Dominion. Happenings of Other Days.

THE NORTHWEST REBELLION.

The closing days of March, 1885, witnessed the outbreak of a rising in the Northwest Territories. It began among the settlers who had settled in western Saskatchewan and was followed by trouble and an outbreak among certain Indian tribes.

EARLY CLOSING.

BILL PASSES BRITISH HOUSE.

London, March 19.—(By the Canadian Press)—After sitting until five twenty this morning discussing the coal emergency bill, which went through the report stage, the house of commons met again at noon and passed without a division the second reading of the shops early closing bill, which was proposed to take effect on the present business period, making closing time eight on Saturday and seven on other days.

LIQUOR INSPECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT.

The annual report of the chief liquor inspector, Rev. W. D. Wilson, was presented in the legislature at Fredericton yesterday. The report showed that there were twenty-two sub-inspectors working under the chief in New Brunswick. During the year four licenses were revoked, one wholesale and three retail. Mr. Wilson spoke of the prevalence of crime, saying that it seemed to be the aftermath of all great wars.

SOUTH AFRICA.

South Africa remains very strongly in favor of British connection. It has endorsed Gen. Smuts and rejected the Hertog policy which would disrupt South Africa and the Empire at the same time. The Nationalists, led by Hertog, sent delegates to Paris last year to petition for restoration of the status which the Transvaal and Orange Free State possessed before the South African war.

LIGHTER VEIN.

Brown was going to have some alterations made on his home and asked Jones—who had just got rid of the bulldozer—the best way to go about it. "Oh," said Jones, "you call in a decent builder and tell him the limit you are prepared to pay, and he'll see to it."

THE WOMEN'S VOTE.

Will the women all over the United States vote in the presidential campaign this year? It is only necessary to secure the ratification of two more states to ensure that result, and one of these, Washington, is safe. A very determined effort is now being made to secure ratification in Delaware.

CHARITIES AND PROHIBITION.

Mr. Bird S. Coler, Commissioner of Charities in New York, wants the name Public Charities changed to Public Welfare, on the ground that the day of charity is past. Mr. Coler makes a very significant remark in regard to the effects of prohibition when he says: "Prohibition and prosperity have so reduced the business of the municipal lodging house that it will be but a short time before the building will be used for other purposes."

TERRITORIAL REVENUE.

Fredericton, March 20.—The report of the controller-general, tabled yesterday, showed that the territorial revenue totals \$5,816,000, including stamptax, \$598,883. The Dominion subsidy amounted to \$637,276. Renewal licence on timber licences, \$82,429.33; forest fire protection tax, \$32,906.93; wild lands tax, \$33,944.49; mine licence, \$7,000; judicial royalties, \$80,000; fishing licences, \$30,000; taxes on incorporated companies, \$75,962.

Lord Mayor of Cork Killed.

London, March 20.—The Lord Mayor of Cork was shot dead at one o'clock this morning. The revolver was fired by a masked person whose identity is unknown. They entered his residence and after firing the shot, escaped in an automobile.

