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The experience of the two great English-speaking industrial nations—Great Britain and the United States-in the matter of public ownership of electrical utilities is of great interest and importance to St. John.

Great Britain has, always, been regarded as a strong believer in public ownership. Some 60 p.c. of public generators, and some 65 p.c. of the electrical railway mileage, in that coun-try, is publicly owned.

In the United States, only 5 1-2 p.c. of public generators and only 2 p.c. of electric railway mileage is under public management.

Presenting recommendations on the development of a nation-wide electrical system in Great Britain, the committee of electric engineers and business men, under the chairmanship of ex-Premier Lloyd-George, comes out emphatically against public ownership

Evidently, experience of many years has proven it is not the thing.

And, when steady thinking Englishmen see a reason to change their mind, that reason must be a substantial one.

The Lloyd-George Committee recommends that the whole executive management of the proposed nation-wide system be placed in the hands of private companies and adds:

"Whether we make the right use of this heaven-sent opportunity for redeeming the mistakes of the past, depends on whether we use, from the outset, wise methods of regulation and control without sacrificing the driving power of private enterprise.

As regards the United States, Secretary Hoover. in a recent address said:

"We have found the true road of advancement in these enterprises through sustained initiative and equality of opportunity to our people with public control to prevent
