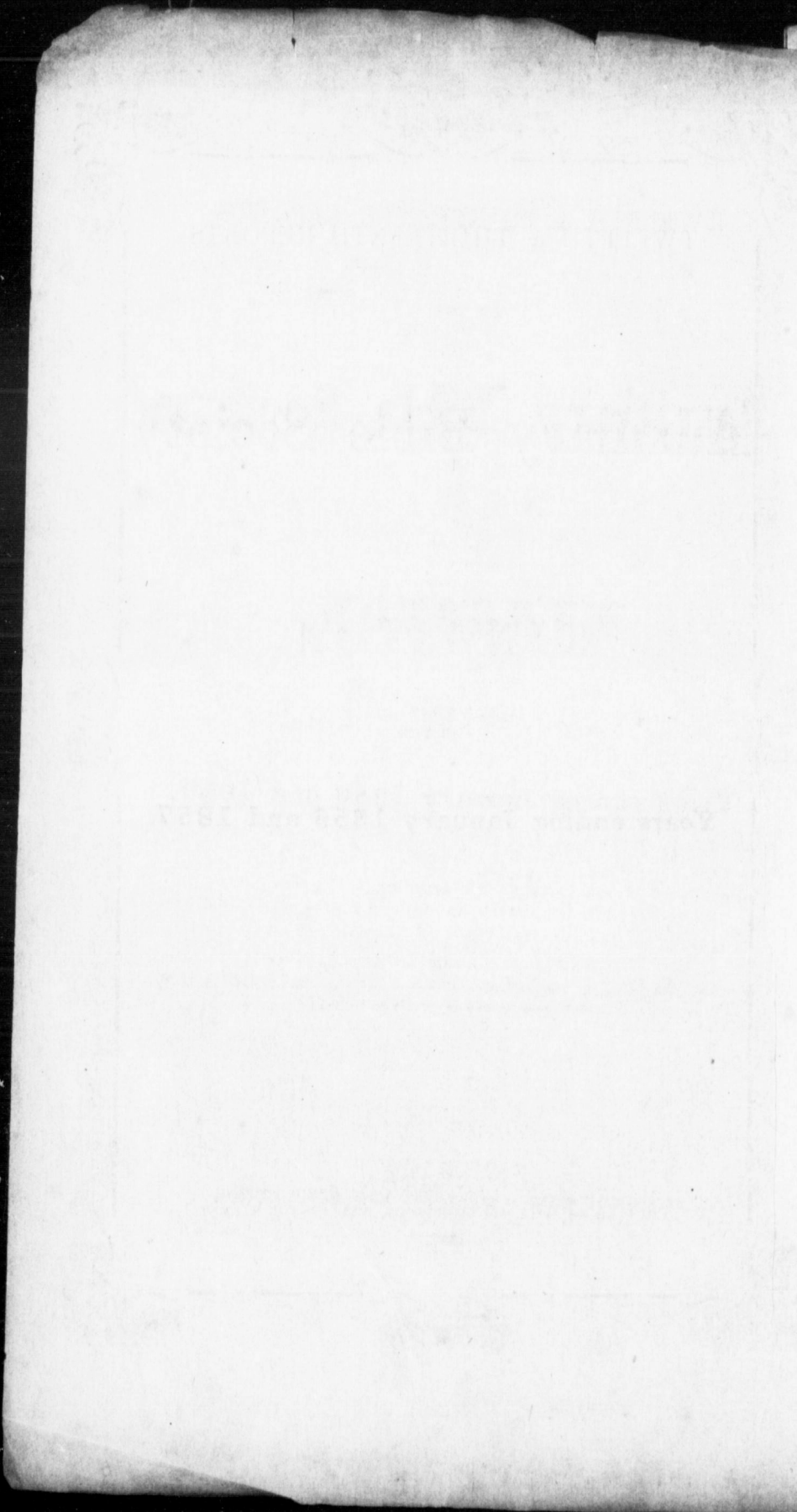

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CONSTITUTION
OF THE
AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY OF KINGSTON.

I.—That the "*Auxiliary Bible Society of Kingston*," cordially approving the object and Constitution of the British and Foreign Bible Society, has been organized for the purpose of co-operating with that Institution, in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; and such copies as are in the languages of the United Kingdom, shall be of the authorized version only.

II.—That all persons subscribing 7s. 6d. per annum shall be members of this Society; and each subscriber of £5 at one time shall be a Life Member.

III.—That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a Committee comprising President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and not less than ten other Members; and that five Members constitute a quorum.

IV.—That all Ministers of the Gospel who are members of this Society shall be members of the Committee.