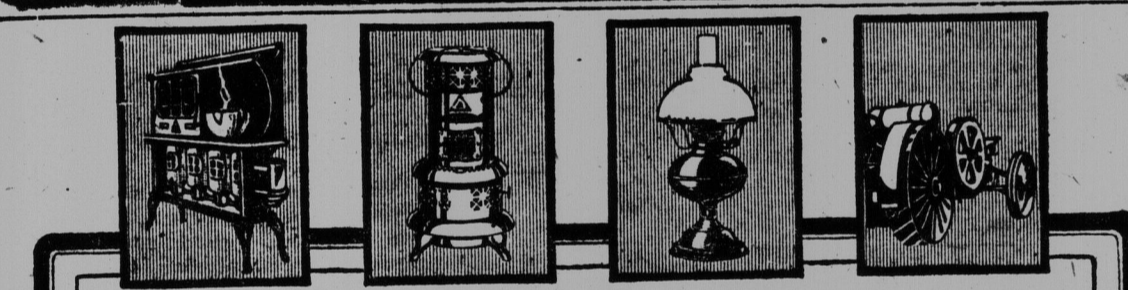

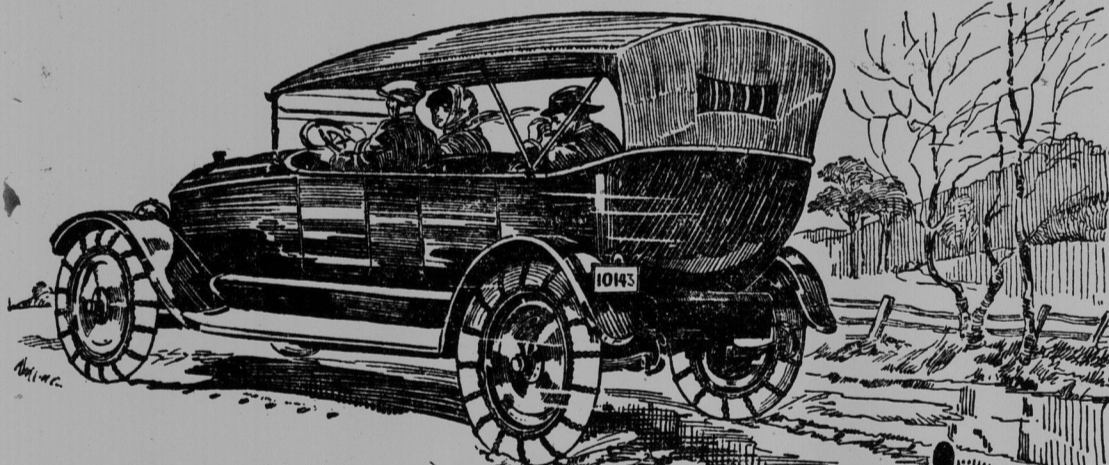

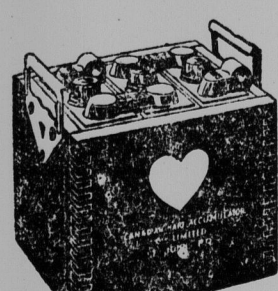

TRIALS OF MISSIONARIES.
Dear Guardian—
The steamer Olu Chuan was on Feb. 6, wrecked on the Upper Yangtze River, China. She had on board a number of our missionaries and families on their way to West China. All our party were saved, though about fifty Chinese were drowned. On the boat were Rev. R. S. Taylor and his wife, Miss Taylor and her four children, and Miss Dale, returning from Honolulu; also Rev. Mr. Walker and Miss Walker, Nurse Batstone and Miss E. Wilson, going out for the first term. These people by the narrow margin escaped being caught in their cabins as the boat turned over soon after striking. They assisted each other up on to the high side of the boat, where they remained until rescued by sampans.
Two or three were able to save a steamer trunk each, but those whose cabins were on the low side saved nothing, but all lost trunks and other baggage, which are still in the submerged hold. They spent the night at a Chinese farm house, and were thirty hours without food or sleep. The following day a French gunboat happened along and took them the next day to Chungchow, where we have a mission station. From there they were taken on to Shungking by the steamer Du Chuan, on which the second half of our party were following down river.
The cheerfulness of these people as they went forward after their harrowing experience and the loss of so much that cannot be replaced out here, would cause many of us to blush with shame at our petty troubles. Thank God for a purpose in life which cannot be washed away because it is built upon a rock.

Big Event in City Brings Folks From All Over Province.
The heavy traffic on Charlotte and King streets and through the Square yesterday was probably due to the great Going-Out-of-Business Sale being held by the King Square Sales Company.
Their heavy advertising lately has brought hundreds of people from all over the province to take advantage of the year's greatest bargain.
The manager is determined to sell everything, and sell it quickly; hence the ridiculously low prices on foot wear, clothing, hats, caps, dry goods, all of which are goods of paramount quality, quite up to the usual high standard of "The House of Bargains."
Mill men who were bothered because half their women workers stayed home Monday to do the family washing have introduced the mill laundry, and now the women coming to work Monday morning drop a laundry slip in a box and forget it until their laundered things are delivered Thursday by a mill wagon at their homes.

CANADA TO GET ENGLISH CLOTHES

Average \$12 a Suit—Of Type Known as Standard Suits.
London, March 17.—The Canadian clothes buying public will benefit by the recent release of large quantities of woollen clothes by the British government. Twenty thousand ready made men's suits are to be shipped to Canada from London at wholesale export price of about fifty-four shillings per suit (which at present exchange rates is about \$12).
The suits comprise government tweeds, serges and worsted and are not of the type known here as standard suits. The shipment has been arranged under the auspices of the Canadian Export Pioneer of Toronto by J. Murray & Co., who have recently been active in developing the Indian market for Canadian products.

