# GERMANS FAIL SO FAR TO COUNTER-ATTACK

—Saturday's New British Push Effective— The Situation in Russia—Enemy Abandoning Use of Port of Ostend

Another day has passed without the demoralized Germans along the Ypres front making an effort by counter attacking to regain the ground they lost in the Titanic drive of Field Marshal Haig's men on last Thursday. South of Ypres, however, the Teutons heavily bombarded the British positions, where additional terrain was taken from them on Saturday night on several sectors. Aerial activity between the German and British fliers continued on Saturday and numerous battles in the air were fought. Nine enemy machines were accounted for by the British, who themselves lost three.

There has been no fighting along that part of the line where the French are facing the Germans rising above the character of small surprise attacks. On the Chemin des Dames the Germans early on Sunday morning penetrated a small salient west of Cerny, but almost immediately were driven out, with the

In the Austro-Italian theatre the fighting is being done entirely by the artifacty wings of the opposing armies. There has been no attempt at a resumption by the Italians of their great offensive on the Carso front, but from the fact that reconnoitering parties are being sent out to survey the new positions of the Austrians another great battle probably is not far distant.

# British Press On Again; Advance Made South Of Messines

Get Into French Lines But Soon Driven Out More Heavy Artillery Fighting Last Night on Both British and French Fronts-Germans Fail in Surprise Attack Near Official Struck With Stick or Stone as he Cerny

> London, June 11-The British have made an additional advance south of Messines, acording to an official statement issued by the war office this morning.

There was considerable artillery fighting on both sides during the night east of Epehy. Bodies of hostile troops assembling in this area were dispersed by our fire. We made a successful raid last night southwest of Alabasse; much damage was done to the enemy's trenches and mine galleries, and eighteen prisoners were captured. Parties of our troops also raised German positions east of Vermelles and south of Armentieres. They inflicted casualties on the enemy. Our own and the enemy's artilery showed great activity. "Our line has again been advanced slightly south of Messines,"

Paris, June 11-There was active artillery fighting last night north of the Somme. A German raid west of Cerny was repulsed. The war office announcenent follows:—
"There was rather unusual activity of the artillery on both sides north of the Somme and in the region of Cerny. To the west of this village the enemy at-

tempted a new surprise attack and was repulsed. Patrol encounters occurred near Hill 304 and in the Woevre. The night was calm on the remainder of the Bulgar Report.

# Some Transactions Very Bad; Others Were Worse

SPECIAL AUDITOR APPOINTED BY OLD GOVERN-MENT REPORTS ON DEALINGS OF FARM SETTLEMENT BUARD

**Board Made Practise of Buying Farms** for Cash and Reselling to Same Persons on Long Time Terms—E. S. Carter's Charges Regarding Fullerton Farm Fully Upheld — Methods Condemned

Following is the report of T. V. Williams, the special auditor appointed by the old government to investigate the accounts of the Farm Settlement Board. It was laid on the table of the legislature on Friday, and it should be read by every elector in the province, tor it shows the manner in which the affairs of the board have been mismanaged, particularly with respect to the farms which have been bought and resold to the same parties, or to parties bearing the same name, or to others whose names were so similar that there is a clear indication of

The report also makes it clear that the facts in connection with the Fullerton farm in Albert county are exactly as E. S. Carter declared they were, notwithstanding the emphatic denials of Hon. J. A. Murray at the time. Mr. Carter, it will be remembered, submitted proof to show that this farm was not sixteen acres but one-half an acre, and that the late ex-Governor McClelan held a mortgage on it for \$200. Very Bad All Through.

In verifying the report concerning Walter Leutchford, I find this transaction is very bad from beginning to end. Walter Leutchford, of Lake Edward Settlement, Victoria county, was granted ninety-nine acres of crown lands on FBB. 27, 1914, this land being sold to the Farm Settle-ment Board for \$500 in cash on DEC. 1, 1913, virtually three months before the lot had been granted to Leutchford. As reported to you there was no documentary evidence there was no documentary evidence to prove payment of \$500 to W. Leutchford, the check not being endorsed and no deed given for the land. On March 27, 1914, the board made another payment of \$400 to W. Leutchford for which there is no

W. Leutchford for which there is no voucher and no deed. Then, after paying W. Leutchford the two sums in cash tot: Iling \$900 the board sold to W. Leutchford the Samuel Lovely farm for \$1,000 on easy terms under the act. So that, whilst six per cent. was being paid by the Farm Settlement Board to the bank for loans, this money was lent at live per cent, part of it without any security whatever. As this particular case was commented on by the auditor-general when forwarding J. JH. Maxwell's report, and also by Special Auditor Dunlop very strongly, I am confining myself to facts and figures without further comment.