V.—That the Committee shall meet every month or oftener if necessary.

VI.—That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by the Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses in the first instance, to such Bibles and Testaments from the Parent Institution as are required for distribution, and that the surplus funds shall be remitted to the Parent Society.

VII.—That for the promotion of the circulation of the Scriptures it is expedient to encourage the formation of Branch Societies and Depots, and to employ such other agencies as the Committee may think suitable.

VIII.—That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the third Monday in January in each year, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed and a Report agreed upon, to be printed and circulated under the direction of the Committee.

IX.—That in the formation of the new Committee, respect be had to those who have been found faithful in their attendance during the year.

X.—That the Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either Governors for Life or Honorary Members.

FORM OF CONSTITUTION FOR BRANCH SOCIETIES.

I.—That we form ourselves into a Society in connection with the "*Auxiliary Bible Society of Kingston*," for the purpose of contributing towards the circulation of the Holy Scriptures of such copies as are in the language of the United Kingdom, to be of the authorized version only; and that the Society be denominated "*The Branch Society of ————*."

II.—That all persons subscribing ———— or upwards per annum, shall be members of this Society.

III.—That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a Committee, comprising the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and not less than ———— other members, and that ———— members of this Committee constitute a quorum.

IV.—That all Ministers of the Gospel who are members of this Society shall be members of the Committee.

V.—That the Committee shall meet every third month, or oftener, if necessary.

VI.—That the Committee divide the locality into sections, and appoint two or more of their members for each section, who may associate with themselves any subscribers, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations.

VII.—That the whole of the money received by this Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses, in the first instance, to the purchase of such Bibles and Testaments from the Kingston Auxiliary as are required for distribution, and that the surplus funds shall be remitted to the Kingston Auxiliary.

VIII.—That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held at such time as shall be convenient in each year, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon.

IX.—That in the formation of the new Committee, respect be had to those who have been found faithful in their attendance during the year.

ANNIVERSARY MEETING,

Held in the City Hall, the 10th January, 1857.: The Rev. J. Machar, D. D., President, in the Chair.

The Meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. D. Wishart. An abstract of the annual Report was read by the Rev. Kenneth M. Fenwick.

RESOLUTION I. Moved by Rev. R. V. Rogers, seconded by A. H. Campbell, Esq.

Resolved—That the Report, an abstract of which has been read, be adopted and printed, and that the following be the Office-Bearers and Committee for the ensuing year

RESOLUTION II. Moved by the Rev. Thomas Keough, and seconded by J. Mowat, Esq.,

Resolved—That the success which has already attended the efforts of the Parent Society, and its numerous Branches, should excite our gratitude, and strengthen our hopefulness; and as it is not by might nor by power, but by the Spirit of the Lord, that even the Holy Scriptures can be made spiritually useful, the necessity of more earnest faith and more importunate prayer should be fully recognized.

RESOLUTION III. Moved by the Rev. J. George, D. D., and seconded by the Rev. Henry Wilkes, D. D., of Montreal,

Resolved—That as the necessity for widely circulating the Word of God in this and in every land, instead of diminishing with the development and progress of human affairs, is evidently increasing, a corresponding increase of effort and of prayer is evidently demanded.

The meeting was dismissed with the Benediction by the Rev. A. Stewart.

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REPORT.

THE noble motto of Dr. Owen, "An open Bible, England's best hope," might aptly be enlarged, and made to comprehend the wide world. For what will be the chief means of the world's conversion to God but the Bible, without note or comment, translated into every language and universally disseminated.

"When I send the Bible I know *what* I send," said the Bishop of Winchester, at the Anniversary of our Parent Society, in 1843. "When I send out the Holy Scriptures, I know what I do *not* send. I know that in sending out the Holy Scriptures, I am not sending out the Gospel of man, but the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. I am not sending out any admixture of error; but the pure word of God."

Your Committee in rendering their report, would endorse these sentiments. In this world of mutation and, alas, of sin, there is nothing but the Bible, under the teaching of the Holy Spirit, on which we can rely with implicit confidence as an unerring Guide and safe Directory. The Bible, the whole Bible, and nothing but the Bible, is, and must be, the only religion of true Protestants. Let us cleave then, with ever-growing affection, to the Sacred Scriptures as our inestimable and inalienable birth-right—the source of our present pleasures—the solace of our sharpest sorrows—the guardian of our rights and liberties—the immovable foundation of all our hopes of a blessed immortality.