ANOTHER NEW BADGE FOR THE SCOUTS ADDED

Citizenship Knowledge the Requirement to Win It

LAWYER EXAMINER

Three Distinctive Parts of the Boy Scout Movement Now—What They've Been Doing This Week in the City Troops—Mr. Skelton's High Honor.

On account of the growing interest in political and national affairs, the Canadian General Council Boy Scouts Association, have added recently a "Citizenship" badge to the already comprehensive badge system of the Boy Scouts.

The requirements for this new badge are:—The scout must know, (1) The qualifications for voting at municipal, provincial, and municipal elections in the province in which he lives. (2) How people become British subjects. (3) How Canada and the province and the municipality in which he lives are governed. (4) How the United Kingdom is governed and what control its government exercises over Canada. (5) The leading principles of the British North America Act. (6) The principal functions of a good municipal government. (7) What the principal courts of justice of the dominion and of the province are and the duties of the principal officers of such courts and particulars of judgments how they are chosen, and their duties. (8) What a Scout can do to beautify and make healthy the place he lives in. (9) What the principal duties of a good citizen are. (10) The Scout must produce a certificate, signed by his scoutmaster, showing that he has personally taken part in some public useful service. The majority of adults might carry this badge with advantage to themselves and their community. A prominent lawyer of St. John has kindly consented to act as examiner for this badge.

There are now three distinct parts of the Boy Scout movement. For the boys between the ages of eight and thirteen there is the Wolf Cub organization.

These boys are keen to secure their stars and badges, for which they pass tests somewhat similar to the Boy Scout badges but modified to suit their age. As their name, Wolf Cubs, might imply they carry out their activities making great use of animal stories and games. Scoutmasters have found it a much pleasanter task to lead these boys than to guide their elder brothers.

The next division are the Boy Scouts proper. They follow the plan of scouting as Baden Powell originally designed it. Recently a new division has been formed, called the Rover Scouts. This division takes the form of a club meeting at regular intervals and consisting of Scouts who are fifteen years of age or older, and who possess the Second Class "Badge." This department of scouting has sprung with surprising rapidity in England and is now being introduced into Canada. The Rovers take more advanced work than the Scouts. All three of these divisions are going ahead excellently throughout Canada.

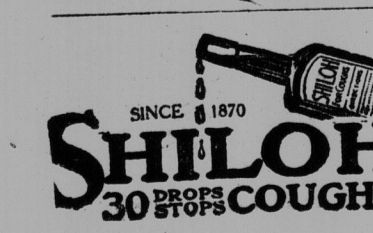

THE VALLEY RAILWAY

(Fredericton Mail.)

Leader Murray's reference to C. P. R. running rights in his speech on the address in the legislature, gave Premier Foster an opportunity to make public some facts relating to this important matter which should be of great interest to the general public. It seems that when the proposal to build the road via Rothesay was abandoned by the old government, a promise was made by the federal authorities that they would, in consideration of the cost of building expensive bridges over the St. John and Kennebec rivers, defray the cost of running rights over the C. P. R. from Westfield to St. John. The premier drew attention to this matter in the legislature and cited the opinion of the opposition as his authority. He quoted from the debates to show that as acting premier during the session of 1916, Mr. Murray had informed the house that the federal authorities had consented to defray the cost of the running rights.

When the road was completed and the present government asked the federal authorities to carry out their promise, they were met with a flat refusal. In order that the public might not be deprived of the much needed accommodation, a temporary arrangement was entered into by the provincial government for running rights. Under that arrangement the railway is now being operated, but Premier Foster maintains, and he is justified in taking that position, that the federal government must eventually bear the cost of the C. P. R. running rights. The old government, which was bowled out of office in 1917, appears to have been incapable of doing anything right. They bungled matters in connection with the Valley Railway all the way through, and now that the present administration has had a big task on its hands endeavoring to get something done for the people, it is the intention of Premier Foster to take a decided stand on the question.

It is also most desirable that they recognize that the new federal law which may be used to prohibit inter-provincial import will only prohibit the actual importation of the liquor itself and will not in any way interfere with the "short-circuit" arrangement to which exception is now taken. But it will go a long way to curtailing the amount available for distribution in some provinces where liquor is not now manufactured, and thus will afford greatly improved protection against abuse.


Building Record Broken.

