yd George's Last Note to Irish Leader Plainly and Frankly Put, Opening Way for Conference Without Strings and Without Conditions — No Stipulation to Which Objections Can Be Taken — Dublin Feels Door is Open for De Valera's Acceptance.

London, Sept. 29 - With Lloyd George's reply to nonn De Valera generally accepted as conciliatory in e, and not calculated to offend Sinn Fein leaders, the belief is prevalent here that the Irish "President" will accept the invitation to a conference in London on October 11, and thus bring to an end the correspondence which has gone back and forth over the channel since July.

w can Sinn Fein refuse," London diplomats are asking, "in view of the fact this latest note is nothing more than a frank invitation to De Valera to talk over the situation without strings and without condi-tions."

Deblin Pleased.

Information from Dublin is to the effect that the public is pleased with the tone of the reply and feels that the door is left open for De Valera's acceptance "in all honor." It is point ed out that the letter contains no positive stipulations to which any objection can be taken, and that while it declares that the British Government cannot recognize Sian Fein's claim to Sovereign State, it does not in so many words demand a preliminary repudiation of Irish doctrines.

Lloyd George has once more enunciated two broad principles upon which he is willing to deal with Sian Fein in search for a ground upon which the Irish peace may be obtained. First, is the retirention that, under no circumstances, will the British Government admit, either directly or by inference, the government is

sy inference, the sovereignty of fre-land.

Second, is that the Government is willing, without conditions, to meet Sinn Fein to discuss how best the as-sociation of Ireland with the "Com-munity of Nations known as the Brit-ish Empire" can be reconciled with Irish National aspirations. The Pre-mier's reply to De Valera is in contra-distinction to his pevious message, a clear cut exposition of these two prin-ciples without any lengthy explan-tion of Government's attitude.

The note, as finally despatched, fol-lows exactly the forecast of the doc-ument recently carried in United News despatches and is backed prac-tically unanimously by the British Government and public opinion.


