

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 18—The south by storm at the same time today. While a tropical hurricane was flay ing the guilt coast, earth tremors over-turned chimneys and frightened many people from their homes in Georgia, Alabama and Tennessee. The sarth-quake did little damage, but a wind that reached a velocity of 114 miles an hour lifted roofs from houses at Pensacola, Florida, and sunk a num-ber of vessels in the harbor. One life was lost.


