**PROCEEDINGS**

**OF THE**

**TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING,**

**OF THE**

**WESLEYAN METHODIST MISSIONARY  
AUXILIARY SOCIETY,**

**FOR NOVA SCOTIA, CAPE BRETON AND P. E. ISLAND,**

**HELD AT CHARLOTTETOWN, ON THE 4th JUNE, 1845.**

**THE Meeting having been opened in the usual way, the Rev Richard Knight, Chairman of the District, was called to preside. The Report of the Committee was then read by the Rev. Charles De Wolfe, Secretary. After which, the following Resolutions were proposed and unanimously adopted:—**

**Moved by the Rev. Mr. Crosscombe, seconded by the Rev. Mr. Smith—**

**I. That the Report now read be adopted, printed and circulated, as usual.**

**Moved by the Rev. Mr. Webb, seconded by the Rev. Mr. Weddall—**

**II. That the success which the God of all Grace has granted this and other Protestant Missionary Societies, in various parts of the world, during the past year, should both excite our warmest gratitude, and encourage us to renewed and zealous efforts in the cause of Missions.**



Moved by the Rev. Mr. Pope, seconded by the Hon. Charles Young—

III. That this Meeting would earnestly recommend fervent prayer to Almighty God, that he may remove the various hindrances to this cause; may grant to his people the grace of a more enlarged liberality; and above all, that he may pour out of his Spirit on all flesh.

REPORT

THE return of another Anniversary calls us to the pleasing task of presenting a condensed view of the proceedings of the Wesleyan Missionary Society during the past year; and it affords us matter of gratitude to Almighty God, that this period has not been without some of those tokens of his favour to our Society, that He has been accustomed to vouchsafe. Some few of our Missionaries have, since we last met, fallen on the field of labour, among the Heathen, but they fell in the arms of victory, and in dying conquered death. May their ashes rest in peace, till the morning of a joyful resurrection—may their devotedness stimulate survivors!

EUROPE.

In IRELAND the Missions slowly advance in the face of much opposition. There are twenty-four Missionaries in this department of the work, and there are now fifty-two Schools, containing about 4000 children, half of whom read in the sacred Scriptures. Mr. Muller, though he has lately suffered in health, through his herculean exertions, still keeps at his post of usefulness in Munenden. The Missions in France and Switzerland present a most cheering aspect. In one day school, in Paris, sixty-two Roman Catholic children attend: those who are able to read, learn the New Testament, and learn a translation of the Wesleyan Catechism. It is computed that 600 children of Romish parents have received a scriptural education in our Mission Schools in Paris.

The Society's Mission in FRANCE and SWITZERLAND justly claims continued countenance and support. Great is the amount of direct good which it has instrumentally effected; and when the indirect benefits which have flowed from it are also taken into the account; when it is considered that

in addition to the religious Societies, Congregations, and Schools connected with the several Stations, the Mission-press is exerting a beneficial influence far beyond the sphere of the personal ministrations of the Missionaries; that several of our converts are now honourably and usefully connected with other religious communities; and that in various places the National Protestant Church has been quickened, and has received pious and useful pastors from the Mission;—it may be safely concluded that the Society's Mission in these countries is one of the most important agencies at work in the advancement of the cause of Evangelical religion upon the Continent of Europe. And when it is further borne in mind that some of the Missionaries now labouring with distinguished success in connection with another Society, in heathen lands, gratefully ascribe to the ministry of the Wesleyan Missionaries in France their personal conversion to God; that some of our own Missions in the West Indies, and in other places where the French language is spoken, may now obtain a supply of labourers raised up at our Stations in France; and that the Mission-press is furnishing our Stations in Hayti, with useful religious publications, and is diffusing throughout France, and other parts of the Continent, information respecting the Society's widely extended operations;—it will then be apparent that the work in France and Switzerland is entitled to the support of the Friends of Missions for the additional reason, that it is beginning to exert an important influence upon the conversion of the world at large.

