R s i a n Offensive

Berlin, July 1.—The Russian troops in the Eastern theatre have opened a heavy attack on the Germans along the Stuyva front and stormed German positions along an 18 1/2 mile front. According to the official German report they met with heavy losses and were forced to retire. This was the most extensive attack delivered by the Russians since the revolution.

Encircling Lens.

London, July 1.—British troops continue to make progress in their encirclement of the French mining town of Lens. To day's official statement from the British headquarters reports the capture of a German defence on a half mile front along the north bank of the Souchez river, southwest and west of Lens.

Fishery News

Mequito Point to Bryant's cove—Total landed 1334 for last week 1188; 35 traps and 29 hook and liners are fishing. Prospects are better than last week. There is a good sign of fish about the ground. Caplin and squid are plentiful. Some few traps have done fairly well and many others very little.

Spunardi's Bay to Upper Island Cove—Total landed 116 quintals, last week 68 quintals; 16 traps and 12 skiffs are fishing. Prospects are poor. Caplin and squid are plentiful; hook and line men are doing nothing.

River Head, Bay Roberts, to Jugler's Point—Total landed 270; 28 traps are fishing. Prospects are poor. Caplin and squid are plentiful but there is nothing doing with hook and line.

South Point, Brigus, to Bay Roberts Point—280 quintals have been landed to date (June 30) of which 130 quintals were caught during the week, 54 traps and 30 small boats are fishing in this section. Prospects are not bright; at Port de Grave 35 traps have taken about 115 quintals this week of which three crews took the greater part. At Bigus and Burnt Head nothing has been done; hook and line almost nil.

Public Notice

The attention of the Public is called to Section 32 of the Post Office Act, 1891, which provides that the P. M. General has the "sole and exclusive privilege of conveying, receiving, collecting, sending and delivering of letters within and from Newfoundland. Newfoundland Patriotic Association Employment Committee

The Employment Committee has been appointed by the Newfoundland Patriotic Association "to take into consideration applications for employment in civil life from returned Soldiers and Sailors of the Newfoundland Regiment and Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve who have been granted honourable discharges." The Committee can only perform this duty to our returned soldiers and sailors with the fullest help and co-operation of all those in the Colony who employ labour or require help or service of any kind in which these men may be employed. The Committee will prepare and keep on file a register of all men seeking employment, giving their age, qualifications and experience, so far as possible, of each applicant. This information will be available to prospective employers, and steps will be taken to bring about interview or correspondence between employers and soldier or sailor applicants. Every person or firm when requiring such help for either domestic or business purposes is therefore invited to communicate to the Committee the nature of the help required, and of the work to be done, and such other information as may be useful.

For the present the Headquarters of the Committee are at the Colonial Building, St. John's, and communications should be addressed to A. E. Parsons, Secretary of the Employment Committee.



Notes and Comments

We congratulate the citizens of our sister town of Harbor Grace in securing the shipbuilding yard. It is a business of immense possibilities and capable of great development, and should become in the course of time a splendid source of revenue to the townspeople of the second city. The effort put forth by the citizens of Harbor Grace in getting the Company to locate there is what the Guardian and its editor have been advocating ever since its establishment in 1909. If we would see our outport towns develop, we ourselves must make an effort to develop them. Our political representatives have, generally speaking, failed in this respect, and whatever efforts have been made have usually been made on behalf of St. John's. There are two or three cases, at least, in this country, including the one at Harbor Grace and one at Bay Roberts, where local effort has been successful, and this ought to be an incentive to every ambitious citizen to do everything possible to develop the community and the district in which he resides.

Things in this country are becoming demoralized. The people are treated by their "Masters" (who should in reality be their servants) with scant consideration. We are loathe to advocate a revolution, but it looks as if the rank and file of this country have got to do something more than they are doing in order to bring about a normal state of affairs. The civil servants seem to be taking their cue from those higher up (there are some exceptions) and public matters are often treated very indifferently. We shall return to this subject again. The young man Quinton, to whom we referred in the beginning of this article, was an outport lad, and as an outport newspaper we also demand an enquiry. And we call upon the outport people to wake up. Learn some-

thing about the many things working against your interests. Get to know how you are ignored and treated, except at an election time. Then find a remedy and apply it. For as sure as God is there is a remedy and it can be applied. One prominent citizen in St. John's or in an outport has more pull and influence with those in authority than a thousand ordinary citizens.

