

THE GERMAN U-BOATS SUNK MANY MORE VESSELS

SUBMARINES CONTINUING OPERATIONS

Seventeen French Vessels Sunk Since Feb. 1—Big British Steamer Sunk.

Paris, May 14.—Seventeen French merchantmen were sunk by German submarines during Feb., March and April, according to an official statement issued today, during the same period nine French vessels were attacked by underwater craft but made their escape. No armed merchantmen have fallen prey to the U-boats. The French passenger steamer Medjerda has been sunk by a submarine while voyaging between Oran, Algeria and Marseilles. This announcement is made by the ministry of marine. The survivors were picked up.

British Boat Sunk. New York, May 14.—The Associated Press today carries the following: The British passenger steamer Medina, a 12,359 ton vessel, owned by the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company, was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine April 28 when off the coast of Plymouth, according to American passengers arriving here from England. On the same day, in almost the same locality the Omrah, a vessel of 8,139 tons, owned by the Orient Steam Navigation Company, was also torpedoed and sunk, the passengers said. No lives were lost on either vessel.

MR. POTTS OF ST. JOHN MAKES THE GOVERNMENT MEMBERS SIT UP AND TAKE NOTICE

Fredericton, May 14.—The address of Mr. Potts was the feature of tonight's proceedings in the legislature. He spoke in part as follows: "Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly.—It is true I share the opinion not only of the members of the opposition of the House of Assembly, but also I believe of the majority of the electors of the Province of New Brunswick, when I say the speech from the throne was a sad disappointment. At a time when our country is faced with some of the most serious problems that an empire has ever been troubled with, you would have thought that the government in its speech from the throne would have referred not only to, but made suggestions on a policy that would have assisted not only the province but the whole British Empire."

Mr. Potts would have thought that with flour at \$17 a barrel and potatoes \$7, that the Legislature would be spending its time trying to bring about a better condition of affairs, but there was nothing about that in the speech at all. It was about time they were throwing away politics and working together for the advancement of New Brunswick and the Empire. The premier and his organizers had assembled prior to the election to prepare a policy and without having the slightest idea that the people would take them seriously. The responsibility of government had been placed in their hands and now they were impugning the opposition to get through with the business of the session and promising in return for this that they would pass some important legislation next year. That is about the position that his honorable friend occupied at the present time. The honorable member who was speaking in his cheerful way had offered the government his assistance but the offer had not been accepted. The premier had outlined his speech and he could not be diverted from it. It is time for men in high positions to cease acting like a piece of machinery. Great questions are at issue and the premier should stand on his own merit.

The speaker congratulated the farmers on the abundant harvest. When he read that it caused him to do some thinking. He had once been in the wholesale business and had bought potatoes by the carload at \$1.10 per barrel. What he would like to know is what had brought about the great increase in price.

HUNS TRANSFER 600,000 MEN FROM RUSSIA TO FRANCE

ENEMY REPULSED SEVERAL TIMES BY BOTH ALLIES

French and British Hold Ground During Night— British in Charge of Bullecourt and Roeux— Germans Bring up 600,000 Men from Russian Front—Russian War Minister Quits.

London, May 14.—"Hostile raids were repulsed last night northeast of Epehy and north of Ypres," says today's official announcement. "We secured a few prisoners. We progressed during the night in Roeux village (Arras front)."

Heavy Enemy Losses.

Paris, May 14.—The French last night repulsed German reconnoitering parties northeast of Vauxaillon, north of Crannois, at Hill 108 and in the Champagne. The war office so reports. The German losses were large.

Bullecourt and Roeux.

British Headquarters in France, May 14, via London.—(From a staff correspondent of the Associated Press.)—British troops have just about completed the absorption of two important villages to which the Ger-

mans have clung desperately ever since the battle of Arras began. One of these villages is Roeux, on the north bank of the Scarpe, and the other is Bullecourt, which lies directly on the Hindenburg line just to the west of Quent.

As a result of steady fighting during the last forty-eight hours the German foothold in Bullecourt has been reduced to two isolated posts, where bombing fights are continuing. A virtually similar situation exists in Roeux. Since the British victory on Saturday, the German counter-attacks have lacked much of their recent fierceness. The number of prisoners taken during this time has been exceptionally large for the character of the operations and the number of troops involved.

The heat wave in the fighting district has been temporarily broken by a series of thunder storms.

