INCHING FOR NEGRO IF CAPTURED

POSSES IN PURSUIT

Men Made Escape, But One Was Found—Threat of Immediate Shooting for the Other If Residents Can Locate Him

(Canadian Press)

St. John, N. B., Oct. 10.—Another lynching threatened within this county as a result of a brutal attack made last night upon Annie McElhenny, a student of the Cotterville high school by an un-

known negro. The populace has not been so excited since the lynching of Zack Walker here August 13.

McElhenny was on her way home from school when she was attacked by a negro on the road leading from Calu to Cotterville. She fought her assailant until her clothing was torn from her back and she was thrown to the ground.

She was taken to the home of her father, Mr. J. W. McElhenny, where she was held in a room. She is now recovering from her injuries.

Police officials have been alerted to the scene in an attempt to locate the negro. A reward of \$100 has been offered for information leading to his capture.

It is believed that the negro is still in the county. Residents are urged to report any sightings to the police.

The police are also searching for the other man who escaped with the negro. A reward of \$100 is also offered for his capture.

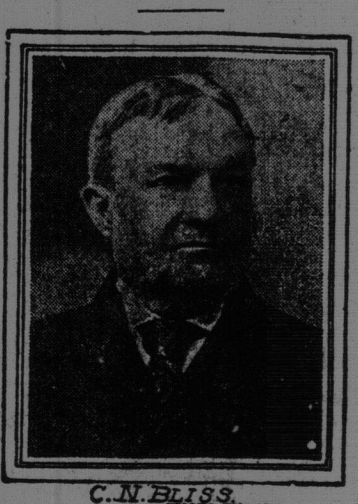

IMPORTANT MATTERS FOR ALDERMEN

Safety Board Schedule for This Afternoon Includes Playgrounds, Factory Site and Street Problems

A number of important matters are before the common council at the special meeting which is being held this afternoon.

Some of the subjects for discussion are the proposed Broad street site for the Franklin Baker factory, increased grant for Mill and Dock street water main extension, the report on the proposed civic auditorium, the resolution favoring public playgrounds and the application for a grant for the Free Kindergarten.

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LANDING OF ITALIAN FORCES AT TRIPOLI

Operations Have So Far Been Kept a Profound Secret But Plans are Now Known—Three Thousand Turks Reported on the March to Tunis

Rome, Oct. 10.—The first Italian expeditionary force which left Naples on Oct. 5 was landed at Tobruk, Tripoli, today. It consisted of infantry, artillery and a company of engineers.

The greater part of the Italian army expedition is at sea en route for Tripoli. This was learned from messages in conventional language that escaped the censor.

The first contingent comprising the largest part of the total force, sailed from Naples last night and another fleet of transports left Taranto at sunrise today.

The landing of a whole army corps in Tripoli is looked upon as one of the most difficult operations of the war despite the fact that the fear of an attack by the enemy is entertained.

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McNAMARAS TOMORROW ON THEIR TRIAL

Los Angeles Dynamiting Case Involving Deaths of 14 Persons

Prosecution, as Far as Can be Learned, Must Rely on These to Prove That Brothers Were Responsible for Wreck of Times Building

(Canadian Press) Los Angeles, Oct. 10.—The trial of John J. McNamara and his brother James, charged with the murder of nineteen persons killed in the explosion of the building of the Los Angeles Times, Oct. 1, 1910, will begin here Wednesday in Division 9 of the County Superior court, Judge Walter Borstell presiding.

The burden of proof against the McNamara brothers lies on the state, and as far as the case has developed the prosecution apparently must rely, aside from expert testimony, upon four main points of reputed fact to prove that James B. McNamara, as the instrument, and John J., as directing head of a conspiracy, were responsible for the destruction of the Times building and the deaths of the victims.

That he actually set the bomb which caused the disaster, and likewise planted the bombs at the homes of Gen. Otis and Felix Zeehandelaar.

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OTHERS GO BEHIND BARS IN KINGSTON PRISON

Toronto, Oct. 10.—Three years and two months and six months are the terms that were served in Kingston penitentiary yesterday.