#### ASIA.

The moral and religious condition of the East, cannot be regarded without the deepest and most melancholy interest. The minds of the people are wrapped in the darkness of midnight and their moral principles have been borne away on the tide of corruption. They have Lords many, and Gods many, Gods of fraud, of lust, and of blood; but alas! there are millions of them to whom the name of Jesus has not yet been uttered, and of whose precious blood they are consequently ignorant. The British dominions in India alone, are supposed to embrace a population of above 100,000,000; and startling must be the announcement to every feeling mind, that including all the denominations of

Christians, the supply of Missionaries for that dense population is as one to 30,000 souls :

In INDIA, if any where, the gospel remedy must be faithfully applied to the spiritual diseases of the people, and the greatness of the field should rather stimulate to enlarged exertions, than cause depression of spirits, or relaxation of zeal. Advancing activity has characterized our Mission in the South of India, of late, and the happy result has been more numerous conversions to God.

In BATTICALOA there have been One Hundred and Seventeen Baptisms during the year. The members of our Society have increased from One Hundred and Twenty-seven to One Hundred and Forty-seven, and there are One Hundred and Eighty-five on trial. Of the latter, One Hundred and Forty-two are among the reclaimed Veddahs, or wild men of Bintenne. In addition to these, a considerable number more have renounced heathenism, and are under Christian instruction. In a recent letter, Mr. Scott says :—

"Since I last wrote, we have broken thirteen stone Pillars, or images of the Elephant-headed God, and have pulled down five thatched huts in which they were placed and worshipped ; these huts were built on private ground, the owners of which have now renounced heathenism, and have consequently given their gods to destruction."

A great change has taken place in the people of TRINCOMALEE, through the influence of the Mission. A knowledge of letters, and an acquaintance with the Scriptures, are almost general ; and it is no unusual thing to see the labouring coolies carry their books with them when they go to work in the morning, and to spend the dinner-hour in reading one to another in groups under the shade.

The Missionaries write from NEW SOUTH WALES—

"With heartfelt joy and gratitude we report the increasing prosperity of the work of God, at all our Stations, as evidenced by the addition to our Religious Society, of 300 church members, during the last nine months."

In WESTERN AUSTRALIA the work of God is making delightful progress among the Aborigines, and an examination of the children of our Mission School there, held at the request of Governor Hutt, has fully demonstrated that their minds are as fully capable of comprehending the blessed



truths of the Gospel, as the European mind. The Missionary says:—

"In this country we do not call in question the intellect and capacity of the natives. With regard to their perception, memory, &c., it seems to us that they are far before masses of European children: their voices and knowledge of singing are most excellent; and with many of our hymns and tunes they are well acquainted.

"We have now buried three of the Natives; respecting two of whom I have already written to you. The third was a boy about 12 years of age, named Bir-gi, who lived with us about two years. For the last three months he gradually wasted away, (as the result of the influenza), and at last the lamp of life went suddenly out. On the evening of the same day, his remains were committed to the grave. He was the most intelligent, quick and clever lad we had in the school. His affliction was very great; yet he exhibited a meekness, patience and hope, that made him lovely and beloved by those who knew him. He was frequently, when in much pain, found on his knees, praying to God to bless him; he was never known to have told a lie; and when spoken to about Jesus Christ he would say in the native idiom, 'Heaven my a get down.' We have no doubt but Bir-gi has become a happy spirit before the throne of God. We interred his remains, on a moonlight night about eight o'clock. On leaving the School-house we sang a hymn; then all the children of the school, with many of the adult Natives and other visitors went about one mile in solemn procession, to the place of interment, where we committed his body to the grave, in sure and certain hope of a resurrection to life eternal. We gave an address to all on the occasion, and the service was closed by the Natives singing a hymn. The Natives all believe that Bir-gi is now happy in Heaven."

