants on the Missionary funds, but are likely for many years to come, to remain Home Missions.
- 4. From the returns submitted it is evident that there is not only a great diversity in the financial methods employed, but also in the proportion of giving, according to families and individuals.

Your Committee would recommend :-

- I. That faithful and persistent efforts be made to visit during the year, all the Mission Circuits in the several Districts of the Conference.

22. SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Whereas—The proper observance of the Lord's day is one of the principal safeguards of the religious progress, and temporal prosperity of any country; and the tendency to disregard this observance is one of the greatest dangers of the present day.

Therefore—This Conference takes this opportunity of urging all whom its voice can reach, to carefully watch, and vigorously protest, in such way as may be wisest, against any action subversive of Sabbath law, on the part of the managers of Government roads, or of any private corporations, under plea of the necessities of business. At the same time it strongly counsels the careful individual avoidance of all travelling, visiting, or entertainment on the Lord's day, which may be unnecessary, or at all contrary to the spirit of the teaching of the Divine Word.

23. ARMY AND NAVY REPORT.

Reports from the officiating clergymen at Halifax, and Bermuda, give evidence of faithful work performed among the men at these stations. The Rev. J. Strothard of Hamilton reports eighteen members of the church in the 1st West India Regiment, and their attendance at class meeting as encouraging. Hospital visitation, and the distribution of literature have been agencies for good during the year.

At St. George's changes incident to army work removed several active christians without filling their places with men of like character. Two persons have been converted, and united with the church.

Ireland Island reports some of the sailors brought to Christ in the earlier part of the year, but regrets the departure of valued men in the army, some of whom now fill soldier's graves in South Africa, and others in the Hospital, from whom we receive cheering intelligence of the good influences of the Wesleyan Chaplains in Bermuda.

St. George's asks for a soldiers' home, and Ireland Island a sailors' home.

Bro. Hale expresses the conviction that the army and navy committee of the Wesleyan Church in England, would render substantial aid, if the Nova Scotia Conference would take the initiative. There are fifty-two declared Wesleyans in the Army and two hundred and seventy-seven in the Navy at Ireland Island. Eighty-nine are reported from Hamilton."

Discouragements and encouragements have attended the labors of the chaplain, at Halifax. The work among the R. E. and R. A. has not been marked by any special features, except the change of one company for another, with about the same number of declared Wesleyans, and a gain of three valued members of Kaye St. Church,

The advent of the Royal Canadian Regiment in March has greatly added to our numbers and increased our interest. We have now more soldiers under our care than any Wesleyan Chaplain ever ministered to at this station, For the first time in its history, Halifax is garrisoned by young men from Canadian homes. Many of them are from rural districts, and in their inexperienced youth, are exposed to the pernicious influences of city life, Some of them are earnest christians, and a joy to us; others require the utmost pastoral care.

The "Institue" has held on its way with varying usefulness, notwithstanding the fact that the one conducted by the General Officers of the garrison has been given up. Considering that the men of the present regiment are from Canadian homes, situated in almost every Conference of our territory, we bespeak for the work of the Institute the assistance and prayers of the Church. The young men we minister to are your young men. We are willing to spend and be spent for their moral and spiritual good, but it will greatly cheer our heart to have your co-operation and sympathy.

9. LIST OF MEMBERSHIP.

- 3. It would be well if all schedules were ready to be handed to Financial Secretary at the opening of the Ministerial Session of the District. This would enable the Financial Secretary to give some time to checking figures. The Financial Secretary might become one of the auditors.
- 4. District Statistical Secretaries will, in accordance with the decision of the General Superintendent, enter in their schedules the exact figures reported by circuits, taking no notice of indorsations on said schedules, touching the omission of cents.