The sentences were imposed by Police Magistrate Denison after witnesses had testified that they saw Raffaele pull out a revolver from his pocket in the abdomen and that they saw Salvatore hit Anderson over the head with a plank.

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BOY SCOUT MOVEMENT SPREADING

London, Oct. 10.—Sir Robert Baden-Powell, who has recently returned from visiting some of the scouting centers in Northern Europe, where other nations have been adopting this means of character training for their boys, has issued an interesting report of the growth of the movement.

In most cases, he says, the training has been adopted direct from the British system, and the uniforms and badges worn by the boys are similar to those worn in this country.

Both Sweden and Denmark have already some 4,000 scouts each, while Norway and Holland have two organizations at work. The Belgian organization is particularly efficient and the scouts in that country have already given proofs of their progress in assisting the troops in putting out the forest fires.

AUTO CRAZE IN ENGLAND HITS TRADE

Washington, Oct. 9.—Craze for the ownership of autos in England has struck a hard blow at other lines of business. Conditions are described by Consul Albert Helstedt, at Birmingham, who says in a report:

The increased use of the automobile in England, while it has brought prosperity to the automobile and cycle makers, as well as to those who deal in accessories, automobile clothing, and other articles attached to the trade, has apparently had a correspondingly detrimental effect upon some other lines of business.

For instance, one of the leading house painters and decorators in Birmingham tells the writer that people are spending their money on automobiles and their upkeep instead of on the re-decoration and painting of their houses.

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MOROCCO TRIBESMEN MAKE STUBBORN FIGHT

Spanish Lose 36 Killed and 109 Wounded—The Franco-German Negotiations

Madrid, Oct. 10.—The Spanish losses in the engagement between two Spanish columns and tribesmen in the Kert River region of Morocco on Saturday were 36 killed and 109 wounded.

The Spanish column in running operations against the hostile tribes advanced some miles inland, burning the houses and driving the tribesmen from their positions, but they met with determined resistance.

The operations were directed by the minister of war in person.

CITY WORKS RECORDS DECLARED TO BE NOT WELL PROTECTED

The pressing need of providing for the safe preservation of the valuable records of the department of public works of the city is a matter that will have to be taken up by the common council without delay according to the views expressed by an alderman in conversation with the Times this morning.

He said that at the recent meeting of the committee appointed to investigate the affairs of the engineer's department the fact was brought out that maps, plans and documents which it would be absolutely impossible to replace and which are of incalculable value to the city are kept in wooden cabinets and drawers which afford no protection in the case of fire, especially as the building itself is by no means fireproof.

RECORD APPLE CROP IN THE ANNAPOLIS VALLEY

Kentville, N. S., Oct. 10.—Exceeding 1,000,000 barrels the apple crop in Annapolis valley is larger this year than ever before known in the history of apple growing in this country.

The problem which now confronts the growers is to get enough barrels to hold the surplus. Farmers are finding it hard to obtain only a limited supply. Many are picking and storing apples in bins until a supply of barrels can be had, in some cases the time extending into several weeks.

THE PLAYGROUNDS

Apparently the committee on playgrounds will have to begin its work without the assistance of the board of school trustees. CONCERNING DISMISSALS

In reply to the alleged demand of some Conservatives that civil servants should be dismissed by the new government to give place to office seekers, the Ottawa Free Press quotes the following remarks made by Mr. Borden in one of his first speeches in parliament: "I welcome the day in Canada when this question of patronage (in the matter of Civil Service appointments) would occupy much less of the time of members of parliament than it does at present. I also venture to believe that a good deal of pressure which may come upon the government with regard to dismissals comes, not so much from members of parliament who would be content in many instances to allow matters to remain as they are, but comes from certain elements of the party which are not in all cases the very best element. I shall welcome, as I have no doubt many of us would welcome the day in Canada when members of parliament and ministers of the crown would have more of their time to devote to the business of the country, and would require to devote less of their time to matters of this kind (the appointments and dismissals of civil servants) which ought to be dealt with in Canada more upon the lines on which they are now dealt with in England.