Events have transpired at WAIRAU and CLOUDY BAY of a very painful character. This station had not been formed more than three years, yet 600 of the best instructed natives had been admitted as communicants, and 15,000 copies of the New Testament had been distributed, and the prospects were most auspicious; when war arose between the heathen natives and the English settlers, which has for a time blasted the hopes of the self-denying Missionaries. It is pleasing to learn, however, that the native converts refused to join their countrymen in hostilities against the English;—and the Mission Chief, Puaha, first endeavoured to prevent the effusion of blood by going up to the English Magistrate, and with the New Testament

open in his hand, saying to him, "Do not fight, do not fight; this book says it is wrong to fight; the Missionaries have made the land good—do not make it bad again." From the exertions of the Committee in London, it is hoped the Missionaries will soon be able to gather together their scattered sheep, and "lead them to green pastures, and beside still waters." Mr. Buddle gives the following account of the anxiety of a chief to have a Missionary stationed with his tribe. Mr. Buddle asked what he had to say. He replied—

"Oh, Buddle! this is my talk to you. In old times, when we were in our heathen state, our riches consisted principally of instruments of war, (enumerating several); these were handed down to us by our forefathers, and we knew not of any greater riches: if we received a Pounanui, (i. e. a mere or stone scapling-knife) we thought there was nothing superior. By and by foreigners came to our island, and they brought us axes, adzes, hatchets, spades, guns, powder and ball, &c., and then we thought that we had received the greatest riches that could be possessed; we never thought that any thing would come of greater value than these. At length came the Missionary and his books, and just then we saw that we had the true riches, that all the other things were trifles, and that the Gospel alone is the great thing; and hence we forsook our old riches and sought the true ones. Oh, Buddle! when I look along the sea-coast I see the Fronsides at Cloudy Bay, the Alfreeds at Port Nicholson, and all the other Missionaries sitting with their people, and then I look to myself, and my people, and I think I have no teacher, no guide, no keeper, I sit alone; this is what I have to say; let me be like other people. I am tired with climbing the mountains to seek after the Teachers of other tribes. I don't like to go and take the riches of another people; let me have a Teacher to sit in my presence, a keeper for me; let me have my own riches, that I may not go to seek the riches of others; and hence I wrote my letter by Mr. Tutton. As to the word of Tamati that he will not consent, this is my thought: There are a great many trees, some small and some great. There are the small ones, (naming several), but they are nothing thought of; we never seek after them; they are not at all distinguished; nor have they any thing to say. There are large trees also, (mentioning several); these alone have a name, and are sought after by men. And so it is with us. Tamati has nothing at all to say: he has no voice; the matter is with me, and no other person has any right to say a word; and my word is this, let me have this Pokeno (white man), as a Teacher for me, and let me have him to say: let him go home with me now."

I said, "Well, as you so much desire a Teacher, he will go and live at your place, and you must be kind to him, and listen to his talk; but, you had better return home and I will accompany him in the course of a week." He replied, "Well, let it be so, but be firm, be firm," and so he left us, evidently glad enough that he was going to have a Missionary."

The Rev. W. Cross, of the Feege Mission, has been removed from the Militant to the Triumphant Church. Our prosperity in this quarter has been such, that thirteen additional Missionaries are now required, and the field widens before the servants of the Lord, who write that they are but setting their feet on the confines of the group. Portions of the Bible have been translated in various dialects, and printed. There are in the Feege group 985 members of society. What hath God wrought!

### AFRICA.

The Missions in Southern Africa have sustained a loss in the death of that very devoted Minister of Christ, Revd. Edward Cook. The Rev. Barnabas Shaw has returned to this, the former field of his honourable labours, and writes to the Committee in a very encouraging strain.

"There are now more Missionaries, more Chapels, more Schools, more Bibles, more printing, more Tracts, more praying, more openings for usefulness. We only want an enlarged liberality at home and abroad, to enable us to station a Missionary in every central place, who may feed the flock, and go to the surrounding population to seek the lost. 'Till this shall have been accomplished, you must not expect that we shall keep silence; we shall, by the help of the Lord, preach and labour on; and we shall also continue to cry, entreat, and plead, 'pity poor Africa.' I know there is in you a willing mind, and that you are ready to help to the utmost of your power."