Patriotic Meeting

Lieut. Thistle, of the Nfld. Forestry Battalion, addressed a patriotic meeting, composed chiefly of women and children, in the public building here on Tuesday night last. The chair was occupied by Dr. T. C. McLeod, Lieut. Thistle explained the need there was of men for the Forestry Battalion, and outlined the conditions under which men were being recruited, referring particularly to the rate of pay, which starts at \$1.10 a day; the pension scheme in connection with the Battalion and other matters.

Sergt. Squires, of the Canadian Regt., who is visiting his home at Topsail, was also present and delivered a very interesting account of his experiences as a member of the Canadian Northwest Mounted Police, as a Cavalry scout in the South African War, and latterly as a Sergt. in the firing line around Ypres in France, where he was buried for nearly an hour by the explosion of a German shell.

Coalition?

Things political are undergoing rapid changes lately, and the man on the street is rather puzzled and at sea looking for an explanation. The Opposition's fight against the passing of the Supply Bill was dropped suddenly last week, and the Bill passed through all its stages. On Wednesday a rumor was current in Bay Roberts that an amalgamation or coalition of the two parties in the House had taken place.

The report was that Mr. Piccott had resigned as Minister of Marine and Fisheries and that Mr. Coaker had taken his place. That Mr. Bennett had resigned and Mr. Lloyd had become Colonial Secretary. Beyond that nothing could be learned. Thursday morning's Advocate hinted that something very important would likely be announced in the House Thursday afternoon, but the evening papers made slight reference to the matter.

We learn, however, that at the Premier's invitation a committee of both parties met to consider the advisability of forming a National or Coalition Government, but at this writing nothing definite has been done. The much-talked-of "sovereign people" are in the dark and still kept guessing. This old British colony has got to get some tips on Democracy from Russia.

Serious Situation in Quebec

Things are looking very serious in the Province of Quebec, where talk of conscription seems to be bringing matters to a head. One paper there is preaching separation from Upper Canada, and there is rumour of "armed opposition" to conscription if it should be enforced. "The Knights of Death" is the name of a new anti-conscription league organized in Montreal.

Mrs. Kenneth Mercer, who was visiting friends at Bonavista, has returned home.

Mr. Benjamin Bradbury, of County Road, who went to Canada last spring has enlisted with the No 3 Forestry Battalion at New Glasgow, N. S. He sends his best respects to all friends here.

The marriage of Mr. R. J. Bonister and Miss Hilda Jardine took place at St. Matthew's Church on Wednesday morning last. Rev. Mr. Stirling officiated.

The Lunenburg banking sch. Revenue arrived at St. John's last week with one of her crew, Albert Wentzell, aged 48, dead. The remains were coffined and sent to the man's home.

Venizelos has been recalled to Athens, and is now head of the Government. Greece has broken off diplomatic relations with Germany, Austria and Turkey, and the next thing we are likely to hear is that Greek troops are actively cooperating with the Allies in a combined effort to drive the Bulgarians out of Serbia and cut the Berlin-Constantinople railway line.

Rates of Commission on Money Orders.

The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland are as follows:

- For sums not exceeding \$10 - 5 cts
- Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 - 10 cts
- Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30 - 15 cts
- Over \$30 but not exceeding \$40 - 20 cts
- Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50 - 25 cts
- Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60 - 30 cts
- Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70 - 35 cts
- Over \$70 but not exceeding \$80 - 40 cts
- Over \$80 but not exceeding \$90 - 45 cts
- Over \$90 but not exceeding \$100 - 50 cts

Maximum amount of a single Order to any of the above countries and at offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 35 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50. To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round by Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass with an the radi of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.