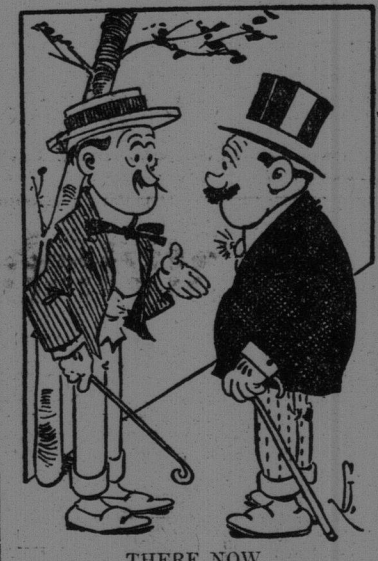

**NEW PLAY FOR  
NEW YORKERS**

"Bought and Paid For" Scores a Triumph - Best Comedy in Many a Day

(Actor Davis in New York Sun)  
It was a lucky day for Manager Brady and the Playhouse when "The Rack" fell down with such a crash, for it cleared the way for the immediate production of George Broadhurst's "Bought and Paid For," one of the best comedies of New York life that any American playwright has shown in many a long day. Not only is this play immeasurably superior to anything that Mr. Broadhurst has done before, but in one of its characters at least, James Gilley, he has drawn a picture of a parasite which is a creation.

This role of Gilley as portrayed by Frank Craven, and the almost equally droll and human character of his adoring wife as played by Marie Nordstrom, keep the audience in such fits of laughter that the serious story of the play becomes almost of secondary interest, and yet so admirable is the work of Julia Dean and Charles Richman in the leading roles and the telephone girl who marries for money and the young millionaire whose wife deserts him because he haunts her when he is drunk, that the honors of the performance must be divided between these four players.

That Eugene Walter's "Paid in Full" has influenced Mr. Broadhurst in writing this play there can be no doubt. The title, the title of the one suggests the other, and then, again, when you come to analyze the role of Jim Gilley, it is really a better play than "Paid in Full."

There is no single scene in it which equals the interview between the wife and the sea captain in Walter's drama, but the characterizations are superior and the comedy interest is so much greater that it bids fair to appeal to an even wider public. It is a delight to hear an audience roar with laughter as they did at the Playhouse last night, for it was laughter which a great deal of the time had a tearful background. Clever farce as he has proved himself in the past, in this play Mr. Broadhurst never resorts to the farcical touch. He has written a splendid human comedy and given it a serious background which will ring in the ears of the two sisters, Virginia Blaine, the telephone girl, and her sister Fanny. The red-letter night for the Blaine girls, and Fanny's fiancé, Jim Gilley, a thirteen-dollar-a-week shipping clerk, has been invited as a guest to the wedding.

Virginia announces her engagement to Stafford. Second act, two years later, finds the Staffords, married and happy—except on those occasions when Stafford comes home drunk. The Gilley, also married now, has come up in his work along with sister. Gilley, now in his brother-in-law's employ, is earning \$100 a week. Stafford comes in decidedly drunk and, as a proof positive of that fact, at once raises Gilley's salary to \$150 a week. Then he tries to kiss his wife, but she, disgusted at his condition, pushes him aside. He grows more and more insistent. She looks herself in her bedroom and breaks the door down. He declares that he had bought and paid for her and she must stand the consequences. Her engagement to Stafford.

Next morning, full of repentance, he tries to apologize, but she refuses never to take another drink. This may all sound rather like a temperance lecture, but as it is acted it is nothing of the sort. The wife gives him back all the jive he has given her and leaves for Hartford. The last act, two months later, she is earning ten dollars a week again and living in the Gilley 38th street flat. Brother-in-law Gilley has also come down in the world. He doesn't hesitate to inform Virginia that by her matrimony she has absolutely ruined his life.

