Recent dispatches from London have reported the murders of British officials and women along the northwestern frontier of India by Atghan tribesmen. As a result of these crimes it was said, relations with Afghanastan were strained, and British officials in London asserted that unless a satisfactory settlement was reached the government's minister to Kabul would be withdrawn. The Afghan government, it was added, had taken steps to cooperate with Indian troops in running down the murderers.

Chicago, Dec. 31—Six armed bandits Saturday shot up the town of Summit, a suburb, terrorized employes and officials of the Summit State Bank, scooped up about \$15,000 in cash and Liberty bonds and escaped after a pistol duel with policemen. It was the fourth time in six years that the bank has been robbed. The first time robbers obtained \$40,000, the second time \$20,000 and the third time about \$11,000.

Two cashiers, two girl clerks and two patrons were in the bank when ar automobile drew up outside. Five men leaped out, leaving a sixth at the wheel, and ran for the bank, firing as they entered. With the employes and patrons cowed, the bandits hastily scooped up all the valuables in sight and hurried from the bank. A grocer across the street opened fire with a o'stol, while other citizens appeared with shotguns. One of the bandits is believed to have been hit. Two policemen spied the bandit car as it entered Chicago, and engaged in a duel with the bandits before the car was finally

GIVE ARMS TO OBREGON

Steady Crushing of Rebels is Predicted With New Assistance.

BRITISH ALARMED

London Press Sees "Far-Reaching Consequences" in Act of America.

(British United Press.) London, Dec. 31.—The Daily Chronicle says editorially that the United States decision to sell arms to the Obregon government "may have far-reaching

"The United States," the Chronicle comments, "assumes no formal obligations toward President Obregon, yet the move is a perceptible step toward a

defacto American protectorate. "If Obregon prevails he will owe his success to Washington." For this reason, the Chronicle continues, the United States will have undoubtedly some voice in Obregon's use of his power.

Wealth of Mexico "The strategic position and great natural wealth of Mexico make any such change of great importance to the world," says the Lloyd George.
"However, Britain isn't criticising nor does she feel any jealousy of the United States in the matter. United States i U. S. to Assist

(British United Press) Mexico City, Dec. 1.—Enthusiasm in Government circles knew no bounds today when word spread that the United States had agreed to sell arms

United States had agreed to sell arms to President Obregon.

The announcement came as a surprise, and it is generally held that the action of the Washington Government means a speedy crushing of the rebels. Several former service men of the A. E. F. are reported to have volunteered their services following the intimation that the Government at Washington looked with favor upon Obregon's cause. One American aviator is reported to have offered to furnish a plane.

Obregon has refused all such offers because he desires to inculcate a "hands off" policy for foreigners; also, he believes his present army sufficient to cope with the situation.