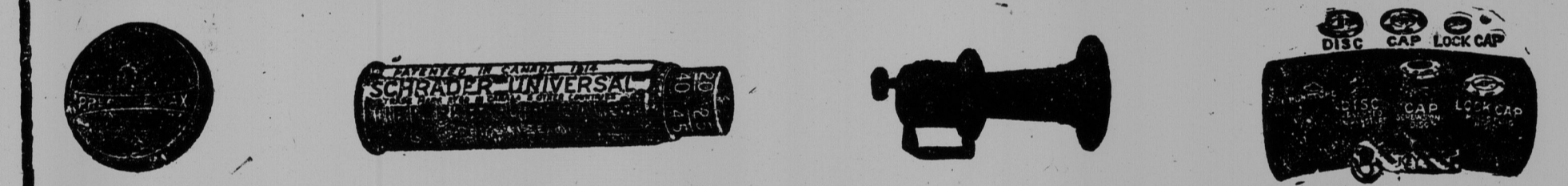
THE OUTLOOK FOR PROHIBITION

lessening the horror with which they viewed the idea of prohibition. It is now impossible to evoke again the resolute hostility to effective prohibition which we experienced over large areas ten years ago.

2nd. Serious leaks have been recognized especially owing to the definite refusal of the acts to prohibit inter-provincial trade. But many who advocated the adoption of the acts did so with the avowed understanding that facilities were to be provided for those who desire to have liquor for domestic consumption outside the province. In practice this allowed the "short-circuit" arrangement by which orders may be sent to an agent outside the province, while in reality the liquor is sold and delivered by a firm in one's own neighborhood. Also grave difficulties have arisen regarding the prescription sale by druggists and physicians of beverages which could hardly be regarded as bona fide medical treatment. It must be noted that these defects, while a valid ground of criticism of the acts if we assume that they aimed at preventing people obtaining liquor in their own homes, are no valid grounds on which to allege failure of the old acts.

The real question now before the people of various provinces is two-fold. First, the better regulation of the sale by physicians and druggists, and secondly, the further regulation of the quantity of liquor to be allowed in one's own private cellar, which to allege failure of the old acts.

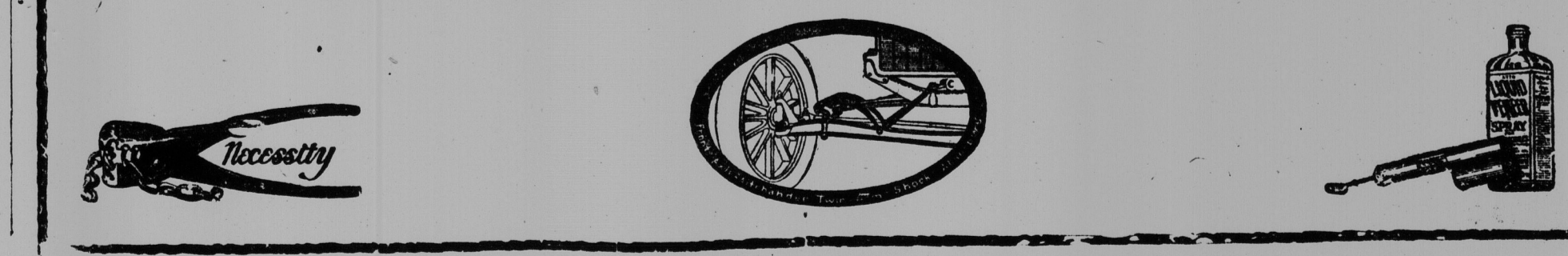

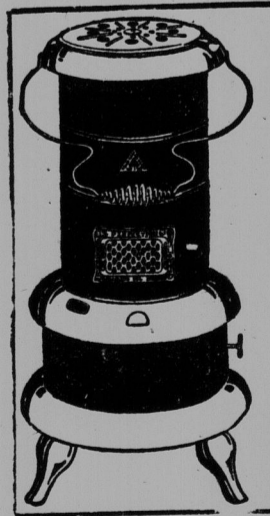

Government Takes Big Parcel of Property In Mill St. and Paradise Row

All the Way From Depot to Mission Church

Included Also Is Property in Alley Off Paradise Row -- Notification to Owners in Connection With Project for Fine Railway Depot.

While there has been much talk of the erection of a new railway station in St. John, nothing really definite beyond the preliminary work of survey done some time ago has transpired until today, when notices were sent out by L. R. Ross, C. N. R. terminal agent, stating that the government is now the owner of the various properties extending from the present depot along Mill street to the Mission church in Paradise row. They have been acquired under the Expropriation act. This means that the preliminary steps have been taken towards the building of the new station of which plans are now complete but subject to revision.