Let us remember, that with the increase of population the Canadian field increases in its demands, on the energetic devotion of those who love the Word of God and are engaged in its circulation. If we would see our country great, good, and prosperous—its laws just—its press pure—its education sanctified—its commerce righteous—its population intelligent, industrious, happy,—let us send the Bible into every corner of our land, nor rest satisfied till it finds a place in every home, and if possible, is put in every hand.

The Report of the preceding year was drafted and read at last general meeting, but, we regret, was not published. Your Committee have therefore resolved, as in last printed report, to embody the facts of both years operations,—keeping them, however, so distinct that the doings of each year will be easily identified. We call attention first to the

DEPOSITORY.

It is still under the able charge of Mr. Edward Stacey—who still continues to give great satisfaction to your Committee. Although the yearly grant from the Parent Society to aid in sustaining the Depository has not been remitted, we doubt not it will be given as on former years.

BRANCHES.

There are ten Branches in connection with our Society. With one or two exceptions, they are, however, far from being what they should be. The efficiency of the Colporteurs, in circulating the Bible from house to house in their immediate vicinity has, doubtless, very much lessened their sphere of usefulness, but we must regret the want of greater interest and zeal on the part of those intrusted with their management. There are two honorable exceptions to these remarks. The first is the Belleville Branch, which has been sustained with commendable devotedness by those at its head; and its worthy Secretary, the Rev. Mr. Greig, has proven himself a zealous friend of the Bible cause. This Branch has made a donation of £15 to the Parent Society, and of £7 10s. to our Auxiliary. The second is the Picton Branch, which has lately been strengthened by the addition to its Board of Management of James Grey, Esq., who was for several years connected with our own Committee—and whose removal to Picton will, we trust, be of service to the cause there—although the Society in Kingston, in his removal, has lost an active and devoted helper. The Committee has sought to obtain a more efficient system of visitation for the Branches, and it is hoped that by another year, some method will be adopted which will inspire this department of our operations with new vigour.

In 1855-56, Belleville received from the Depository, 146 Bibles and 560 Testaments—Total, 706 copies of the Scriptures. In 1856-57, 267 Bibles and 305 Testaments—Total 572 copies.

In 1855-6, Picton received 60 Bibles and 138 Testaments—Total, 198. In 1856-7, 75 Bibles and 96 Testaments—171 total.

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The Depots, we regret to state, are not more successful in spreading the Word of God,—but the remark already made in reference to the exertions of the Colporteurs, bears with greater force on them than even on the Branches.

COLPORTAGE.

From the character of our field, this agency we consider the one which our Society can use with the greatest prospect of success. It is the duty of an Association like our own to place the "Word of Life," where it can at any time be obtained; but it is doubtless still more in harmony with its spirit and object to send it where it might not otherwise go—to obtain for it a path to the most neglected and secluded settlement—to offer it to those who do not know its value, and consequently who will not seek after it—and to bestow it on those who are unable to purchase it.

It is gratifying to be able to state, that those engaged in this work are almost universally received with kindness, and that evidence has been furnished that their "labor has not been in vain in the Lord."

In the work of Colportage, our Society is still nobly assisted by the Ladies' Association; indeed, this Association entirely sustains one Colporteur.

During 1855-6, Mr. John Elmslie was employed by the Ladies, and Messrs. Bowden and Vanston by our Society. During 1856-7, the Ladies employed Mr. McIntosh to succeed Mr. Elmslie, who resigned; but after serving them with acceptance for one quarter, he became the agent of our Society, and Mr. Hendry, a Colporteur formerly in their employ, took his place. Mr. Alexander Hendry was engaged by our Society and entered on his work in May, 1856; on the 1st of August, the transfer above mentioned took place, by which Mr. Hendry became the Ladies' Colporteur, and Mr. McIntosh ours.

Early in 1856, the Committee, anxious to prosecute Colportage with increased energy, without encroaching on the general funds of the Society, resolved to make a special effort to raise funds for the purpose. The effort was confined to the members of the Committee, and the sum of £25 5s. was the result. As it would be uninteresting to give a mere sketch of the places visited, we rather call attention to a few extracts from

THE COLPORTEUR'S REPORT.

