The Pas, Man., Feb. 6.-With 256 aths from Spanish influence The Pas, Man., Feb. 6.-With 260 Getthe from Spanish influenza and many sick and dying all over the north, the Indian race in Northern Manitoba is threatened with extinc-tion. Three weeks ago the Indians were free of the scearge, according to the reports brought in here. The dogmushers say that the epidemic-has taken 107 at Norway House, 125 at Gross Lake, 20 at Red Earth, and it is taking a heavy tofi at Pelican Narrows, At this place, in one house twenty Indians were lying on the floor sick with four dead bodies in amongst them. All were too ill to re-move the dead.

Win-out detracting from the value of the President's contribution to a result of such far-reaching importance, it is no less fair to give equal credit to the sagacity of Lloyd George and Clemenceau in recognizing this as a means of dissolving differences which threatened to disturb the harmony of the conference and threaten the soli-darity of the Allies.



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