Under the act of expropriation plans were filed in the office of the registrar of deeds on March 5 so that the various properties went into possession of the government from that date. Adjustment of values will now be in order. Valuers will be appointed and the owners will be ordered the amount fixed. Should this be found not satisfactory, the matter will go to the exchequer court to be adjudicated. The surveys in connection with the work are being done by Gilbert G. Murdoch, C. E. The New Station.

When the matter was first discussed it was said that the plans for the new station called for a building valued at about \$100,000 but whether these still hold or whether they have been enlarged upon, cannot be said at present. A. P. Barnhill, C. E., one of the C. N. R. commissioners, said today that the plans were not yet available but that they had been definitely agreed upon. A conference must be held with the C. N. R., mostly pertaining to the matter of track levels, and there would probably be a conference with the city.

The desire was to get away from the level crossing as at present existing. Whether this would be done by way of a viaduct for city travel or an overhead structure for the railways was still a matter undecided. A suggestion has been made that a viaduct be built from High street to Mill street joining Mill not far from Union, thus carrying traffic to and from the northern section of the city and providing for vehicular and street railway traffic as well as for pedestrians. The alternative is for an elevated track structure over Mill street, causing no interference with the ordinary traffic beneath. The plan of the C. N. R. and the city will be sought with some plan to do away with the level crossing.

It is believed that the new station will be located on the side of the present one facing south. The land expropriated will permit the erection of a building suitable for all requirements, up-to-date in every particular with plenty of space for express and mail baggage and various other needs. There will also be given greater yard room.

The Lots Taken. Beginning at the corner of Paradise row and Mill street the building wherewith others adjoining was destroyed by fire a few months ago, expropriation will be made along Mill street to the station and along Paradise row to the Mission church. The corner lot is owned by the Bank of Nova Scotia while next in order along Mill street come the freehold of Mrs. Johanna R. Sweet under lease to Mrs. E. H. Heatt, next to the freehold of E. J. Heatt under lease to Thos. P. Kelly, that of David Conkey in two lots, one held by himself the other by Michael Marcus, the freehold of Mrs. Johanna R. Sweet leased to the estate of Owen Sullivan, then the freehold of Sarah E. Hazen's estate leased to N. S. Springer. Next to the bank lot at the corner of Paradise row is another lot owned by Mrs. Sweet on which is a four-story house owned by George Chamberlain, an alley intervening between it and a freehold owned by the estate of E. H. Heatt, which are buildings owned by E. J. Heatt, M. A. Harding and W. A. Steiper.

IN THE MARKET. It is simply robbery, was the statement heard from a woman who was purchasing some commodities in the market this morning. At one stall she asked the price of eggs and was informed that they were eighty cents a dozen, and right alongside another countryman was asking seventy cents a dozen. A representative of the Times found that this variation was in evidence throughout the entire building. Eggs varying from seventy to eighty cents a dozen, creamery butter from six to seven cents a pound, and potatoes from eighty to eighty-five cents a peck. Lamb was selling at from twenty to twenty-five cents a pound, veal from sixteen to eighteen cents, ribstark was selling for fifteen cents a pound, lettuce for ten cents a head, celery from twenty-five to forty cents a head, and cabbages for twelve cents a pound.

CORRECT TOTAL.

In the report published this morning concerning a basket social held on Tuesday at Robbsey under the auspices of the Community Club in St. Paul's church school room the proceeds should have been given as \$130. A total of \$110 was realized and there were two donations of \$20 each.

PRESENTATION.

Miss M. Craig, one of the employees in the office of the superintendent of the Dominion Express Co., was very pleasantly surprised this morning when Miss Jean O'Leary, on behalf of Mr. Haycock and staff, presented to her a silk umbrella. Miss Craig has been obliged to retire from the company's service on account of ill health.

ILL IN TORONTO.

Word has been received that Frank P. Curran very ill in Toronto. His daughter, Mrs. Hatfield, has been called from St. John to his home. Mr. Curran was for years agent here with the Canada Railway News Company, and has been engaged with that company in Toronto. Friends will regret to hear of his illness.

TWENTY-FIVE DEATHS.

The following deaths were reported to the board of health this week: Senility, five; leucæmia, four; pneumonia, three; endocarditis, three; asthma, one; infantile, one; convulsions, one; cerebral hemorrhage, one; pulmonary tuberculosis, one; tuberculosis of the bowels, hemorrhage of umbilical cord and uræmic convulsions, one each, a total of twenty-five.