Then, in the best scene of all, Gilley and his wife put their heads together and conspire to bring about a reconciliation. Gilley calls Stafford up on the phone and tells him that his wife wants to see him. Fanny meanwhile stands by her husband and so nervous that unconsciously she begins to say her prayers. But what's the use. This is a play which cannot be described in detail. Go and see it and then you'll want to go again.

**Daily Hints For the Cook**

**DEEP APPLE PIE WITH CREAM CHEESE**  
Bake a nice deep apple pie about three quarters of an hour before dinner. Have small cream cheese pressed through a sieve and mixed with a cup of whipped cream and a little salt. Press through a pastry tube or tin funnel, on top of the dessert. The cheese and cream combinations may also be used on a two-crust apple pie.  
**CREAMED FISH IN RAMEKINS**  
Any kind of left-over fish can be creamed in ramekins for luncheon or supper. Onions and shrimps are particularly good in this way. Mince a white onion and brown in a saucepan with a little butter. Add a cup of beef stock and some chopped green peppers. Have ready a pound of shrimp meat and one crab, also shredded. Add a half cupful of cream and cook about 20 minutes, being careful not to burn the mixture. Have the ramekins greased, pour in the fish, cover with bread crumbs, add bits of butter and bake. Left over fish, bone, can be treated in the same way.

Were Led to Death
Toulon is, in a little way, a "Venice" and the town is divided up by parts of the harbor and canals, so that it is necessary to go by boat. And so it was that, just before sunrise, the two men were taken to a small boat across the harbor...

Men Slept Soundly
When the authorities went to the naval prison at three o'clock Lemarchal was sleeping soundly in sailor fashion in his hammock. On being told that he had to go for a pardon he had been refused he simply replied, "Thank you," and right up to the end of the terrible ordeal, which lasted for more than an hour, he behaved in a most calm manner...

Were Led to Death
In the meantime troops and crowds of curious had gathered on the rifle butts across the harbor. Representatives of all arms stationed at Toulon were present with the regimental bands, while behind the troops an enormous concourse was present to demonstrate noisily. The two condemned men had been degraded some three or four days before, so that that part of the ceremony did not have to be performed.

## BELIEVE LOST BARK IS ABEONA

That is Opinion Expressed by St. John Shipping Men Relative to Report From Cape Sable

That the barkentine reported to have foundered off Cape Sable is the Abeona is the general opinion of shipping men and some vessel captains here. From what can be learned in well informed sources here the barkentine which Captain Goodwin of the fishing schooner Good Luck reports at Boston as having foundered off Cape Sable on Sept. 29, can be but one of two, either the Abeona or the Sirdar. The former was bound from New York for Halifax with coal and the latter was coming light from New York to Port Greenville. The name of the barkentine Hector, owned and commanded by Captain Reicher of this city, has also been suggested but it is learned that she must have been miles out of her course to have been where the disaster is reported.

The captain of a schooner that recently arrived from Vineyard Haven states his positive belief that it is the Abeona. He says that she left the Vineyard on Sept. 28 with his vessel and others and at that time was reported to have been leaking badly. The Abeona was built at Malbone Bay, N. S. in 1885, by C. N. Anderson, who is given in the register as her owner. She was 400 tons. Her sailing port is Bridgetown, B. W. I., and it will be remembered that Capt. Goodwin heard the word "Bridgetown" in the indistinct hall that came to him from the vessel. (See inside page of Times.)

## OVERHEAD BRIDGE IS HIS VIEW

Railway Official Discusses Mill Street Congestion—C. P. R. to Have Warehouse Ready by December 1—Some Plans

The work on the new C. P. R. warehouse at Mill street is getting a quick start and it is expected that it will be completed by the expiration of the contract period on December 1. It will be a valuable addition to the local freight facilities. The shed now in use by the C. P. R. on the northern side of the I. C. R. elevator has for years been much too small for the traffic and the C. P. R. was greatly hampered also by the lack of sidings.