At CLANKERBURY a gracious revival of religion has been enjoyed. At two distinct times 36 persons, after strict examination in private, as well as in public, were baptized in the name of the Holy Trinity; amongst whom were two Sunday School girls. The week following the baptism, 20 persons made application for admission into the Catechism class. The Sabbath School at Platherry is very flourishing, and frequently a boy or girl may be seen in it, imparting instruction in reading to a man or woman of hoary age.

From WESTERN AFRICA the accounts are of the most satisfactory nature. Congregations large—Schools well attended, and conversions frequent. It only needs a more adequate supply of Missionaries, and the promised blessing of the Holy Spirit, and these moral deserts would bloom like Eden. In one Sunday School there are 312 men and women trying, with all simplicity, to read the Word of God, and gain a knowledge of his will.

The prospects of the Mission at KUMASI, the capital of ASHANTI, are very cheering. The public religious services are numerous attended. The people listen to the word with great attention; and it is not uncommon to hear them acknowledge that their present superstitious practices are useless, and incapable of affording that peace which Christianity appears to them calculated to impart. On some occasions the Missionary preaches in the open air to large crowds of persons, who behave with great decorum and seriousness. From several of the Ashantis the all-important question, "What must I do to be saved?" has already been elicited; and two or three young men of rank give decided evidence of their sincerity, and are becoming members of the Church.

An evening-school, at which some of the Ashantis attend, is in successful operation; and there is reason to believe that the remaining scruples of the King and his nobles, on the subject of schools, will soon entirely pass away, and that the work of instructing the rising generation may shortly be prosecuted without any other limitation than what the want of means may impose. Many of the most influential Chieftains begin to evince much anxiety upon the subject, and express their regret that their children should still continue in ignorance; while the Chief of the sacred town of *Bantama*, who is a great favourite with the King, has placed his five children at the Mission-house, under the instruction of the Missionary, with the frank acknowledgment that he has lost all confidence in the Fetish, and that it is now his conviction that they have been deceived by their priests.

But all is not yet day in Ashanti. Night still hangs over the land; and the partial introduction of Gospel light which affords such hope as to the future, seems for the present to throw the surrounding darkness into even still deeper shade. In the same letter which communicates this pleasing information, the Missionary says—



The scenes I have been called to witness during my short residence here, have, in many instances, been of the most soul-harrowing description; nor could I have thought it possible that human life should be so little cared for, or common humanity be so foreign to the minds in the case of Kumasi. I do not exaggerate when I say that, during the past four months, at least eight hundred persons have fallen by the sacrificial knife, not one of whose dishonoured remains have been laid in the grave. On several occasions I have seen the headless trunks of these poor victims lying in heaps of from fifteen to twenty, the swine and turkey-buzzards either greedily preying upon them, or standing by literally gorged with the flesh of one's fellow-men. Often has my heart sickened at these most revolting spectacles, and I have returned home to weep over and pray for a people so deeply sunk in error, and so far from the way of peace. Often is the language of that beautiful hymn commenting "Saviour whom our hearts adore," the language of my heart: "Great indeed will be the change when Kumasi, now mourning with the blood of thousands, if not millions, slain, shall sound the mystery of redeeming love." O may this happy consummation be hastened! May Ashanti soon stretch out her hands unto God! Surely the Christian Church, even in these days of rebuke and blasphemy, will continue to make special intercession for a part of the human family so deeply degraded, and so greatly needing the kind interference and help of those who themselves have tasted that the Lord is gracious.

An individual who had been engaged in the Mission, has returned to England, and circulated injurious reports concerning Mr. Freeman's management; but Mr. Freeman providentially being in England at the time, so fully exposed the malicious falsity of these charges, that the friends for this important Mission have been much increased. God can make the wrath of man to praise him.