BUSY SESSION OF POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning George Axtell and William J. Mulcahy were up on a suspicion of breaking and entering the barn of Alexander Clark, Murray street, and stealing harness valued at \$40. Police Gillis, who was on duty, accused walking along Portland street and Axtell was carrying a bag under his coat. The policeman and Sergeant Rankine became suspicious and they went in different directions in order to catch the men. He said he saw the two men again at corner of Acadia and Main streets, but the bag was not in their possession. Soon after he met Sergeant Rankine carrying the bag and the sergeant told him to catch the accused. He gave chase and arrested the men on Long wharf. Sergeant Rankine gave evidence of finding the bag of harness in a shed. Axtell said he got the harness from Mulcahy, according to the sergeant.

Alexander Clark who keeps a stable in Murray street, said his harness was kept in a locker in the back was broken and the contents stolen. He identified the harness as his. The case was postponed until Monday morning. Robert McLaren was charged with stealing a suit of olskins from Robert McKay, a longshoreman, working on the S.S. Metagama. George Allen and Harry Kaves gave evidence of seeing the property in the possession of the accused. Kaves said he bought the suit from the accused for 77 cents. McKay identified the suit as his and had no intention of stealing it. An officer on the ship spoke in his favor and the magistrate allowed him to go.

Joseph Wallace was charged with being drunk and refusing to leave the Union station when told to do so. C. N. R. policeman Ross gave evidence and the accused was remanded. James Totten, charged with having liquor in his possession other than his private dwelling pleaded guilty and was fined \$200 or six months in jail. Mrs. Annie Collins, charged with committing a statutory offence, was sent for two years to the Home of the Good Shepherd. Eaton Crossman, also charged with Mrs. Collins, is confined to the isolation hospital with diphtheria. William Perry, charged with misappropriating money from T. Rankine & Sons, Limited, was sent up for trial. George Wilcox, charged with being drunk and having liquor in his possession other than his private dwelling, was charged with collecting money under false pretences, and Roy Barke, charged with stealing from the Dufferin Hotel, were remanded until Monday for sentence. Robert Lovey, charged with sending threatening letters was remanded until he could get sureties. Johannes Flamen was charged with stabbing Derek Hozeman on board the S.S. Bibster, was allowed to go on suspended sentence on condition that he would ship on board the S.S. Lord Dufferin, which is to sail tonight. An officer from that ship escorted him from court. A lad who escaped from the Boys Industrial Home, was sent back to the home. The case against the three lads charged with stealing a quantity of cloth from the store of Hoffman Bros. will be determined on Monday morning. Five men charged with drunkenness were each fined \$8 or two months in jail. Four of the men said they became intoxicated with lemon extract.

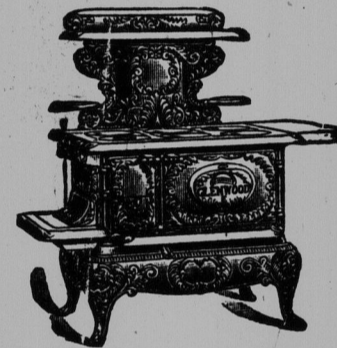

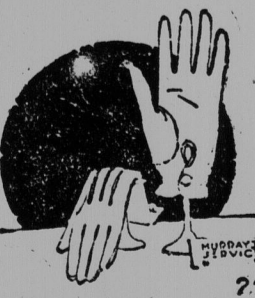

CHILD NEGLECT IS FAST INCREASING

Something More Than Public Statistics Needed to Deal With Social Problems.

In the annual report of neglected and delinquent children in Nova Scotia the superintendent, Mr. Blois says:

"In reviewing the work of the past year three convictions are dominant in our mind. The first is the imperative need of something more than the public statistics in dealing with the connected social problems which are constantly brought to our attention. How effectual is the law only those who are daily brought into contact with the misery, suffering and wretchedness of humanity can adequately testify. Good

laws justly carried out are a help, but the primary need is the quickening of the moral and religious ideals of all the people.

"The second conviction is that the home and family life as they once were known are fast disappearing, and as a consequence, neglect of children and delinquency, are rapidly increasing. Inadequate housing accommodations, the high cost of living, the mad desire for pleasure at any cost, loose moral, and low religious ideals are the chief causes for the breaking up of family life. These four confront us daily in dealing with delinquency and neglect.