A check for \$1,500 issued to the Royal Bank at Bathurst for the Knowles

Says Bookkeeping Bad. As to the method of keeping accounts and records in St. John, it seems unfortunate that the bookkeeper was not procurred that would understand now to make the nocessary entries. But in this connection it would appear to me more to be regretted that a secretary was appointed that had no knowledge of book keeping or of keeping accounts, therefore utterly unable to supervise the work of the bookkeepers engaged at different times. And it should be borne in mind that the secretary would necessarily have to deal with accounts and innances both to purchases and sales, and should at least be competent to examine into details as to title, acreage represented by vendors of farms, and finally to see that a certificate of title was received from the lawyer or record office. Had such man been appointed and had he intelligently dealt with these matters, none of these difficulties would have arisen in

Very Bad. I regret very much that on placing all these matters before you and exhibiting the books and cards from the St. John office, that trouble should have been brought on the head of the secretary, but the general state of the books and records was so bad that I was compelled to do this, and to prevent further trouble on the same lines suggested that you take the work of the weekly report sheet and details of keeping the card system to date out of the hands of the secretary.

ted to take the books home for night work, and without any knowledge of the daily happenings, made entries for the interest on the debtor side, without any regard to the receipts given by the secretary, or even to the payments made, whether on principal or interest, and dates to or from, so that when it became necessary to check up the interest and sary to check up the interest and deduct it from the principal paid, no agreement oould be made between the cards and ledger, and the receipts could not be reconciled with the entries made. I was therefore compelled to revise and rewrite a new card for every purchaser of farms, and work out separately every item of interest received during the four years from October, 1912, to October, 1916. I have caused to be printed a form of weekly report printed a form of weekly report, which is sent to me from St. John, every transaction being recorded thereon, and all in agreement with the card system on file, both as to interest and principal. The books now kept in Fredericton and the card system in St. John.


Important Records Lacking



A perusal of the subjects up for dis-ussion before the National Council of Vomen meeting here this week and of Women meeting nere this week and of the methods of their handling bids fair to give the lie alike to those who hold or have held that women have not the capacity for consideration of questions of national import, and to that other sec-tion of extremists who expected drastic tion of extremists who expected drastic action the moment the power of the ballot was put into the hands of the feminine half of the community. Including as it does practically all the organized womanhood of Canada, and knowing in its ranks no distinctions of creed or caste, it may in all fairness be described as representative of the women of the nation. Indeed in the past it has won for itself the title of "Parliament of Women," and now that such polite phrases en," and now that such polite phrases have been given a meaning in five of the provinces of this dominion, the designation takes on an added force.

Individually the gathering is a notable one, so much so in fact that any attempt at personal mention could only end in giving a list of the delegates. But, taken as a convention, some features are especially noteworthy.

As might be easily prophesied, the questions under consideration will be found in their first or last analysis to have a profound bearing upon home life, varying from the desirability of union labels to child welfare. They all, no matter how far afield they may have got into the wastes of political economy, swing back like an iron to the magnet of the home life of the nation.

The women are not afraid to say that they do not know all there is to know they do not know all there is to know bout a subject and to ask for further light before they give an opinion. Coupled with this is the determination to ed with this is the determination to follow out a question as far as possible without pausing because of the labor or trouble involved. The world has suffered too long from the crime of silence. No danger here of pressing for hasty or ill-considered legislation.

The brotherhood of man has been preached for years, but its apostles are still crying in what today. seems more than ever a wilderness of a world. Perhaps the ultimate friction of this tremendous ideal will dwell among us, when correlating with it comes the quieter but even more vital idea of the sisterhood of woman.