## AMERICA

The WEST INDIA Missions have been attended with remarkable success. In one district alone, that of Antigua, there has been a net addition of 2000 church members to the number returned last year, while 400 remain on trial. The Rev. Robert Young's visit to Jamaica resulted in great good to the Society. Several of the older Stations in Jamaica, Demerara, and elsewhere, not only meet their own expenditure at the present time, but also contribute to the

support of the church. The owners of the Mission set the purpose of all expenditure in the purchase of suits, dresses, and garters, and larger Circuits to be Gospel-earners. This principle is not to be effected in available countries, but is dependent on the

Impressed with the conviction that it is the imperative duty of Mission-churches to furnish, as far as possible, the means for their own support, and also to assist in providing the ordinances of religion for those who cannot help themselves,—the Missionaries and Friends in Jamaica, it will be seen, have set the noble example of commencing a local fund, for the purpose of relieving the general funds of the Society from all expenses on account of the Jamaica District; which fund it is intended to form partly by the same means as the "Contingent Fund," so called, is raised in English circuits—namely, by private contributions from Church-Members, and by public collections made in the several congregations; and partly by means of the surplus-moneys of the larger and richer Stations, which remain after their own Circuit-expenses are met, and which surplus-moneys are *all* to be paid into this common fund for the support of the Gospel in the Jamaica District. This noble example, it is earnestly hoped, will be generally adopted; for it is only on this principle—that the strong should help the weak—that a principle so fully recognised by the Wesleyan body in all its *home*-arrangements,—that the funds of the Society can be effectually relieved from the pressure of the older Missions in British Colonies generally, and rendered more fully available for the spread of the Gospel in purely heathen countries; where, until civilization and the useful arts shall be introduced, Missionary establishments must necessarily depend almost exclusively for support on foreign aid.

The Stations in BRITISH NORTH AMERICA have largely participated in the blessings of the Gospel, and the only regret we can entertain is, that the Committee in London are unable to supply the numerous and urgent calls that are made for Missionaries.

In *Canada West* the number of members has increased, in the course of the three last years, from 1495 to 2769. Of this large number 679 joined in one year, and we are happy to add that this great increase arose not from efforts to proselyte from other communions. The Gospel is making rapid progress among the Indian Tribes of Canada, and whilst bringing them to the enjoyment of the great salvation, scatter among them the blessings of civilized life. The enterprising Wesleyans of Montreal are erecting a large and elegant stone Chapel, capable of accommodating

2,500 hearers. It is expected that it will be ready for opening early next summer.

The work of God in connection with our Missions in *Nova Scotia*, and *New Brunswick* especially, demands a passing notice at least. It is only 60 years since the first Missionary came to this Province, preaching the doctrines of Methodism: four years previous to this, the Rev. Mr. Black had begun to preach. The first detachment consisted of the Rev. Freeborn Garretson, and James O. Cromwell, who accompanied Mr. Black, after the Baltimore Conference, in 1785. The province did not, at that time, present those facilities for travellers that now happily abound in the more densely settled parts, and frequently the hardy Missionary of those days, had to make his way on foot to his appointments, and to direct his course by blazed trees. It is within the memory of some Ministers now in our District, when a Circuit extended from Windsor to Annapolis. But how has the scene changed! The cause had gained such advance under the Divine blessing, that it was deemed advisable, in 1823, to constitute New Brunswick a separate District; since which time the work has steadily held on its widening way, till now Nova-Scotia alone has sixty-eight Chapels, with a population of about 20,000, more or less, under the spiritual supervision of the Missionaries, while New Brunswick has nearly the same number of persons in similar circumstances.

They saw the mountain of the Lord's House established upon the tops of the mountains, and all nations flowing thither together—they saw Ethiopias hand stretched out to God, nor stretched in vain—they saw the isles waiting for and then receiving Messiah's Law—they heard the acclamation, the kingdoms of this world have become the kingdoms of our God, and of His Christ, and He shall reign for evermore. Yes, followers of the Lamb, your master has all this and more recorded, that your faith might never waver; your hope never languish, your love and zeal never decline; and do you love Him; do you love Jesus of Calvary; do you love perishing souls; then begin to-day to estimate the claims he has upon you, and the need they have of your exertions. Let us then begin anew, and come up to the help of the Lord, warring a good warfare.

“Till every tottering fane

Of superstition fall to rise no more

Our conquests follow, till apostate earth

Be girt with mercy, and redeemed by grace.

Shall join the chorus of celestial spheres.

And shout Messiah's universal reign!"