Both these difficulties will be overcome by the new facilities, and in addition the new office building to be located at the Mill street end of the warehouse will accommodate their clerks who are now scattered between the C. P. R. freight shed and the I. C. R. freight office.

The freight shed will run east and west parallel with Main street and the rest of the land acquired by the railway at that corner will be filled with sidings. The tracks are depressed several feet below the level of street and the floor of the warehouse and the platforms between the sidings will be on the same level with both the street and the floors of the cars, making the handling of the freight a very easy matter.

The shed will be set back thirty feet from the street and it is this thirty feet that has been in the public mind as desirable for a widening of Mill street. As the approaches to the warehouse and the sidings will be carried out to the street it would need only the filling in of the spaces at the end of the tracks to make this a solid platform and although nothing definite has been decided, so far as is known there is said to be good reason to hope that the railway will take this course.

The C. P. R. recently acquired the buildings on the corner of Mill and Main streets, as it will as soon as the leases expire, there will be the opportunity to carry this extension of the street right along to Main street, but that even this extension would not go far to solve the traffic problem of Mill street was the opinion expressed by a prominent railway officer in a conversation with the Times. He said that the widening of the street would not in any way lessen the congestion which is caused by the railway crossing the street at the Union Station. This, he said, was the biggest problem to be solved and it would be solved until an overhead bridge was built to carry the street traffic over the railway crossings.

The project has been suggested for years and it is declared is entirely practicable from an engineering standpoint. The only thing that stood in the way was the expense and this would not become any less as the property in the vicinity which would have to be expropriated grew more valuable.

## HAS NOTHING TO SAY ABOUT THE CASE NOW

Judge Ritchie Informs Charles Thompson That Stabbing Charge Against Jas. McElmon is in Court's Hands

The new patrol wagon worked overtime last night, and as a result six prisoners faced Judge Ritchie in the police court this morning. Five of them were charged with drunkenness, while the other had a serious charge against him, that of stabbing a man in Pond street with a knife. William McKinnon, Frederick Montebell, William Petley and Charles Gilbert were fined \$4 or ten days in jail on the drunkenness charge and Ernest Starr \$8 or thirty days in jail on a like charge. Gilbert was also charged with resisting the police and carrying a revolver. He was fined \$10 or two months in jail on these two charges.

James McElmon was charged with being drunk in Pond street and also charged by Charles Thompson with stabbing him and by Mrs. Mary M. Campbell with breaking a door in her home and attempting to stab her son. Policeman Sullivan told of evading the arrest and Mrs. Campbell gave evidence of his having broken into her home and making a lunge at her son with an open knife. Thompson did not appear in court and he was said that he did not wish to press the charge. The court told her that her husband would have to appear and that he had nothing whatever to say in the matter of pressing the charge. The case was adjourned until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

George F. Menzies was charged by Charles Owens with assault. Owens said that he was a clerk in White's restaurant in King street and that Menzies was the manager. On Saturday night last, he said, after some words Menzies assaulted him and chased him out of the place. The defendant denied this and placed the blame on the complainant. The case was dismissed.

Robert Phillips was fined \$2 for allowing a cow to run at large in Adelaide street and George Prattle was fined a like amount for driving a team on the sidewalk in Strait shore.

## RESUME WORK ON THE CITY CHARTER

Interrupted by Elections, Will Take Up City Government Plan Again Next Week

The citizens' committee appointed to draft the new charter for the city under the commission form of government will be called together soon, probably at the end of next week for the purpose of finishing their labors, which were interrupted by the federal elections.

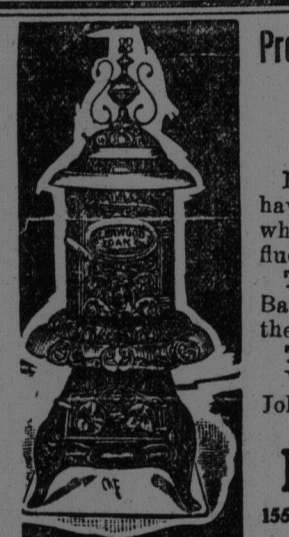