STRIKE OF ENGINEERS IN ENGLAND COLLAPSES

Many Men Return to Work in Manchester, London, Derby, Altricham and Elsewhere — Liverpool Strikers Still Out.

London, May 14.—The strike of engineers, which has been in progress in various parts of England for some time, has collapsed at many places in the northern counties, where the King and Queen arrived today for a week's tour. Work has been resumed generally in Manchester and Southern Lancashire. In Coventry an overwhelming majority of members of the trades unions denounced the strikes. In many other centres men returned to work today. This was particularly true in London, Barrow, Derby and Altricham, where the shops are being operated as usual today.

In other places, such as Liverpool, 500 men decided to remain out in order to compel the government to withdraw the bill, designed to obtain younger workmen for the army, to which the strikers take exception. On account of the opposition of the amalgamated society of engineers to strike little enthusiasm for it is shown in most places.

CITY COUNCIL MET YESTERDAY MORNING

Teamsters Receive Increase — Damages Paid a Citizen — Permission to Erect Garage Granted — Other Matters Dealt With.

At the City Council meeting yesterday morning it was decided to prepare 25 acres of the city land on the Manawagonish Road for cultivation and let it out in small lots to city gardeners; permission was granted to David Watson to erect a garage on Duke street; the petition of the teamsters to be allowed to increase the charge for teams was granted; the claim of James Lattimer was ordered settled and the proposal to extend Water street, West Side, to Bridge road, was left for further consideration.

Mayor Hayes presided and all the commissioners were present. On motion the request of the teamsters to be allowed to increase the rates to \$4 for single and \$6 for double teams was granted.

The town planning commission asked that a survey of the land between Water street and Bridge road, West, be made with a view to opening a street there. One property owner objected and it was decided not to take any action until he could be heard.

The application of David Watson for permission to erect a garage on Duke street was granted. Commissioner McLellan reported that measurements were necessary to establish the distance from Calvin church in the case of the application of Dr. Gorham for permission to erect a garage on Dorchester street and he expected to be able to report at council meeting today.

Commissioner Russell will report on the application of James Lewis and Son for lease of lot on Britain street at today's council meeting. T. H. Estabrooks appeared before the council and drew their attention to the desirability of opening up some of the city land on Manawagonish road for garden lots. Twenty-five acres could be cultivated this summer and after some discussion the commissioner of public lands was authorized to have 25 acres ploughed and harrowed.

On motion of Commissioner McLellan the claim of James Lattimer for \$600 damages for injuries received by city truck running over his foot was ordered paid. Commissioner Fisher and the Mayor dissented.

SHIPBUILDING AGAIN UP IN THE COMMONS

Will furnish information.
"If there is any correspondence it is between the Imperial government and the munitions board," replied the acting premier.
"Has the government taken no interest in this matter? Has it no knowledge or nothing to do with this important question?" persisted Sir Wilfrid.
Sir George Foster merely replied that the government was very busy and would be "bothered to death" if it had to be consulted on all correspondence.
Mr. Pugsley named many places on the New Brunswick coast from St. John to Gloucester where there were shipbuilding yards ready to undertake contracts and where wooden shipbuilding had been extensively carried on in the past.
The acting premier promised to see

care for Dr. Pugsley such additional information as was available.
Gets After Thompson.
A most unusual incident occurred in the house this afternoon when Col. J. D. Taylor (Con.), New Westminster, announced that at a future date he would move that the member for Qu'Appelle (Mr. Levi Thompson, Lib.), be ordered to withdraw certain remarks made by him during the budget debate which were improper owing to their reflection upon certain members of His Majesty's forces. Col. Taylor also stated that he would ask that the statements in question be expunged from the record.
Col. Taylor quoted the remarks to which he took exception and which were as follows:
"I would not like to charge any man with disloyalty, not even those political colonels who strut around our country in the King's uniform, drawing big pay, and who have been on a free trip across the Atlantic to England or France but who the moment they smelt gun-powder turned tail and slipped back home, leaving their men to go to the front without them."
The member for New Westminster said he deprecated these remarks of the member for Qu'Appelle because they were very mischievous and very insulting to those colonels of whom he had the honor to be one. They were a breach of the rules of the house and of parliamentary debate because they reflected upon the honor of members

of His Majesty's forces.
The Minister of Militia, replying to a question by Mr. F. Pardee, Lib., West Lashburn, in the Commons today, made public some interesting facts in regard to the national service registration cards sent out last winter and now analyzed and collated. The total number of replies secured was 1,548,590 or a little over eighty per cent. of the estimated number which would have been received had all the cards sent out been filled in.
The total number who are classed as "military prospects" according to the answer given on the cards, is placed at 364,470 but of these approximately forty per cent are now engaged in agriculture, shipbuilding, munitions or mining and consequently can hardly be drawn upon under present conditions.
Apparently Canada has still some things like 150,000 males of military age who have not yet enlisted and who if selective conscription came into force would be available for active military work.