"The absolute necessity for putting forth greater effort in this work for children is our third conviction. If living conditions for children, such as we found during the year in various parts of this Province, are not improved, and the causes which produce such conditions not removed, we shall pay the penalty at no distant date. From such conditions, not only radiate evil social ideas, but they furnish the text for the main and most convincing argument of the social agitator of the destructive type. This country cannot afford to run the risk of developing a class of citizens who, both directly and indirectly, become a menace to organized society.

"We are often asked if conditions

are worse than if former years, and if so, what are the causes; and we are also told that there is no use trying to change these conditions for the better, because they always have been so, that there are a fixed part of the laws of God like light and darkness and cannot therefore be changed. A moment's consideration will convince even the most thoughtless that living conditions in this province are not what they were in years gone by. Have they improved? For some, yes, for others, no. In the old days there was very little moving from place to place. Families grew up and acted in the same neighbourhood, or left the country altogether; there were very few people of foreign nationality; the people were deeply religious and the moral standards were relatively high.

"Children who are not receiving a common school education are a problem in this province. In some cases the children are truants, the parents making at least some effort to have them attend school, but in the majority of cases the parents are quite indifferent about the matter and the children are growing up with little or no education. If each child is entitled to an education, and if it is for the good of the whole province that the children should be educated, then there should be a change in the administration of our compulsory attendance law. At present only a number of the owners have the compulsory act in force and a considerable number of the owners are not very strict in the enforcement of the law. Has any community the right to say that its children do not require an education? Does this matter concern the province as a whole, and should there be a uniform law equally enforced throughout the Province?"

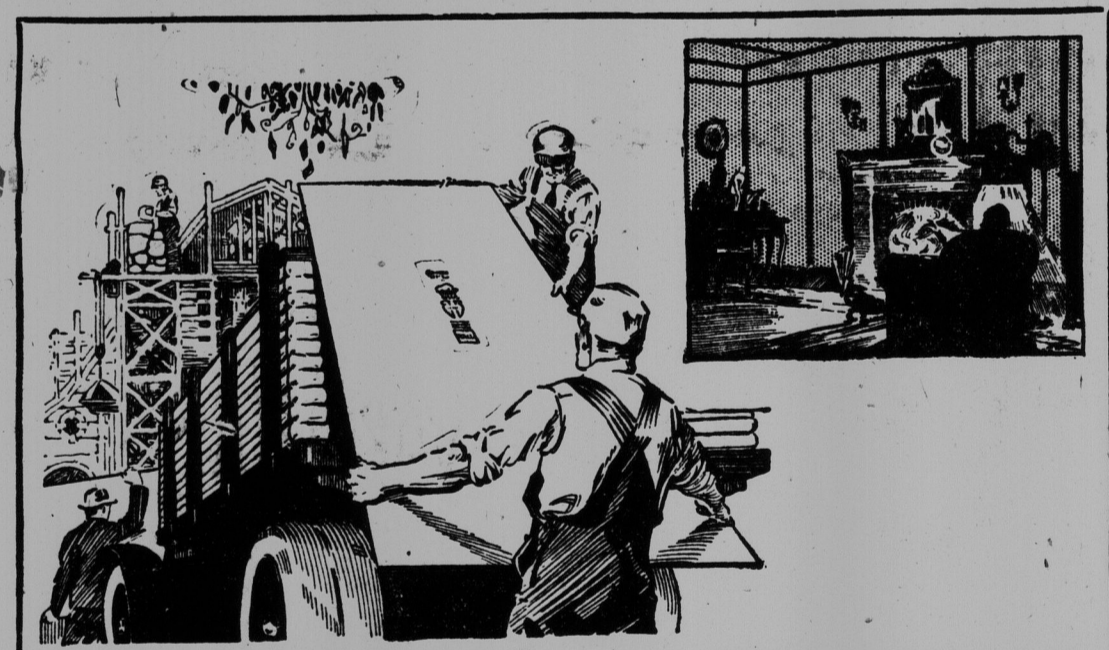
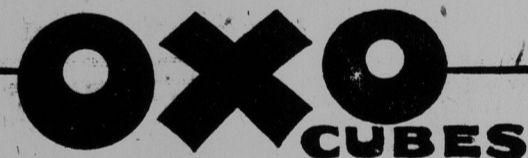
Judge Hunt says in his report:

