As an indication of the saving ef-fected by War Secretary Haldane the military, volunteers and yeomanry, under the existing conditions, cost \$22,-155,000 a year, where the estimated cost of the new territorial force is only \$14,445,000. The war secretary explained that un-der his scheme the expansion and contraction of the forces would be easy and if other nations generally agreed to reduce their armed forces, Great Britain could gradually do so without destroying the organization as a whole and equally, should the neces-sity demand it, Great Britain could ex-pand and produce more men. 