SIX THOUSAND COAL MINERS STOP WORK

Calgary, May 14—About six thousand coal miners are affected by a strike which was formally called into effect by the executive of district 15, United Mine Workers of America, this morning, comprising practically all of the mines in the province of Alberta and eastern British Columbia. As a matter of fact calling a strike is a mere formality, because the men in all the larger mines have already been on strike, or "taking the holiday," as they call it, for several weeks. The only difference is that this action of the miners in the various camps has now been sealed with the official approval of the union. The miners executive is still in session in Calgary and according to an early report a proposal of Hon. T. W. Crothers that the men return to work pending an inquiry by a royal commission does not meet with the approval of the men's leaders.
They feel that they are now in a position to dictate terms to the operators, and that it will only be a matter of time until their demands are granted.

Excessive Prices Charged.
Complaints are being made that the vendors under the prohibitory law are asking exorbitant prices for liquor ordered on prescription. A couple of cases have come to the attention of The Standard. In one instance a man was charged \$2.40 for a small quantity of liquor and in another \$1.50 was the sum charged. In both cases the doctor's bill was \$2 and this made the liquor very expensive. No complaint was made in either case about paying for the doctor's services but it was felt that the prices charged for the small quantities of liquor ordered were excessive and that a price should be fixed for this commodity.

Old Board of Directors Re-elected—Reports for Year Submitted.

The annual meeting of the Protestant Orphans' Home was held yesterday afternoon at the Home with the president, T. H. Estabrooks, in the chair. The old board of directors was re-elected to office, those on the board being: T. H. Estabrooks, president; J. A. Likely, first vice-president; Mrs. McLellan, second vice-president; Henry Rankine, treasurer; Mrs. MacLaren, secretary. Thanks were tendered to H. H. Mott who offered his residence as a summer home for children. An arrangement could not be made to run the home the offer was declined with regrets. Through the thoughtfulness of some of the directors, who had made a collection from citizens, a fine gramophone has been placed in the Home. Through the generosity of several friends the Home was presented with a bread-cutter, a device which was much needed.
The treasurer's report was read by H. C. Rankine, showing that the current receipts were \$6,732.66 and the current expenditures \$5,885.30, leaving a surplus of \$1,044.30 which was transferred to the general account.
The directors' report was submitted and reads as follows:
The sixty-third year closes with this report. We have at present forty children in the Home, twenty girls and the same number of boys. Notwithstanding war conditions we have had a most prosperous year.
The general health, with but few exceptions, has been very good. Thanks are again due Dr. W. F. Morrison, Dr. Bentley, Dr. A. D. Smith and Dr. P. A. Godsoe for services gratuitously rendered.
The children have enjoyed many

Charlottetown, P.E.I., May 14.—Frank McKinnon, aged 47, lighthouse keeper at Naufrage, on the north side of the island, was drowned on Saturday while setting lobster traps near the shore in about a fathom of water. His boat capsized. A companion was rescued by another boat.

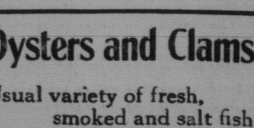
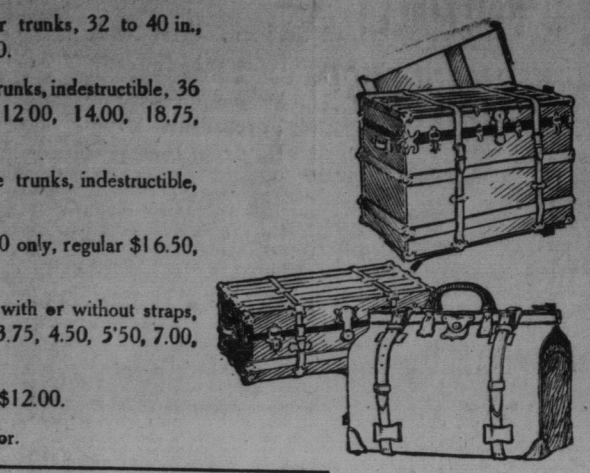