"There are three great safeguards to every nation, religion, home and schools. A religion that teaches a child his or her accountability to God. Homes where a child learns to know and feel a mother's guidance, schools where a child is taught the things that fit it to take the place of service in the world. We have 10,000 children in our city day schools, in a very few years these children will be the leaders of public opinion with all the rights and privileges of citizenship. Can we estimate what our loss might be were they neglected? Can we over estimate their value if properly trained? Each pupil in our day schools costs our City \$40 a year to educate. No one can begrudge this cost. Our money could not have been more advantageously placed. Many of us have heard of the Jukes family. This family consisted of three sisters, mentally deficient. Out of this family were 700 descendants only 20 of these became skilled workmen, 63 died in the workhouse, 140 obtained relief for their living by begging, 108 were women of ill fame, 18 were keepers of houses of ill fame, 76 were arrested at different times charged with 117 criminal offenses. What a different result if the family had been properly cared for at the beginning. The cost of this family to the State was I believe in the millions. We learn through such examples that to prevent crime is far cheaper than to punish it. It is through the Juvenile Court that preventative means are secured."

Old Time Story Of St. John Court House

The Building, the Judges and Some of the Trials of the Long Ago Recalled in Article From Newspaper of the Sixties.

The following history of the St. John court house, now in ruins, is copied from a St. John newspaper published in the early sixties of the last century:—

Our St. John Court House; Its History and Traditions.

The organization of Courts of Justice in St. John was one of the first measures which engaged the attention of the Loyalist founders of the city. However good or virtuous men may be, it has been found, in practice, impossible to establish a state of society of such Arcadian simplicity that disputes will not arise among its members; and however excellent a community may be, unworthy men will occasionally find their way into it who require the attention of the law.

The first frame building erected in St. John was a place of worship, which was used as an Episcopal church until the opening of Trinity church, on Christian day 1791. This building was erected on lot No. 121, German street, between Duke and Queen streets, the same lot upon which the residence of James McMillan, Esq., now stands.

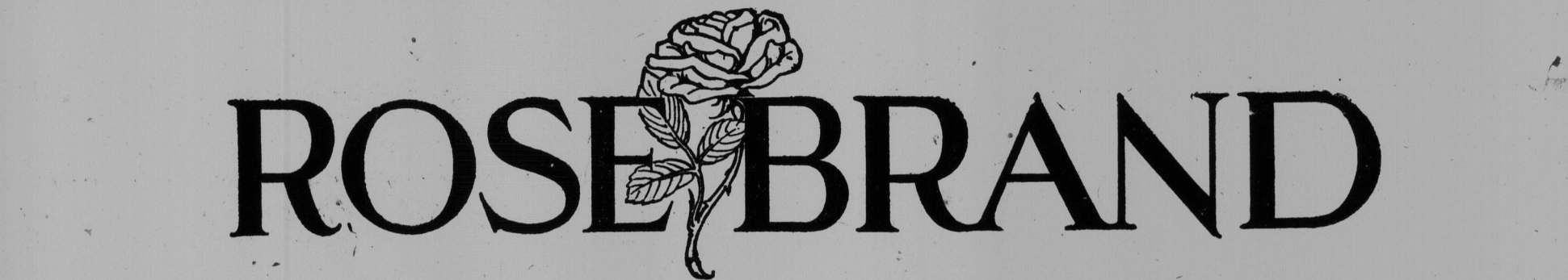
The first Criminal Trials Five persons were tried for Criminal offences at this first Court. Nancy Mosley was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to be branded in the brow of the left thumb in open Court and then discharged.

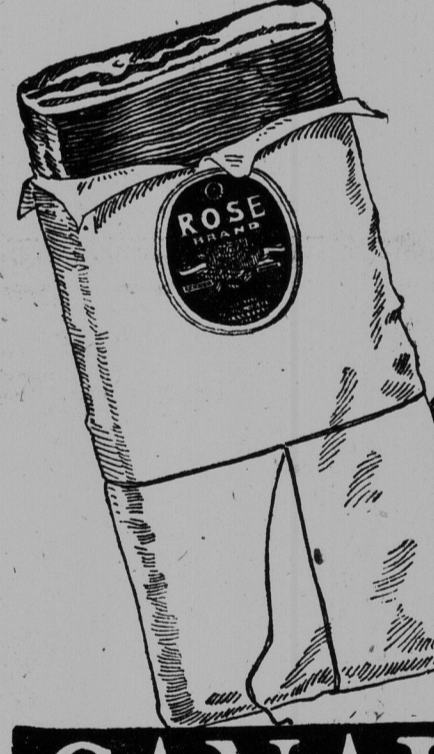