"In one settlement, L—, when I visited it three years since, I found the people very careless, and with very little inclination to purchase any sort of books; but at this time I sold a good many Bibles." "In another small settlement which I had visited twice, and could not sell any, this time I sold several copies of the Scriptures, and sixteen religious books, in one forenoon. Nearer Kingston, in a large settlement, and where I used to sell a good many books, I travelled two days, and only sold two, and I found the people more indifferent to

any religious subject. In conversing with a person on the indifference manifested among them, he remarked: 'We had once a fine settlement, but that new road has brought a tavern into our place, and I believe it will ruin it.' I called at the tavern, and was served as usual at such places: they could not buy, unless I would give a fifteen-pence Bible for one shilling. This demand is rarely met with except at taverns." "I next took my journey north to Lanark and Renfrew, where I travelled four years ago. I met with a good many of my old acquaintances who are favorable to the good cause. Many said they were glad to see the man with the white horse that carried the Bibles, and they showed it in things more substantial than words. In the Township of Lanark, in one day, I sold thirty copies of the Scriptures and several religious books.* In this Township, and in Ramsay, there was a great revival some three years ago, which has left remarkable marks of its reality. I scarcely met with a person, old or young, in any of these Townships, but who was willing to converse on the subject of religion."

"When I am travelling, I make it a point to call at all the schools that fall in my way, and it is much to be lamented that the Bible is not read in more than one half of them."

"A woman was on the eve of paying for a Bible she had purchased, when her neighbour came in, and threw in the priestly interdict between the immortal soul and the word of salvation. Alas! she returned the Bible, saying to her friend, 'Is it not strange that the Priests do not furnish us with Bibles at the same price? are they not very cheap?'"

The Colporteurs had issued to them in 1855-6,—556 Bibles, 676 Testaments; total, 1232. In 1856-7,—838 Bibles, 850 Testaments; total, 1688.

LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION.

This valued agency continues to be wrought with undiminished vigour and success. The circulation of the Bible in the City, through its members, and in the country by its Colporteur, is the work it seeks to accomplish. Nobly does it fulfil its mission. From November, 1854, to November, 1855, it issued—

Besides supporting their own Colporteur, they also, during the last year, made a donation of £10 to our Society. May they continue their "work of faith and labor of love," and find in the Book they seek to circulate, the Divine comfort and consolation with which it is so richly stored!

THE PARENT SOCIETY.

Our noble and honoured Parent gathers strength with years. It is only as we recognize our relation to the British and Foreign Bible Society, that the magnitude of our work and the glory of our enterprise (at least when viewed from a human stand-point), becomes apparent.

FUNDS.—The following is the statement of the committee: "It is with unfeigned gratitude to Him who disposes the heart to devise liberal things, that the committee announce the largest regular income the Society has ever received. The entire receipts of the year amount to £130,438 7s. 10d. From this, however, must be deducted £1712 17s. 9d. additional contributions to the Jubilee and China Funds, leaving £128,725 10s. 1d. as the year's receipts, from ordinary sources, being £4247 0s. 7d. in excess of the previous year." "The expenditure of the Society has amounted to £134,813 0s. 10d."

THE ISSUES have surpassed those of any former year—reaching the unprecedented number of one million four hundred and seventy-four thousand three hundred and ninety-four copies. The increase of circulation, as compared with last year, amounts to twenty-three thousand five hundred and eighteen copies. The total issues of the Society now amount to thirty millions eight hundred and sixty-three thousand nine hundred and one copies.

KINDRED PROVINCIAL SOCIETIES.

The Thirty-fifth Report of the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society, and the Sixteenth Report of the Upper Canada Bible Society, have been received. The issues of the former for the year ending December, 1855, are, of Bibles and Testaments, 11,484; and the cash receipts £1642 9s. The issues of the latter Society for 1855, are, of Bibles and Testaments, 32,489; and the receipts £4677 10s. 7d.

CONCLUSION.

The Committee, in resigning their trust, would express their gratitude to God for the harmony which has pervaded all their deliberations, and for the measure of success which has followed their efforts. They would also be mindful of the liberality which the friends of the Bible cause have exhibited during the past, as well as former years. They are however convinced, that as the nature and importance of this Institution are better appreciated, still greater things will be done to extend its usefulness and augment its resources. The actual good it has ac-

complished in leading sinners to the Lamb of God—in giving strength to principle, and victory in the hour of temptation—in cheering with Divine promises the sorrowful and the bereaved, and in fostering the hope of a glorious immortality—the last day only will disclose. It has promoted the union of believers in the different sections of the Church of Christ. Since its revival in 1830, it has circulated in the city and surrounding country 37,331 copies of the Scriptures, and the field is still open for more thorough and zealous culture. New objects, claiming Christian sympathy and contribution, are ever presenting themselves; but, while we would not depreciate their aims, nor lessen the force of their demands, we would most urgently insist on an increase, rather than a diminution, of the support which the Bible Society has hitherto received. True philosophy, enlightened prudence, genuine patriotism, and *Christian principle*, alike and unitedly point to the Bible circulated and read as the simplest and most efficient instrumentality, because most completely divine, in the elevation of mankind for time and for eternity.
